There was limited success for our Camogie girls, but one can see a promising future for this very young outfit in the near future. The underage structures are well grounded.

Our footballers still laboured long, hard, but unrewarded, but one must pay due regard to their efforts.

Our handballers deserve tremendous acclaim for their efforts in the World Championships in City West, as well as their many All Ireland successes.

very now and then we reach expected destinations by circuitous routes. When Eoin Larkin lifted the National League trophy on May 6th after Kilkenny's 3-21 to 0-16 evisceration of a fancied Cork, was there a single person watching in Semple Stadium or farther afield who seriously doubted that the James Stephens man would similarly be hoisting silverware in Croke Park come September? Scarcely. Yet was there a single person who could have dreamed that he'd do so as captain of the defeated Leinster finalists, and moreover do it on September 30th rather than September 9th? Categorically not.

The destination was anticipated. The journey was unimaginable. In the process we got a championship to savour - the first of the levelling-off championships, one might term it - and Kilkenny had an All Ireland triumph to treasure. A back-door title, yes, but an inordinately worthy and well merited one. Let's face it, the county were always going to win a back-door All Ireland at some stage, and it's not being Noreside-centric to suggest that the asterisk that would customarily accompany a back-door success was in this instance effaced by the sheer toil that had to be expended in reaching the summit - and reaching it the hard way. Set 2012 alongside, say, the front-door victory of 2007: there is simply no comparison. The ninth All Ireland of the Cody era was more than just another All Ireland. Far more than just another All Ireland. For that reason, if kudos go to the Kilkenny management and players for getting it right in the end, praise must also be lavished on Anthony Cunningham and his troops. That the Noresiders earned their crown was largely because Galway forced them to. They usually find a way. This time around they had to work a lot harder than normal to find one.

It was a season of contradictions, a summer in which that most reliable of teams mixed the brilliant with the mediocre and occasionally the downright bad. On the one hand there was the first half of the league final, the third quarter versus Limerick, the second half against Tipperary and the whole of the All Ireland replay. (I refuse to cite the Dublin game in Portlaoise on the basis that Anthony Daly's charges didn't turn up. Tellingly, far too many people took the result at face value instead of viewing it for what it really was: an indictment of Dublin rather than a paean to their conquerors, who didn't have to play particularly well to win as they liked. Thus were sown the seeds of their demise a fortnight later.)

When Kilkenny were good they were very very good indeed. If they didn't consistently reach the heights of 2008 again – and, four years on, couldn't have been expected to – they came closer than might reasonably have been allowed. The 4-24 against Tipp. The 3-22 on September 30th, the most they'd scored in an All Ireland final under Brian Cody, '08 against Waterford apart. These were magical days to compare with any from the past decade.

And then there were the off-days, and more of them than ever before. The Leinster final, the turgid first-half display against Limerick, the laboriousness and lack of imagination demonstrated in the drawn All Ireland final. Will the Leinster final collapse ever be properly explained? The reasons as to the full extent of it as opposed to the fact of it? Maybe it already has: that Kilkenny had put so much into beating Dublin a fortnight previously as to be lacking adequate fuel in the tank – mental fuel more so than physical resources – for Galway. It was the first time since the 2005 All Ireland quarter-final against Limerick that the county's performance in a championship match wasn't

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up to standard, in itself a tribute to Cody, Mick Dempsey and Martin Fogarty. Look how incredibly long they'd succeeded in putting off the evil day.

WELL BEATEN

But at last the afternoon dawned that Kilkenny gave some-body an inch, and Galway, brilliantly prepared, were motivated enough and talented enough to take a mile. Half a step sharper, half a second faster, half a heartbeat hungrier, the underdogs brought the sliotar to ground and won loose ball after loose ball in the rucks. Ten points separated the sides at the end; it might as easily have been 16. Still, being the men they are, the losers died with their boots on. Fourteen down at half-time, they didn't win the match – that was gone beyond recall – but they managed the one and only thing they could manage now: they won the second half. If it was no more than a very small straw to be grasped, it was nonetheless a first step on the journey back to normality.

At the time it looked like the end of the world, or at any rate the end of this team; shades of the 1976 Leinster final, the day that marked the end of the line for a previous great Kilkenny team. But this time, unlike in '76 (as Cody was more aware than anyone else) and '84 and '94, there was a back door.

The trek back was sourced, as these things always are with teams of Cody's, in the power of the collective. Not enough of them played well enough in 2012 for long enough, which explains why there were only five Kilkenny All Stars at the end of the season – well, that and the extent to which they're judged by the standards they've set themselves. Richie Power and Eoin Larkin both looked the Hurler of the Year in waiting during the spring and early summer but lost form thereafter. Tommy Walsh had an indifferent season at the tenth attempt. Richie Hogan was a star in the All Ireland replay but had been misplaced at midfield in the drawn game and had missed the semifinal. Aidan Fogarty was splendid against both Limerick and Tipp but paid the price for his display in the drawn All Ireland, as did Colin Fennelly. One man about whom the qualms disappeared as summer waned to autumn was TJ Reid, who finally became the player he'd long promised, his All Star a richly merited recognition of his overdue arrival. In short, Kilkenny won the All Ireland because they contrived to have a sufficiency of forwards doing the needful on a given day, the Leinster final apart. And on September 30th, all of them did the needful.

The other turning point in their year was David Herity's save from Andy Smith's weak shot shortly before half-time on September 9th, with Galway four points up. A seven-point deficit at the break and there may well have been no way back for the champions. A five-point deficit was manageable. Yet they still made heavy weather of it. One statistic that retains its power to astonish is Kilkenny's tally after the first quarter of the drawn game. Widely tipped beforehand to have had Galway blown away at this stage with their patented shock and awe routine, the MacCarthy Cup holders had one point on the board after 17 minutes. No point on the board after 17 minutes of the Leinster final was one thing, but – forewarned, forearmed and motivated up to the eyeballs - one point on the board after 17 minutes of the rematch? It defied belief.

IMPORTANT ROLES

They scraped a draw in the end, notwithstanding the management's failure to switch Richie Hogan from midfield to attack. It was a mistake that would not be repeated three weeks later, when Kilkenny got their individual match-ups right and Hogan had far too much guile for Kevin Hynes. A number of non-marquee players, and not just Walter Walsh, deserve much credit also. Kieran Joyce, widely regarded three or four years ago as the coming man in defence but lost in some mysterious Rower twilight zone in the interim, materialised from nowhere to line out in the All Ireland quarter-final and didn't put a foot wrong thereafter. Richie Doyle had had a fine year up to then. Cillian Buckley, who unseen by many had actually hurled a brave and constructive second half in the Leinster final, deserved a second chance and seized it with both hands on the last day of September. It may not have been the all-singing, all-dancing Kilkenny subs bench of yore but in a way it was more substantial. Instead of being composed of lads who caught the eye when coming onto a winning team, it comprised guys who all did a job in less than auspicious circumstances. From midfield up the champions had 12 players who put in productive shifts at various stages, and on September 30th all eight who were on the field at the throw-in did so.

Cody has rebuilt, quietly but before our eyes. Eight of the XV that started against Galway in the replay had not started against Waterford four years earlier, and the outcome was a triumph for the management's thoughtful handling of the team during their September hiatus. Nine or ten years ago Cody might have been

inclined to flog them around Nowlan Park; this time around he knew better, for which plaudits must go to Mick Dempsey. Less was more. There were fewer sessions, and those sessions were shorter and tapered off at the end. The proof of the pudding was in the attitude and hunger of the players – particularly the forwards – on September 30th.

All of this said, the story of Kilkenny in 2012 cannot be told without the story of Galway in 2012. The westerners were the team of the summer under the guidance of the manager of the year. And no, that latter bit is no exaggeration or empty platitude, because Anthony Cunningham's achievements in his first season as manager were magnified by the material he had to work with. Cunningham won a Leinster title, and came very close to winning the All Ireland, with a forward line that twice misfired horribly in September. Four of them failed to score in the drawn game. Not one of the

six managed a point from play in normal time in the replay. Two thirds of the same team had died without a whimper against Waterford in the 2011 All Ireland quarter-final. This was straw spun into, if not gold, then silverware.

The challengers were horrendously unfortunate in the replay, of course. James Skehill's shoulder, Joe Canning's injury, Cyril Donnellan's goal that wasn't, Canning's shot off the woodwork, TJ Reid's plethora of steps prior to Walter Walsh's goal. It was a combination of the law of averages and the law of diminishing returns. The more often Galway faced Kilkenny, the more likely

they were to be found out and/or hit a bad day. Thus it happened. Given enough opportunities to decipher the enemy's defensive code, Kilkenny were always going to get them – and to go to town on them when they did. It is the reason why the best team always wins the World Series or the Premier League.

AND BEFORE I GO...

Two last observations.


For no reasons other than the fatigue of familiarity and their absolute refusal to feck off with themselves, Kilkenny had a harder ride from the more excitable elements of the media this year than would otherwise have been the case. This is understandable; black and amber ribbons on the MacCarthy Cup yet again is the equivalent of dog bites man. Hence the ludicrous confected fuss over the Cody/Cunningham face-off at the end of the drawn final when the only possible remotely offensive thing about the episode would have been if the pair of them hadn't been sufficiently worked up to exchange words. Hence also the fingers wagged at Cody for apparently attempting to influence Barry Kelly in the run-up to the game when in reality he was understandably in view of the injury suffered by Michael Rice standing up for his players after the All Ireland semi-final. Naturally the media put their own twist on this, which is what the media do. There are deadlines to be met and headlines to be trumpeted, and all on a daily basis; it is the nature of the beast. Hence too the lack of fuss over the injuries to Rice (a notable exception being Seán Moran of The Irish Times, who raised the pertinent matter of Padraic Maher's "duty of care" to his oppo-

nent) and, in the final, TJ Reid, when all hell would have broken loose had Kilkenny players been the authors of the blows in question. Being the serial winners they are and look like they'll continue to be, the All Ireland champions will not be the recipients of widespread sympathy any time soon. It will no harm for their supporters to resign themselves to this state of affairs. Different folks, different – ahem - strokes.

Finally, Henry Shefflin. His longevity (a mindboggling 62 consecutive championship starts for Kilkenny in tandem with the manager), his durability, his common sense, his ability to distinguish between what matters and what is frippery. Living proof that greatness is about so much more than brilliance. He is modest, which is good, without being falsely modest, which is even better. He knows his own talent, his own worth and his own value to the

team. It was precisely that knowledge which impelled him to centre-forward in the drawn final and it was his grasp of the percentages that led him to play safe with the penalty. His decision to put his shot over the bar didn't ensure that Kilkenny didn't win (had Barry Kelly blown for either of Cyril Donnellan's two subsequent fouls on Tommy Walsh in quick succession they'd have closed it out), but it ensured that they didn't lose. That last part was the priority at the time. Sometimes genius is not about turning water into wine but about playing the numbers.

EARLY SEASON INTER COUNTY SH REPORT by TOMMY LANIGAN

The year began with an 'experimental' team, consisting mainly members of the U-21 panel drawing with NIUG (0-13 to 0-13) in the Walsh Cup. The experiment continued against Westmeath with a better overall performance, winning by 1-23 to 1-16. There was less experiment in the team that was chosen to play Galway in the final. Eight of September's All Ireland team (and nine of Galway's) contested the early season warm up.

Kilkenny triumphed in Pearse Stadium, Salthill by 2-20 to 1-14 as the Bord na Mona sponsored cup returned to Noreside for the eighteenth time. Kilkenny led throughout the game having enjoyed a great start with Richie Hogan and Richie Power shooting scores from all angles to lead at the interval by 1-13 to 1-7. Allianz National Hurling League Round 1 26 February 2012 Kilkenny 2-17, Tipperary 0-15

A mouth-watering clash with Tipperary was the opening game in a newly restructured NHL in Nowlan Park. There was controversy over the groups being reduced to six teams but the new structure was a huge success with every game being very well contested in both Div 1A and 1B and increased attendances at most games.

Supporters were bemoaning the retirement of Michael Kavanagh (expected) and John Dalton (quite unexpected).

Tipperary began with nine survivors from the All Ireland final of 2011 and paid a heavy price as Richie Power continued his great vein of form, well supported by Eoin Larkin. One does not visit the 'Park with an experimental team and hope to do well. Kilkenny started with twelve of last year's All Ireland winning team and the difference in strength in depth of both sides was apparent from the throw-in. Kilkenny began impressively. They shot points from all angles, unsettling the Tipp defence with strong running and confident shooting and led comfortably by 1-10 to Tipperary's 0-8 at half time. A fine solo goal by Eoin Larkin early in the second half at a time when it seemed that Tipp were mounting a comeback settled the result comfortably in

Somehow the clash of the reigning league champions against the All-Ireland champions wasn't considered box office material as a small crowd attended. If they were handing out hurling Oscars at the end of the NHL this would have been a cert for Blockbuster of the Year. In the end Anthony Daly looked like a man who didn't know whether to laugh or cry, and tried to find some consolation in the fact that it was 'only a league game'. Dublin were without several first choice players, both goalkeepers played very well and the crowd was treated to a helter-skelter occasion that comes far too rarely in Spring hurling.


A burst of 2-1 in the last five minutes was enough to get Kilkenny over the line by the narrowest margins and consigned Dublin to a relegation dogfight which they eventually lost. Kilkenny had to be grateful to the sublime skills of Richie Hogan and TJ Reid in the closing minutes. Matthew Ruth grabbed the winning goal with seconds left on the clock. We left Nowlan Park wondering why hurling could not be like that every week.

Kilkenny's preparation for the Leinster championship fixture with Dublin in June took on an altogether sharper focus.

Kilkenny suffered their first competitive defeat of 2012 when los-

ing to Cork by two points in a very competitive game in Páirc Uí Chaoimh. Before 8000 supporters both sides gave excellent value. What was unusual about the result was that Kilkenny lost the battle of the final quarter. With five minutes remaining it seemed Kilkenny had sufficiently resisted the Cork comeback. But the Leesiders finished very strongly with points form young Jamie Coughlan and William Egan to give them a two point victory.

Again Richie Power showed excellent early season sharpness and scored five points in the first twenty minutes. As the new Cork side under Jimmy Barry Murphy settled they gradually got to grips with the Kilkenny forwards and closed the gap to two points at the interval (1-10 to 1-8). The second half was a thriller with the sides levelling at the 55th minute.

Cork scored the final two points of the game as the game ended in frustration for Kilkenny with Richie Power's sending off. It was of greater concern that three young forwards were well held by a zestful and tight Cork defence. It was no surprise that there would be a strong reaction in the next game. Brian Cody's mantra insists on focused improvement.

This became a must-win game for Kilkenny if they wished to make the League semi-finals. The reaction to the Cork defeat was quickly replaced by a feeling of considerable satisfaction as Kilkenny secured their semi-final place in the Allianz Hurling League by comprehensively defeating Galway in Nowlan Park.

The result left the Tribesmen facing a relegation decider with Dublin.

From the throw-in, Kilkenny were absolutely ruthless as they destroyed Galway in almost every position on the field. We have seen the management lay down markers in previous years and it was no surprise they chose to cut loose against the Tribesmen. The mixed form of the previous two games against Dublin and Cork was replaced by a wonderful display of power and pace. They led 3-12 to 0-6 at the break and continued to add scores in the second-half as Anthony Cunningham's side failed to cope with Kilkenny's strength, speed and skill. Matthew Ruth, TJ Reid and Eoin Larkin shot goals as Galway were completely demoralised.

TJ Reid was excellent throughout and in a man of the match performance added to his goal with six excellent points as Kilkenny romped home. The second half was woefully one-sided as Kilkenny set about shooting points from all angles whereas Galway surrendered meekly to the inevitable. It was probably the best thing that happened the Tribesmen as they transformed their year and easily avoided relegation against Dublin a few weeks later. Half of the team were axed as they set about rebuilding in mid-season, while Kilkenny seemed to have unearthed more good prospects in Richie Doyle, Kieran Joyce and Cillian Buckley.

Clare came through the League as Div 1B winners and the gap in pace showed strongly as the game progressed. It took a powerful second half performance to secure a league final place and yet again Richie Power led the way with a terrific performance from play and placed balls.

Kilkenny led by a point at the interval (0-8 to 0-7), having played reasonably well. Richie Power had a penalty saved after a seemingly legitimate Eoin Larkin goal was pulled back by the referee Alan Kelly. When the Cats began to move the ball at greater pace in the second half the young and inexperienced Clare side had little to offer by way of resistance. Conor McGrath kept Clare in touch form placed balls but they got little opportunity to prosper as the

Kilkenny defence tightened their grip.

Matthew Ruth's 40th minute goal put Kilkenny in the driving seat and they were rarely troubled thereafter despite spirited resistance from some of the Clare young guns. Kilkenny would meet them later in the U-21 final with dramatically different results.

Allianz Hurling League Final 6 May 2012 Kilkenny 3-21 Cork 0-16

This game was the antithesis of the earlier League match in Pairc ui Chaoimh as it became a totally one-sided final. Kilkenny claimed their 15th Allianz Hurling League title at Semple Stadium, scoring three first half goals to obliterate Cork in a one-side game. It was the sixth time in which Brian Cody had masterminded a National League title and he did it in some style.

Such a result was not expected as Kilkenny were in the throes of a significant injury crisis. Richie Power, Noel Hickey, Michael Rice and Aidan Fogarty were all sidelined and Henry Shefflin had not yet rejoined the fold following shoulder surgery.

On this occasion captain Eoin Larkin led the rout. He shot a goal within four minutes and led the attack with devastating effect. Cork's defence was a shambles by the end of the first quarter and there was little the management could do about it. Ten minutes into the game they conceded another

goal when Colin Fennelly fired home in impressive fashion.

Cork were in disarray and reshuffled their defence to try stem the tide. Brian Murphy went to full-back and it helped their cause. TJ Reid put the game out of Cork's reach just before the interval when he scored Kilkenny's third goal of the game, having been brilliantly set up by Eoin Larkin. The half time score of 3-11 to 0-6 reflected the rout

A young Darren Sweetnam came on at midfield and helped Cork to a limited recovery and Glen Rover's Patrick Horgan played very well in attack but to no avail. Four Cork forwards failed to score on a dismal day for the Leesiders. Kilkenny sup porters were left in some alarm early in the second half when Michael Fennelly was stretchered off with a nasty ankle injury to join the already substantial casualty list.

The performance presaged great things for the upcoming championship as both midfielders and all six forwards scored. Eoin Larkin and Colin Fennelly were unstoppable and the defence dealt comfortably with every situation.

It was James McGrath's (Westmeath) first NHL final as a referee and he must have impressed because he became the man in the middle for the All Ireland final replay on 30 September.

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The Greatest Team of All.

hen I was approached to do this article my mind went immediately to 1972 and my first All-Ireland final. Who was in it? Kilkenny and Cork, probably one of the greatest All-Ireland finals ever played.

Cork were favourites and looked well on the way to victory with about 13 minutes to go, eight points up I think. That's when everything changed. What a performance by Kilkenny in that last quarter. I don't think Cork scored again while the Cats ran rampant, ended up winning by seven points, 3-24 to 5-11. Not until the Offaly turnover of Limerick in the 1994 final would we again see such a comeback and it was a massive win for Kilkenny.

The one thing I learned that day as a young man, however, and it has stuck with me ever since, was this - Kilkenny aren't dead til they're buried. Any sniff at all, any opening, and they come back to life.

I was impressed by that Kilkenny team, very impressed, and even then I wondered if I'd ever see the likes of some of those players again. Legends they are now - Noel Skehan, Pat Henderson, Chunky O'Brien and Frank Cummins in midfield, Eddie Keher, Kieran Purcell and Pat Delaney interchanging between full-forward and centre-forward, Pat doing his famous hop-ball on a solo-run, the first man to do that in Croke Park, and what a game to do it in! And of course there was also the man who never asked questions, full-back Pa Dillon - he certainly answered a few though! That was a great team, and proved themselves again and again. They were there in the final of 1971, won in 72, left one slip in 73, won again in 74 and 75 - a magnificent team, better hurlers than the great Tipp team of the 60s, and that in itself was some team. They were the best I had ever seen - until this team came along.

What can I say about these guys? Like their predecessors of





the 70s they're completely down-to-earth, no big egos, a real passion for the game, great skill. The likes of Keher, DJ, Frank Cummins, Joe Hennessey, the Hendersons - they always kept themselves in the game, and what I mean by that was that they weren't looking for anything else, they weren't distracted by anything else. It was just hurling, Kilkenny hurling, winning All-Ireland titles. The guys of today have maintained that very honourable tradition.

They've had so much success since Brian Cody took over back in 1999, but I would say that winning this year's All-Ireland title is their greatest achievement. I know they've had a lot of new faces brought in over the years but this is still a team that's been on the go for 14 years, some of them there for that entire period.

It makes me wonder - has any team, in any sport worldwide, ever been as dominant in a major domestic sport as Kilkenny have been in hurling since the year 2000? We're so quick to speak of legendary players and of legendary teams from abroad, but has any team ever matched the achievements of this Kilkenny team? Remember, it's not just championships, it's also the six league titles they've won in that time, the club titles, the contributions to the Railway Cup.

Going back to this year's All-Ireland championship - Kilkenny beat Dublin in the Leinster semi-final and beat them well, but I detected a little lack of intensity in them which is why I didn't go for Kilkenny to beat Galway in the Leinster final. And I was right. I know they were missing a couple of stars but they still had most of their established team; what they lacked was intensity, they just weren't tuned it.

Half-time in that Leinster final was pivotal, and it was in those 15 minutes that Kilkenny won this year's All-Ireland. They regrouped, came back and won the second half. But that look on their faces as Galway collected the cup, THEIR cup, I'll never forget that - they looked like they'd lost a close relative or friend. I'd say it was a quiet bus on the journey back to Kilkenny, the 'bata mór' brought out, because there was hardly another mistake made by those players for the rest of the year. Something I found very impressive about that though, and it's something that has impressed me about Brian Cody since he took over this team - there wasn't a word of negativity coming from that camp, not a word.

As the year went on and Kilkenny fought their way back into the hunt, it was a real bonus for them that Tipperary won in Munster, because this meant they'd be meeting in an All-Ireland semi-final. That was a day when Kilkenny had to get things right, and they did, got their tactics spot on. They went out to hurl while some of the Tipp big names went to step-dance. And when you're not ready to hurl against Kilkenny, against this Kilkenny team especially, you'll be blown away.

The drawn final, I think they got it wrong on the line rather on the field. They got caught up in Galway, in what they were doing, and only for one man, the great Henry, Kilkenny would have lost that game. Henry picked them up off the floor and dragged them to a draw, showed us all - in any walk of life -

how a real leader operates. He led the way, he shouldered the responsibility.

There was no debate whatsoever, however, about the better team in the replay. Cody and his selectors showed courage and initiative, started Walter Walsh and Cillian Buckley, went back to their tried and trusted defensive set-up (which was also an admission of their own mistakes - impressive) and everything came together.

I named a few legends from that 70s team, now there are new legends: JJ Delaney, Jackie Tyrrell, Tommy Walsh, Brian Hogan, Michael Fennelly, Richie Power, Eoin Larkin - a real big-day player - and Richie Hogan. And of course there is Henry.

Kilkenny have won nine All-Irelands under this management team; one man made a contribution to every game in every one of those championships, and some would say that he won a few on his own. Henry Shefflin is now out on his own, in every sense.

Thereis one other player I want to single out from this year and though he's not yet a legend, he will be. In every game Kilkenny played this year there was one man who stood out, who excelled, my own hurler-of-the-year - Paul Murphy.

Final word: captain of the Kilkenny minor team on that day in 1972 was Brian Cody, who turned out to be a fine player himself. He's the link from that day to this but he is also the greatest influence of all in what is now the greatest team of all. To conclude, I salute you all and I thank you for the memories.

ou could push Dr. Bruce Banner. You could push him but not too far. Eventually he'd turn green and burst the seams of his good shirt and become the Incredible Hulk. You could pin Muhammad Ali down but not forever. When Foreman had Ali on the ropes during the Rumble in the Jungle, when he was pounding away at Ali's pretty face for five rounds or so he must have wondered if he wasn't pushing him too far. Sure enough. Ali did the business.

The moral is that you have to kill the Incredible Hulk when you have the chance. You have to deck Muhammad Ali when you get your opening. Galway had the chance. They didn't have the weapons. Or the luck.

This summer they did so much right. They hammered Kilkenny in the Leinster final even if the second half of that game provided a bit of a warning. They did enough to win the All Ireland final early in September even if the second half was once again a bit worrying.

Also they got under Brian Cody's skin. Made him go man to man. Made his team look a bit worried. Galway poked and provoked Kilkenny. Eventually when Kilkenny woke up, Kilkenny went hulk. Kilkenny crushed them.

In hindsight that seems predictable but really it wasn't.

Eventually the day will come when Kilkenny give up the ghost. Before then there will be many days when we expect them to pass away but they'll roll on. And every time

we'll say that we should have known they'd survive to ride off into the amber and black sunset in the final reel. That's what they do. When will it end? Well we've had a great summer of Olympic sport. In our sport Kilkenny are the embodiment of what the Olympics tries to be. Higher. Faster. Stronger. They have nine All Irelands now in the Cody era but all they want is to be Higher. Faster. Stronger. That's the secret of their hunger. We all measure ourselves against them. They measure themselves against the best they can possibly be. We're looking for results. They're looking for perfection. They don't just want to be better than we are. They want to be better than they are. Better than anybody has ever been. Better than anybody can ever be.

That's inspiring. We're all wondering when they'll come back to our standard, when will age or fatigue bring them back down to our level? Kilkenny are wondering how they can get more out of themselves, how they can bring the game to levels not dreamed of

The best thing we can do is go with them. There was a lot of silly talk in the week before this All-Ireland about Joe Canning and Henry Shefflin being rivals. It was as unfair on Joe as was the taking out of context of his use of the word unsportsmanlike. Joe is 23, brilliant but still learning his trade. This year he presented himself for duty visibly fitter than he has ever been. He is learning. But Henry is 33, has nine All Irelands and is the best there has been. The best I have seen anyway. What rivalry?

When we talk about going with Kilkenny to the levels of excellence they are exploring none of us can be happy with our effort. It takes incredible commitment. It takes the sort of commitment that you equate with love. You have to love the game immensely and unconditionally to do what Kilkenny do. Very few players can claim to match that. Very few counties can. I was with Henry Shefflin for a few days in America at the end of last year. I watched how he held himself and how he lived and ate for those few days. The only comparison I have seen to that behaviour is Seán Óg. Henry is fitter today, more of an instrument of hurling today then he was 10 years ago or five years ago.

He is the perfect example for every young player. He doesn't practice and live his life the way he does because he is Henry Shefflin. He is Henry Shefflin BECAUSE he does those things. And doesn't stop. He drives on. This is a fella who says himself that he got on his school team because they needed a big old arse around the

square. Who squeezed onto a Kilkenny intermediate team who were short of players. He got a break when he was spotted playing for them. We call him the king but he wasn't born into his kingdom. He earned it. And still does every day.

Shefflin is what every other county player and county panel has to look to over the next few years. In too many places there are too many players who think they have arrived when they make the county panel and get the tracksuit and the gear bag. They get the nod from the doorman in some nightclub or any of the other places that act as Ellis Island for C list celebrities and they are content with their lot. They've arrived in their new world.

Henry Shefflin has nine All Ireland medals and I doubt if he spends many evenings gazing at them, polishing them or putting them in order. The true satisfaction in sport is being the best you can be, pushing the limits of your potential as a player and as a team. Higher. Faster. Stronger. All the way.

Henry represents that element of Kilkenny's thinking but Cody enforces it and draws it out of the others. That's the challenge for the rest of us. Not many counties can say that this summer they made big strides towards where Kilkenny are. How many counties have a vision of where they want to go which is needed to draw the right dedication from their

players or bring through players with that dedication?

Galway took steps. The challenge for them now is how they react to Sunday's defeat. The loss should be just part of the process, part of their journey. What will be interesting will be how soon they pick it up again and with what intensity. I believe that for a serious county hurler the year is eleven months long. You don't start training out of shape and spend four or five weeks with your teammates getting some kind of fitness back. You come to county training ready for war.

Anthony Cunningham will know that sometimes as a county manager your first year is your best. I would imagine that he has enough brains and enough respect from his panel to make next year just as good but that panel needs to give more than respect. They need to push on and give more than they gave this year. They need to learn the lessons.

On two Sundays in September against Kilkenny they were found short of forwards. Not that you could knock any of their starters as players. Just that the first day Joe Canning and Niall Burke were the only two to score from play at all. And in the replay only Canning got points from play. A lot of their good forwards from the last few years have been recycled as midfielders (you can count Damien Hayes in there) and a few have been put out for pasture but somehow they need to find a few more assassins.

And they need a little luck. Or experience. Joe Canning was hobbled but it was worth playing him. In retrospect though Galway probably feel playing James Skehill on Sunday was a mistake. They probably knew that beforehand. A goalie who dislocated his shoulder on Friday isn't going to be at his best on Sunday afternoon. Galway may have thought it was reassuring for the other players to start Skehill but nobody was reassured when he kicked the first loose ball rather than risk contact on the left shoulder. It was a great trial for him personally to do what he did at all in the first half. His replacement Fergal Flannery was good and brave. You live and learn. Easy to talk after in a column like this.

That goal and the few minutes that came after it showed the dif-

ference between the mindset of the two teams. Galway had just scored two goals in a little over a minute. It was time to kick on and do some damage. Instead they conceded 1-6 without reply. You can only poke so much before the Hulk appears. Ali always comes off the ropes.

That's what Kilkenny's years of experience have given them. For the first time in their three games against Galway this year, they quit worrying and came out and played with the confidence of champions. They went back to their usual defence. They stuck Richie Hogan in front of the goal. Took another good one off the conveyor belt and went out and did what they do. Galway sadly

came to the party without any more surprises up their sleeve.

Higher. Faster. Stronger. Can anybody catch them? Apart from Henry who has at least two years or so left, the rest of their forwards are just arriving at their peak or are a few years off. Can TJ Reid really be only 23? That's frightening.

Midfield is the same and Cillian Buckley looks like he could trade there or in the forwards. In the backs JJ is no spring chicken but he's not ready for the old folks home yet and they are blending in new young players like Paul Murphy and Kieran Joyce. Look at

it this way. From the All-Ireland final of five years ago they have shed PJ Ryan, Michael Kavanagh, Derek Lyng, Cha Fitzpatrick, Willie O' Dwyer, Martin Comerford and Eddie Brennan. And Noel Hickey and Aidan Fogarty who also started that day were subs on Sunday. That's a turnover of nine players without a drop in standard.

The challenge is catching them. Not hoping to meet them on the way down. That's a challenge for managers, coaches and players. And also for county boards, too many of whom either pay lip service to hurling or are living in a hurling world which ended decades ago.

Last word goes to Henry. Nine All-Irelands and the mark of the man is not the amazing things he does but the small things. The work rate. The sleeves-up attitude. The way he gets involved. The way he plays without trying to create a highlight reel of flashy moments. To be as great as he is you need humility. He serves the team. He serves hurling. He decorates Irish sport.

The Saturday before the drawn game, at home in Cloyne, myself and my father were discussing hurling, the All-Ireland final and Christy Ring, who lived just a few doors down from us. We were looking at a picture of Ring's last game that hangs in my parents' living room and saying how his achievements could be eclipsed the following day.

My Father reminded me of what Christy had predicted himself. "The best hurlers are with us now" he said "and the best hurlers are still to come."

If there's better to come than Henry, I hope I live to see it.

Please let him wear a red jersey!..

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Turning Negatives into Positives

Cast your mind back fifteen months or more, to September 4th the 2011 All-Ireland final. Kilkenny are seeking to reclaim the title, their 33rd, from the hands of the old enemy Tipperary. For the hurling followers of Kilkenny it is the highlight of their year. For one young man in particular, it is the highlight of his life.

Dunnamaggin's David Herity was stepping out onto the Croke Park pitch that day to play in his first All-Ireland final. After years of striving to make the senior panel, and three seasons as understudy to P.J. Ryan, the opportunity to secure a first Celtic cross as first team starter was what boyhood dreams were made of. What's more, the garlands were being handed out, with many suggesting he was the best keeper in the country.

Underneath the surface however, doubts were brewing. The year had been a whirlwind, one long honeymoon in the Croker Sunshine. But it didn't really tally with what he was feeling inside. For all the compliments received, there was still insecurity. "Last year I didn't really feel tested. People said I had a great year, but I didn't really have anything to do. Just catch a ball and drive it a hundred yards. Great, but I got no dodgy ball." If his wish was to be tested, it wasn't long in being granted.

Halfway through the second half, in a game Kilkenny were comfortably the better team, Lar Corbett laid off a ball to Pa Bourke, and from 21 years he took aim. David Herity positioned himself for the strike, as he had done so many times before in training and matches, but somehow, it just evaded him. It was a decent shot, but one he could, probably should, have saved. From then on, what seemed a procession, became a struggle. And, even though victory was still secured, that bare fact gnawed away at him over the coming months.

Anyone who has ever had the pleasure of spending time with David Herity, will testify to what great company he is. But beneath the jovial exterior, lies a steely will. After his joke-laden interview at the post game banquet that evening, people might have been given the impression this was a carefree spirit, unaffected by any error. If anything, the opposite was true. He cared too much.

"You'd be on nights out over the winter and people would come up to you and say, 'Are you the Kilkenny Keeper? What were you doing with that ball in the All-Ireland? It nearly cost us' I got fed up of lads saying it to me". It's easy for some sozzled wag in a pub to make a flippant remark. But then, all they ever see is a mistake in Croke Park. They don't see all the hours of preparation it took to get you there.

It's not as if he was parachuted into this position out of nowhere.

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In a sense, he's been building towards it his whole life. His family nurtured his interest in the sport from the start, his brother Colin was even a member of the panel for a time. He spent three years as minor goal-keeper for the county and then had another three terms with the under 21's, winning two All-Irelands in 2003 and 2004.

And yet, at every step of the way, there have been challenges. He felt himself stagnating in 2004-2005. It took the introduction of Seamus Knox into the Dunnamaggin set up the following year for him to blossom again, winning his way onto the Michael Lyng All-Stars the following two years; "I fed off Seamus' enthusiasm".

Even still, it took him until 2008 to force his way into the senior panel. And if he believed the hard work had been done in getting there, little did he know the rude awakening that awaited. "I thought when I got into the panel 'This is grand, I'll be on the team in a year or two'. I never got such a land in all of my life"

He trained harder than ever before this year. He cut out all junk food, put in extra sessions in the gym, trimmed his body fat to a barely plausible 6%. "I thought this year was my chance to redeem myself". But redemption was tough in coming.

Before the Dublin game this year, one the team had planned meticulously for, his nervous energy spilled over into anxiety. He found himself doing things he wouldn't normally do. Sprinting down the corridor of the changing rooms before the game, he had expended almost all of his energy before even getting onto the pitch. Once on the field, "I was so tired I could hardly hit a puck-out."

The following day against Galway was different. The performance against Dublin had lured everyone into believing everything was perfect. In reality, it was far from the truth. "Things were going way too well, there had to be a drop. Even before the game against Galway I was saying to Eoin Murphy, I can't believe we're going out to play this match. I was on the pitch with Cillian Buckley afterwards saying to him, this is good for us. It's the kick in the arse we needed"

If there was a kick though, the reaction wasn't instant. The performance against Limerick was lethargic, It took a stirring half-time speech by the manager to raise them out of their stupor. Then when they faced Tipperary, things really took off. But if, from a performance point of view, it was the apex of Kilkenny's season, from a personal perspective, it was a low. Five minutes before half-time. Lar Corbett took a

brief break from stalking Tommy Walsh, to bundle over David as he came out for a ball, enabling his comrade from the previous year, Pa Bourke, to shoot into an empty net. On another day, with another referee, it could easily have been blown a free, but given his luck this year, it was he who shipped the blame. Last season, he was eaten up about his mistake. This year, he's more philosophical.


"I can see things that I did this year that I was happy with. Like after the goal (David Burke's first) in the All-Ireland replay, I picked out Tommy Walsh straight away with a puck out, he got it up to TJ Reid and we got a point. But nobody mentions that. You have to come out of the year and take the positives, and then turn the negatives into positives. That's what I'm trying to this year, because last year all I could see was negatives"

He knows he's still learning. In Kilkenny goalkeeping terms he's still very young. None of the most recent incumbents of the number one jersey, whether it be Noel Skehan, Kevin Fennelly, Michael Walsh, James McGarry or P.J Ryan, have made the position their own until their late 20's. And yet of all the things he's learned this year, the most crucial thing was developing a thicker skin. "In the end, you just have to learn to ignore some people. Because essentially, the only view that really matters is the management"

Speaking of the management, and Brian Cody in particular, it seems remiss to conduct an interview without mentioning him. The argument as to whether Brian made the players who they are or vice versa, is one that has been there almost as long as to what came first, the chicken or the egg. In the eyes of this particular player however, there is no question.

"He is the reason Kilkenny are winning everything. After the Galway match (All-Ireland final), I honestly didn't know how the replay was going to go, it was the first time ever I couldn't tell how things were going to go. And he literally dragged lads to try and get that little bit more motivation. If he hadn't been as good as he was, we would have lost the second day"

And when that whistle did blow this year, it was the catalyst for twelve months untapped emotion to spill out. Anything that may have been lacking in the previous year celebrations was forgotten about. "Last year I had this sick feeling in my stomach when it was over. I was running out hugging players, but I felt muted somewhat. This year when the whistle blew, I was literally ecstatic"

Far from sating him, the elation of victory just made him yearn for more. "The thing that makes me wonder about journalists, is that they go on about how do these players have the hunger? But they only look at Henry, Tommy and JJ. There's so much more to it than that. I only won my second All Ireland this year, Paul Murphy only won his second as did Colin Fennelly, Cillian Buckley won his first. People look at all the older lads in Kilkenny, but all the newer lads want to win. I want to win as many All-Irelands as I can. I know people would disagree with me, but it feels like such a waste of a year when you don't win the All-Ireland"

As to what the future holds, it is unclear. The year finished on a low note, with the relegation of his beloved club to the intermediate grade; "It was disappointing, but we're confident we can get back up" he states. For the next couple of months though, he can enjoy himself. Enjoy the bag of chips he's been staving off all season. Enjoy the pint of Bulmers when watching the highlights of the year. Enjoy the team holiday in Jamaica.

But even when he's sunning himself on the beach in the Caribbean, there'll be a part of him itching to get back. Back to the training in Nowlan Park; back to the big day in Croker. Back, for a chance, to win another All-Ireland.



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The Third Man

Not just a Laois man, but a football one at that.....

When veteran Kilkenny hurling fans heard the announcement of the new senior management team at the start of the 2005 season, they could forgiven for checking their calendar to see if the date was April 1st. It wasn't perhaps the presence of Brian Cody for his seventh term, or the addition of the victorious under 21 manager Martin Fogarty that caused consternation, but the identity of the third man on the panel, was bound to raise eyebrows. Surely there was some mistake? Could it be possible? Could it be, that a Laois man was now training the Kilkenny hurling team? And not just a Laois man, but a football one at that?

It seemed implausible, because for decades such a prospect had never been countenanced. You see, for practically as far back as

one can remember, Kilkenny hurling hasn't done immigrants. If anything, it's done missionaries. Ned O'Donnell, Dermot Healy, Georgie Leahy were just a few who left the county boundaries to spread the gospel. It perhaps wasn't intentional, but with a track record as proven as Kilkenny's, the argument could easily be put forward "What need have we for outsiders?" Well, in times past that may have been the belief. But in the enlightened era of Brian Cody, it's always been the case that geography has come secondary to knowledge. And in the case of Michael Dempsey, that was more knowledge than most.

It wasn't like it had been planned this way. Indeed, he could barely have envisaged it happening himself. He'd always been a GAA fanatic, even helping coach Laois underage teams from the tender age of 17, but a small ball aficionado he was not. Many moons ago, when his club St Josephs, a conglomerate of four parishes near the Laois-Kilkenny border, sought for a hurling wing to be introduced, he voted against it. Funnily enough, he believed if a club or county just focused on one sport, they might be better off (Where have we heard that before?)

For the majority of his life, he's been a football man, and a damn fine one at that. He served his county with distinction for 15 years at senior inter county level. During that time he was one of the mainstays of the team, a domineering midfielder. But despite some notable scalps during that time provincial or All-Ireland success eluded them. Did he see any reasons as to why this was the case? "When you look back you think a lack of self-belief, a lack of tradition were barriers to success we could have had. When we were playing with Laois, we were happy to put up a good show. We'd play well for 50-60 minutes and then in the last ten minutes, we didn't believe we could win, so our performance level dropped off. It was only later that you realised what could have been achieved".

What could have been achieved? Like Frank Sinatra, Michael isn't a man to indulge in regrets but if he was, he could be tempted to ask "What if?" Take this for starters. In 1985 Laois hammered Meath in the Leinster football championship. The following season, after winning the National League, they were surprisingly gunned down by Wicklow in the first round of the championship, in the infamous "Battle of Aughrim". Meanwhile, whilst the Moore men licked their wounds, their counterparts Meath were notching

up a Leinster title that season, followed by a double All-Ireland in the next couple of years.

But he is not a man to dwell on what might have been. Any success he ever had was gratefully accepted, any loss, treated as a learning experience. Even an ill-fated spell as manager of his beloved county's senior football team in 97-98, ("It was probably a bit too soon for me") didn't quell his appetite for the game. From there he moved seamlessly to O'Hanrahans in Carlow, winning a Leinster title in 2000 for an unfashionable club. And then, things started to get very interesting indeed.

Ask him when he moved down to Kilkenny originally, and he freely admits he can't remember. Just like he says he fell into most jobs, he never planned to come to Kilkenny, circumstances just saw to it that he did. What is certain, is that he began coaching the Castlecomer minor football team alongside Dick Mullins in the late 90's. From there he got involved in coaching the Kilkenny minor football team, under the tutelage of Brendan O'Sullivan. St Martin's of Muckalee was the next port of call where he made his first crossover into hurling training. And that's where Martin Fogarty stepped in.

The Castlecomer primary school teacher recognised something in Michael's training methods, that could prove very useful to him, and there was something about the ying and the yang of their relationship, that complemented each other perfectly. Two years were spent nurturing the county's under 21's, with two highly impressive All-Irelands garnered during that time. Even still, when their term finished at the end of 2004, Michael believed so did his time with his adopted county. But a certain other primary school teacher had different ideas.

Brian Cody requested a meeting with the two men that winter to form a new management team. An offer was made, and accepted, but given his background, did he not feel any anxiety about coming into a set up, that for years was essentially a closed shop? "I didn't really think about it at the time. I suppose it was a very risky step for Brian to take, but if it didn't work out, I suppose he could have just sacked me anyway!"

There's no fear of that happening now. Initially, coming into training, wondering how such legends of the game as Henry Shefflin, Noel Hickey and Peter Barry would embrace his teachings, was an onerous experience. But what amazed and delighted him was how receptive they all were. "I never got any resistance from anyone. Kilkenny players are very unusual, they come to train, solely to train, and their attitude is just exceptional. I couldn't emphasise that point enough. That makes my job very easy"

Still, it must be a big change, to come from a county with little or no success, to one where a couple of years without an All-Ireland, is seen as a famine. In his eyes, what was the main difference between the two counties? "I don't want to go into specifics, but there needs to be more unity (in Laois) in terms of supporting all the teams and the underage structures. In Kilkenny, you do notice when you speak to people in the county board, or Brian Cody or Martin Fogarty, they know all the young players in the clubs at the age of ten or eleven in terms of their potential, and there is that support structure there in terms of nurturing young talent. There is real pride in the fact that someone from your school or club may go on to represent Kilkenny. There is that realistic goal, which is lacking in other counties"

One thing that does puzzle Michael, is the vagaries of the Kilkenny hurling public. Coming from a county where success is hoped for, but not demanded, he finds it difficult to understand supporters who aren't automatically placated by victory "I couldn't understand it a few years ago, I wasn't involved in the team at the time, but I was in the public domain, and I heard people giving out about

Brian after he won the All-Ireland. I just couldn't understand, I was making the point to people 'You're after winning the All-Ireland and yet you can't stop criticizing the manager"

Their relationship is strong; professional but cordial, and he has found his demeanour to be very much against stereotype. "You'd often hear the comment, no one could work with Brian Cody, he'd just be a dictator. And I'd have to admit that while he has strong opinions, he's very respectful of other's people opinions, and he is very much a team player". So he's not a hard man to please as regards organising a nights training then? "Well, He'll usually ask me a hundred questions and then he'll let me get on with it" he chuckles.

Given the unprecedented level of success he's help preside over the last 8 years, it's only natural that other counties, both hurling and football, would be casting covetous glances over his services. While he doesn't tempt fate as to what may lie ahead, he is adamant he is in no rush to leave.

"I have to say that any of the experiences I have had with Kilkenny have all been extremely positive. I remember when I became selector of the under 21's ten years ago, Ned Quinn came in to me personally to wish me the best of luck. I don't think there's many other counties where you'd get that personal aspect of it. In Kilkenny, they do take things personally. I think that's one of the reasons why they are so successful"

Well, that's one of the reasons. And no doubt, having people like Michael Dempsey involved, is a major reason as well

CONSISTENT TJ EAGER TO BUILD ON A GREAT YEAR

INTERVIEW WITH TJ REID by Richard Holden

I met TJ on the day of the Kilkenny Senior County Final between his club, Shamrocks and city team Dicksboro. It should have been the crowning moment of a great season, with a county medal to complement the All-Ireland and All-Star award he had already accumulated. However, TJ is currently sidelined due to an injury received in the All-Ireland Final replay against Galway. I asked the Connolly's Red Mills sales representative does he believe the game has gone too physical now? 'In relation to my own injury, I feel it could have been prevented, it was a wild belt of a hurl. I think linesmen and umpires need to step it up a bit and give more assistance to the referee I also feel that referees have tended to concentrate too much on Kilkenny compared to other teams.'

When I reflected on Kilkenny's championship season with TJ, we started with the shock Leinster Final reverse to Galway. How did the 24-year-old react to been dropped for the All-Ireland quarter-final against Limerick? 'I decided I would have to prove myself in training and work hard. It was a wake-up call and I mightn't have hurled as well if I had retained my place.' Following wins over the Shannonsiders and

old rivals Tipp, the Cats booked a re-match with the Tribesmen in the All-Ireland Final. A first draw since 1959 ensued and both sides had another shot at glory in the replay. The drawn game had essentially been a game of two halves, with Galway very much on top in the initial half as they opened up a seven point lead but in the second-half, Kilkenny came more into the game thanks in no small part to the heroic efforts of Henry Shefflin who was ably assisted by the backs particularly Paul Murphy and Brian Hogan. How did Brian Cody and his management team approach the replay then? 'We felt we had focused too much on Galway and that our tactics didn't work in the drawn game. For the replay, we decided to go man-to-man and to try and be more clever in possession - instead of hitting too many aimless high balls in we would try and pick out a player. We would have felt we were the better team the first day as five of our forwards scored whereas only two of theirs did plus they also had a bit of

has had a distinguished club career with the Shamrocks, and is the proud holder of five senior county titles and three All-Ireland's. He



references the 2007 All-Ireland Final win over Loughrea as particularly sweet. 'I had two brothers on the team that day, Eoin and Patrick, and I think between us we scored 3-7 so that was an extra special feeling.' There is now a fourth Reid on the panel with Richie joining his three brothers on the team last year. In a recent profile leading up to the All-Ireland Final, TJ picked out Tommy Shefflin as his favourite player - any particular reason? 'Tommy has always been a great clubman and he looked after me growing up. He was a good forward and has now taken over as manager of the senior team where we have enjoyed his vast amount of training drills. I would also have looked up to Henry Shefflin and enjoyed watching him and now playing with him. He is a great leader and is always encouraging you.

How did Shamrocks approach this year, was there an extra determination having lost out the previous two seasons? 'Losing last year's County Final was a big disappointment and lingered over the winter with us so there was a big motivation to make amends for that. We also tragically lost two young clubmen, Seán Malone and Martin Duggan, in a road accident last December. Seán's mother came in to us at the start of the year to wish us all the best and we were determined to honour their memory.' What advice could he pass on to young players? 'I think it is important to work on your weaknesses or a 'bad side' if you have one. Personally, I felt in order to improve that I needed to bulk up in the gym as you have to be

As for future ambitions, TJ hopes to just get back playing first and is targeting February as his return date - 'I'm looking forward to getting back as you are only as good as your last game and I want to try and push on and achieve more with both club and county.'

able to look after yourself out there.'





Twenty three years of age, two senior championship campaigns under his belt, two All-Ireland medals, two All Stars and a nomination for Hurler of the Year. Not a bad start to an intercounty career by anyone's standards.

In fact, in his first two full years hurling with Kilkenny, Paul Murphy has only lost one championship match (to Galway in the 2012 Leinster final) and three league games. If he can keep this up, the corner back from Danesfort will be a feature of the Kilkenny defence for some years to come.

Despite recent success however, Paul's initial experiences playing for Kilkenny were marked by defeat. He was on minor teams in 2006 and 2007 that failed to reach an All-Ireland final, let alone win one.

"We actually suffered bad luck both years that I was on the minor

panel. It would have been a surprise that we didn't win an All-Ireland to some people because of the panel we had and because of what we had won in other age groups. We won a Tony Forristal and and a Nenagh Co-Op so when it came to minor, we thought we had a right shot of winning an All-Ireland but it didn't work out for one reason or another."

In 2006 Kilkenny were defeated by Tipperary in an All-Ireland semi-final after taking the provincial crown with a comprehensive 4-22 to 1-5 victory over Carlow. The following year, the boys in black and amber took a step backwards, losing first to Dublin in the Leinster final before again bowing out to Tipperary.

For Paul the disappointment was relatively short lived. In 2008, he lined out at corner back on an All-Ireland winning under 21 side that was littered with stars.

"That really was a great panel of players under 21 when you look at it. We had Kieran Joyce, Colin Fennelly, TJ Reid, Matt Ruth and then all the lads from Clara, the Prendergasts and Ryans. It actually was a brilliant year for Kilkenny hurling. That was the year that we won the minor, under 21, intermediate and senior All Irelands. It was incredible really looking back on that year."

Standing out on a team so laden with talent, it was only a matter of time before Paul appeared on the radar of one Brian Cody.

"It was during that year playing on the under 21 team that I first went in and trained with the senior panel. I remember that I first got a call from Martin Fogarty and I was totally shocked. I knew I had been going well with the under 21 but I really wasn't expecting it. I really was shocked altogether."

The panel he was joining had the previous year won Kilkenny's 30th All Ireland title and were on their way to number 31 and the elusive three in a row. Henry Shefflin, Tommy Walsh, Noel Hickey, JJ Delaney and many more were being heralded as some of the best players to have ever picked up a hurl. Understandably, the 19 year old felt a certain amount of trepidation upon joining them.

"You definitely would be in awe of some of the older players when you first come onto the panel. They are lads that you have been watching growing up and cheering them on and here you are playing with them. I remember Eddie Brennan coming up to me at a Walsh Cup match early in the year and talking to me a little bit about my game, just giving me some advice, that was a huge help. I'll always remember how fired up he was. Here was a fella who had won everything and he was bursting to play this Walsh Cup game. Getting advice from players like that is invaluable."

"Mick Kavangh, Mick Rice, Jackie Tyrrell, they would all have taken me aside at different times too and had a few words with me. It's great because when you're only just coming onto the

panel, you'd nearly be afraid of going up to players like that and asking them advice, so it's brilliant when they offer it to you freely." Despite this guidance, Paul's story at senior intercounty level isn't one of overnight success. In 2009, he appeared in Walsh Cup matches and even made the panel during the league but come championship, he fell short of the mark.

It was a similar story in 2010, after showing some promise early in the year, Paul found himself on the outside looking in when it came to the business end of the season. Though it should be noted that he spent some time in Chad with the army during the year which certainly couldn't have helped his cause.

So what was the turning point between 2010 and 2011 that saw him not only improve but nail down a starting place on the team? "I remember the 2010 final. I was up on the Hill with a group of friends at the match and obviously we were all very disappointed that Kilkenny had lost but I really was gutted that I wasn't down on the pitch with the players. Even though they had just lost an All-Ireland, that was where I wanted to be and I decided that no matter what, I was going to do my best to become part of that team" "I basically went off and trained hard all through the next winter. I got myself into great physical shape, I was the fittest and strongest I had ever been but then the hurling took a little longer to get right. That just wasn't clicking at first but we played a match down in Waterford to open up a pitch one evening early in the year and I remember that was the match when things really started coming together. If I'm being honest though, there were also a few injuries and suspensions on the team as we came close to the start of the league so that opened a door for me as well."

The team he became a part of in 2011 was one with a lot of questions hanging over it. The consensus was that Kilkenny had met their match in Tipperary and the men from the Premier County would supplant the Cats at the head of the hurling table. This wasn't helped when Dublin beat Kilkenny rather easily in the league final.

"The league was inconsistent that year for us and so there was pressure on but we were trying out things, learning who could do what in different positions and finding out if some lads maybe had a few too many miles on the clock."


"So despite the big loss to Dublin in the final, there was a confidence in the panel going into the championship. A lot of lads also felt that they had a point to prove because of what was being said. People were writing off individual players and the team as a whole, saying that Tipp were the team for the next few years and finally Brian Cody and Kilkenny had run out of steam."

"From my own point of view, it was about taking each game as it came and trying to earn a regular place on the team. After doing well against Wexford and Dublin in the championship, Brian Cody said to me 'two swallows don't make a summer'. I knew that I was only as good as my last game and that there could easily be some fella like me up on the Hill watching the match who would decide to put the work in and try to take my place. That is what keeps me motivated still, that feeling I had when I was on the Hill and knowing others could have it too."

That motivation has yielded some undeniably impressive results. A celtic cross and an All Star in his first full season, Paul could be forgiven if he thought that the good times would keep on rolling. Galway put paid to that notion on a Sunday in early July this year. "Plenty of people have asked if there was a few minutes after the game where we were really worried that the wheels had come off the bus but honestly there wasn't. We just felt immediately afterwards that they had outworked us and out fought us and that was what we had to rectify. We had been well beaten by Dublin the previous year in the league final and people had forgotten about it so there was no panic."

"Going into the final, of course we looked at the way that Galway played. I think that people assume we just focus on our own game and pay attention to nothing else but it would be stupid if you are playing the same team twice not to try and learn anything from the first match. We knew how Galway would want the game to go and we planned for that."

"At training in between the games, we knew we were going well. Lads were making a statement with the work and effort that they were putting in over in Nowlan Park. So going into the All-Ireland

and the replay, we were confident that we could do a job".

That they did and in the process Paul earned a second All Star and a nomination for Hurler of the Year. While he lost out on the latter to teammate Henry Shefflin, in balance his time in black and amber has proven to be hugely successful.

Of course, black and amber also describes the colours of Paul's club, Danesfort.

Whatever was in the water out there in the late 1980's, the parish suddenly produced three of the best hurlers in their history. Paul, along with Richie Hogan and his older brother Paddy helped secure the first county title for the club in over 75 years when they won the Junior championship in 2006.

This was followed in 2011 with the Intermediate crown and the club's first tilt at senior honours this year. Like most clubs making the jump up a grade, the first objective was survival and this was secured when they beat Dunnamaggin in a hard fought relegation final in late October.

"We're delighted to be staying up but we were disappointed to be in a relegation final at all. Looking back on the league, we only lost to Shamrocks by 4 points and we hit a lot of wides that day. We then went on and played well in other rounds of the league but kept losing out narrowly. If we had that bit more cuteness or experience then we might have been able to close out those games and we would have been safe from relegation and able to concentrate on the championship."

"Next year you would definitely be hoping, that with a year at senior under our belts, lads might have matured a bit and nerves won't be as much of an issue. We should be able to push on from this year, improve on things and pick up a few points in the league."

Like most players, Paul gets excited when talking about the prospects of his club and would love nothing more than to see Danesfort feature in a senior county final in Kilkenny. But would he swap all his success on the county team to experience something similar at club level?

"Ha ha, it would be hard to say no to that but luckily I'll never have to make the choice"

Playing on the Edge of IMMORTALITY

I'm an unabashed admirer,privileged to have witnessed their deeds.

Many times over the last few years, in planes and trains and in automobiles, in pubs and clubs and in press-boxes up and down the land, I've found myself defending this Kilkenny team. Are they angels? No. Have they pulled a few foul strokes, a few sneaky strokes, a few outright dirty strokes? Yes. But are they a dirty team? Absolutely not.

A story, and an introduction to a few players you've never heard of but might have, were it not for a puck of a ball in a game or two. In 1976 my club, Ballyhea, won a Cork county junior hurling title, no mean feat in a championship where first you had to win your own division, game after derby game against fierce local rivals, then head into the county meeting battle-hardened champions from the other divisions.

In 1977, having beaten the reigning champions Newtownshandrum in the first round (they had easily won the intermediate title of 1976 with a young team, had opted to remain intermediate for another year in the certainty they'd win it again, before then moving up senior), Ballyhea reached the intermediate final but lost narrowly to Martin Coleman's Ballinhassig.

In 1980 the intermediate title was finally won and the Magpies were up with the big boys, the big three of the Glen/Barrs/Rockies still in their pomp in Cork. In 1982 we were robbed by Glen Rovers in the county quarter-final. In 1983 we were pipped by St Finbarr's in the semi-final. In 1984, GAA centenary year, the same opposition beat us in the county final. In 1986 it was Blackrock denying us at the death in the semi-final. For four years we were so near, oh so near, but as we were failing another Magpie outfit, Midleton, a team with whom we could go toe-to-toe whenever we met, DID make the breakthrough and suddenly the hurling world knew not just of John Fenton but of Denis Mulcahy, Pat Hartnett, Kevin Hennessey, of Seanie O'Brien, of the Boylan brothers etc, as Midleton went on to win three more Cork titles, one Munster championship.

So who were we? In one corner-back position in that Ballyhea team was Johnny Carroll, our silent assassin. Johnny never came to the attention of the referee, he never cleared a ball further than he had to; he was anonymous. So too, however, was almost every forward he ever faced and what Johnny did, he did in the dark. He was our Noel Hickey. In the other corner was Neil Ronan, father of the guy of the same name who went on to play for Cork in 1999. Neil snr. was the single most competitive man on that Ballyhea team, a defender who relished confrontation, who thrived on contact. The quickest hands I ever saw, he would have pulled twice before many had pulled once and often did; often too he even pulled on the ball. In an era when "make 'em dance!" was a catch-cry, Neil was the Kilfenora Ceili Band, Joe Dolan and Joe Loss all wrapped in one. Our Jackie Tyrrell.

Centre-back was Jack Russell, a man who captained Cork in 1967 but even as late as 1984, in the senior county final, saw off Jimmy Barry Murphy, John Meyler and Christy Ryan in turn. He wasn't big in stature but man could he hurl, a ball-player supreme, outstanding reader of the game. If you wanted to play without the ball, however, well, he could do that too - pound-for-pound, I never saw tougher. Our Tommy.

In midfield we had Connie Brassil. I wonder, does anyone out there remember a field-opening in Hugginstown around 1981/82, Cork v Kilkenny? Six Ballyhea players travelled with Cork that evening, we won. Connie played midfield and he and Dick O'Hara must have broken half-a-dozen hurlers off each other. Each. Connie took no prisoners, ever, a thunderous man in the hit. Michael Fennelly.

Up front, occasionally in midfield, we had a guy called Kevin McSweeney, a brother of the sprinter Fanahan, who came to us from Castletownroche. To give you an idea of the kind of plaver Kevin was; Cork won the All-Ireland U-21 final of 1970 against Wexford after a replay but in the drawn game, with time up, Wexford were awarded a free inside the 70-yd line, dead centre. Mickey Byrne hadn't missed a shot, was walking to the ball as the referee jogged in towards the Cork goal. Kevin ran from his wing-forward position and kicked the ball TOWARDS his own goal; as Mick Jacob went after it, Kevin began shouting at the ref - 'Look, he's after moving the ball forward!'. The ref brought the ball back almost into the Wexford half - Mickey's shot dropped short, game over, Cork hammered them in the replay. Now THAT was clever! Unfair, unsportsmanlike? Please... I'd like to say Kevin was our Henry, but no team anywhere other than in Ballyhale Shamrocks and in Kilkenny has a Henry.


We did have Willie Shanahan, however, and Donie Sullivan, two absolute bulls of men who hurt you just in passing, and we had Davy Ryan, minor and U-21 All-Ireland medalist, who knew exactly how to play the referee long before anyone spoke of such subtleties.

We had a full-forward who shall remain nameless but who, to paraphrase from different circumstances, was 'known to the referees' - every referee in the county. Suffice to say he went on to bluff his way behind a laptop. We also had hurlers who wouldn't harm a fly though neither would they take a backward step - Philly Ryan, uncle of Neil Ronan jnr and brother of Davy, was one of the most gifted I ever saw with a hurley, man-of-thematch in that 84 final on a beaten team.

We treasured all those guys, every single one of them. Without them we would have won nothing, absolutely nothing. In any situation, whether in life or in sport, you need people who are hard enough to do the necessary, and you will NOT win an All-Ireland title without guys who are prepared to dish out some pain (on a different note, and as one who has marched in Ballyhea against the bank bailout for over 90 weeks now, how I wish we had such people leading us in government!).

Where I come from, hurling was always as much a test of character as a test of skill. It wasn't just about the fella who could do magic with a ball off a wall, it was about the fella who could stand up to the champion of the next parish and give as good as he got. Almost every time you went on a hurling field you were tested; your courage was tested, your nerve was tested, your character was tested. The bigger the test, the more satisfaction if you managed to withstand it. No-one offers a greater test in hurling than Kilkenny in the Cody era. It's a test that will take you to the limit of what's acceptable but all the better for that - that's what top-class sport SHOULD be about, pushing yourself to the limit, being pushed to the limit.

In summary, this is NOT a dirty Kilkenny team and to even suggest it is to insult them. Individual players have crossed the line occasionally (think back a few years to Tommy's back-swipes when breaking free, to Eddie Brennan's 'hello' to Limerick youngster Seamus Hickey in the All-Ireland final) but when you operate on the edge that's only to be expected. Overall, however, they've been absolutely brilliant, a credit not just to Kilkenny but to hurling and to all its ancient codes. I'm an unabashed admirer, feel privileged to have witnessed their deeds.

What a conundrum the county final of 2012 turned out to be. The pre-match talk was shared between wonder at a callow and youthful Dicksboro side travelling from relegation to a touch with glory and the awful possibility that a hardened 'Shamrocks would finish the game inside the first quarter.

Rarely have we witnessed a final where the atmosphere was almost funereal in the opening stages as the crowd seemed to expect a rout. The Ballyhale men were uncharacteristically sloppy in

front of goal, too casual as if expecting victory would fall to them with ease. They missed four, perhaps five gilt edged goal opportunities, including two penalty misses from Henry Shefflin. Credit to Shane Maher, who stopped both raspers. It must be noted that the 'Boro conceded no goal during the championship, a considerable feat

The 'Boro youngsters, including eight U-21s, somehow survived the onslaught and slowly grew into the belief that 'Shamrocks did

not have the title by right, that it was there to be won by the hardest chasers. Two points clear at the interval (0-9 to 0-7), 'Shamrocks upped the pace and seemed to choke the life out of the 'Boro when forging a six point lead. But the city side fought bravely, none more so than young Robbie Fitzpatrick, Danny Kenny and Shane Maher. The gods mocked them when a wonderful shot by Eddie O'Donoghue hit the post with six minutes remaining and 'Shamrocks feetling some uncharacteristic heat. It needed all the strength, guile and nous of both Fennellys and Aylwards, Henry, and Aidan Cummins to see them home in an engrossing last quarter. Well done to Ballyhale. Some legs that looked rubbery in 2011 were rejuvenated and their winning knowhow saw them to victory when other teams might have succumbed to the late 'Boro assault.

Three city teams reached the semi-finals of the senior championship. While it has taken a very long time to reach this goal, tribute must be paid to each of the three clubs for their organisation and endeavours.

Sine the late '60s James Stephens have been the principal flag-

bearers at senior and juvenile level as Dicksboro and O'Loughlin Gaels struggled to gain consistency. After much heartbreak the 'Boro came good in senior ranks in the early nineties, following quality and intensive underage progress. O'Loughlins arrived in force seven years later, thanks to excellent work at underage level. Currently the three clubs are producing quality teams at all underage grades and it would seem that the potential exists for city dominance at adult level. Easier said than done. There are no easy routes to consistent excellence.

As a large urban centre, Kilkenny is extremely fortunate to have three powerful clubs vying for supremacy. Most large towns in Ireland do well to have one flourishing club. The problem for the city teams is the resources and opportunities for financial support to aid development must be divided three ways.

Dicksboro reached their first county senior final since 1994 with a fully merited victory over James Stephens by 1-15 to 0-16 in an exciting and highly competitive semi-final. A young and driven side never allowed the defending champions settle into the game where the men in maroon attacked each ball as if their lives de-

pended on it. The game was very close at all stages but the new-found self belief in the 'Boro players drove them on to clinch the result in some style. The champions went down fighting, though missing and conceding too many frees. Ultimately they were too dependent on the genius of Eoin Larkin and even he cannot win games without lots of assistance from his fellow forwards.

Remarkably, the 'Boro began their championship campaign in the dreaded relegation zone after a league campaign that should have produced more points. Their first championship encounter was a comfortable win over Dunnamaggin (2-15 to 0-12). They defeated Shield finalists St. Martins in a high-scoring quarter-final (3-15 to 0-19) suggesting the 'Boro had found some solutions to their old bugbear of inability to find the posts with consistency. The habit stayed with them through the semi-final as the 1-15 scoreline against the Village demonstrated.

Ballyhale Shamrocks played their way as efficiently as usual ttthrough the League campaign thought they lost the final against neighbours Carrickshock (1-15 to 0-15). It mattered little to them as they experimented through the hour with player placements. They leaked scores in uncharacteristic manner against Erins Own in the quarter final and were given a real fright before winning by 3-16 to 1-16.

Their semi-final victory over O'Loughlin Gaels was a master class in economic hurling. Henry Shefflin, one of the greatest

score takers in the game, rarely went for his own score, instead dominating the game and feeding opportunities to his colleagues. They responded with characteristic efficiency and O'Loughlins had few answers. Their final goal merely put respectability on the scoreboard (1-17 to 2-10) as the experienced Shamrocks controlled the exchanges for most of the hour. Admittedly they displayed several weaknesses through the season, that were not helped by the enforced absence through injury of TJ Reid following the replayed All Ireland final.

O'Loughlins had suffered badly with several long term injuries over the Summer and did as well as could be expected in the circumstances. They remain one of the most difficult teams to overcome at any stage of the competition. Qualifying for the junior semi-final suggests they have some good ore to mine, but they must do so quite soon. Their dismissal of Carrickshock (1-15 to 1-11) was a repeat of their county final performance of 2010. 'Shock had a great league campaign, their best in senior

ranks. Richie Power was the stand out player of the competition but his club mates depended too much on his brilliance. In the heat of championship they need a little more.

The aforementioned Erins Own came close to qualifying for the Shield and played solidly all year. Yet more progress had been expected. They have a nice blend of youth and experience but consistent scoring continues to be a challenge. Graigue-Ballycallan have struggled for some time. Their league campaign was poor though they always save their best performances for the championship. They fought a relegation semi-final against Danesfort and came through a tight game (0-13 to 0-10) with inspiration from evergreen Eddie Brennan. They competed well against James Stephens in the quarter final until a rush of goals ended their season (4-12 to 0-15). They cannot continue to depend on the seasoned veterans to maintain their competitiveness.

2011 Intermediate champions Danesfort played well through the league with little to show for their efforts. The presence of three county senior players kept them in senior ranks, none more so than in the relegation final when Paul Murphy and Richie Hogan delivered tour des force performances. Reaching the minor B final will help their prospects too. Their neighbours Dunnamaggin have distinguished themselves in senior ranks since 1996 but unfortunately the well of talent seems to have dried. They could no longer muster enough scores to keep them safe and will have a battle to return to senior ranks in the near future

What of Tullaroan and Fenians? They have

so much in common, small parish populations, outstanding individuals in Tommy and JJ respectively, and enviable fighting spirit. If ever two clubs deliver more than the sum of their parts it is these two. For years we have predicted their demise from senior ranks but they continue to unearth a forward or two to score enough and give grief to the big guns. Long may they continue to display such wonderful spirit.

It has been a satisfactory end to a senior championship that was unnecessarily extended into the Autumn. Such decisions take little account of the club player and his life. We hope for the return of supporter friendly fixture making, giving them the opportunity to see at least four games every weekend. The new, young and thriving intermediate champions should add some spice to the 2013 fare.

Roll on the days.



Irelands opened up a four point lead early on before Mullinavat fought back to level once again. Willie O'Dwyer buried a 21 yard free to the net to galvinise the Mullinavat challenge, but the Gowran men proved their worth, scoring major scores at key stages to hold out for victory, winning in the end by 2-14 to 2-12. Conahy Shamrocks and John Lockes had not enjoyed the best of league campaigns before they faced each other in the championship. The Callan men had managed one win while Conahy had not secured a single point in their group, despite marginally losing the majority of their games. But all that would be been easily forgotten with a victory in this game. The Callan men were guicker to settle in the opening half, eventually leading by 0-9 to 0-4 at the break. However, some shrewd changes in the Conahy attack saw them produce a far improved performance in the second half to lead by 0-15 to 0-12 in the final minutes. However, they could not maintain their composure in the crucial final minutes as the Callan men poured forward, and subsequently John Lockes halfback Jack McDowell flicked the ball to the Conahy net with the final action of the game to snatch a dramatic draw (1-12 to 0-15). 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definitively cemented their status as a real threat to any team in the intermediate grade. Their dominance was highlighted for all to see on the score board, and Mooncoin really didn't have any significant answer in reply to this. In the end, it was a comprehensive victory for the Ballyragget men, who won out on a 1-17 to 1-5 score line.

The potential for a memorable game between Rower-Inistioge and Young Irelands was certainly high as they faced each other in the quarter-finals. A interesting side note to the game was that former playing colleagues DJ Carey and Pat O'Neill faced each other on the side line, the latter against his home club. The result of the game was in doubt right through until the final minutes. The Rower led 1-7 to 1-6 at the half-time break thanks to a Conor Joyce goal after the Gowran men had started the game brightly. There was very little between the sides throughout the second half but when composure was needed, it was the Southerners who displayed it the best. Their goalkeeper Liam Tierney made a timely save to deny Ollie Carter, which was soon followed by three pointed frees from Paul Sheehan to cement the Rower's place in the semi-final, as they advanced by winning 1-16 to 1-12.

St. Lachtain's faced Conahy Shamrocks in a repeat of their final league game a few weeks previously, which was won by the Freshford men. Conahy came into the game with more optimism, however, and this was obvious in their first half performance. The sides were even throughout that period and indeed were level at 1-7 apiece at half-time. But the Freshford men enjoyed a serious purple patch in the second half's early exchanges and ultimately killed off the Conahy challenge at this stage. Conahy showed that they were a troop of honest hurlers in spite of injuries and absences, but the hill in front of them was too steep. The replay proved this to be the case, though once again, not without a large amount of defiance from the Southerners. Clara had to call on all their experience and fortunately for them, their senior players came to the fore when they were needed most. but defeat was to be their lot, as Clara eventually advanced, to their relief, by winning 2-14 to 1-13.



winner between St. Patrick's and the Rower-Inistioge in the second semi-final. Though both teams had experienced the extremes of victory and defeat in the recent past, it would be difficult to see a definitive advantage for one side over another. The Ballyragget attack just could not come to terms with the slippy conditions and the determined play of the likes of John Phelan and the Prendergasts, Neal and Shane, who led the Clara defence well throughout. The conditions worsened as the second half progressed and it continued to play into Clara's hands. Though they themselves were able to add only a single point to their tally in the second half, St. Patrick's could not better that themselves as they got increasingly desperate. In the end, there was no denying the best team on the day, with the final score 1-7 to 0-4 in Clara's favour. It was a dull and miserable ending to a long season, but as Clara celebrated at the end of the game, it mattered little to them and their supporters.

Following the success of two clubs competing in the junior grade in Kilkenny at national level the local competitions were buoyed up as St. Patrick's took the Junior All Ireland title and Mount Leinster Rangers the All Ireland Intermediate title. The year saw the newly formatted championships well embedded as twenty two club sides in four groups entered the premier junior competition. Having commenced on the last weekend in April, the first real assessment day occurred on the second weekend in August when the final round of the junior league championship was played. The results of that round gave a possible indication of the heirs to St Patrick's county title. For a handful it gave a strong hope that they might follow them to the Provincial and National Thrones following the Ballyragget side's clean sweep of titles in 2011. For other clubs the hopes were for a jump start in form, and for more it was how to stay clear of the dreaded relegation zone. For one and all, the implications of recession, unemployment and the growing levels of emigration were amongst the most serious concerns. The spill-over effect was most notable as players moved up to the first team and the teams down through the grades came under extreme pressure to field with some walkovers being given particularly at exam times.

Thomastown take a step on the way to former glories

With Piltown taking the favourites mantle following their county final appearance in 2011 they were joined by Lisdowney, Barrow Rangers and Thomastown who were also given a strong chance. Added to the list was the form of an experienced Graiguenamanagh side just down from the Intermediate Grade whilst the strength of the sides from the well populated senior and intermediate clubs was an unknown factor.

In the Junior League programme there were many surprises as Cloneen the relegation finalists the previous year made great progress to top their division. Having also faced the drop Slieverue had worked their way off the bottom of the table in their group.

On the first weekend in September as supporters across the county were enjoying the build up to the All Ireland final, the ten junior teams of the senior and intermediate clubs walked the championship plank of no return in search of a place in the next round. Elsewhere their colleagues in the junior only clubs got a three week reprieve to hone their preparations until after the all Ireland under twenty one final. Still in the running in this section on All Ireland final day were O'Loughlins, Dicksboro, Clara and Mooncoin as Dunnamaggin and Erin's Own after preliminary round wins were safe for another year and the Fenians had another day out in the relegation final. The penultimate and all Ireland football weekends in September saw shocks galore as Slieverue dispatched Graiguenamanagh to their relegation semi final place of the previous year. Elsewhere a minor backboned Bennettsbridge side eked out a single point win over champi-

onship favourites Piltown and Cloneen who had impressively headed their group went down to the Blacks and Whites. Others safely through were Lisdowney and Thomastown as the All Ireland senior final replay two weeks later resulted in the Richie Doyle tied Barrow Rangers and Galmoy tie being deferred. By the time it was played Thomastown and the Bridge had made the semi finals and O'Loughlins took the place for the senior and Intermediate clubs with a three point win over Clara. In the wings Lisdowney were successfully building their plans for the last semi final place as they awaited and then overcame Barrow Rangers who had accounted for Galmoy by three points.

In the semi finals played in the Park, Bennettsbridge recorded a win over an O'Loughlins side that created the best and greater number of goal scoring chances by 0-17 to 2-8 on the day. In the second semi final Thomastown after a slow start eventually overcame their fellow blue and white clad Lisdowney opponents by 2-14 to 1-16.

In the final, played as part of a treble-decker on a five game weekend in Nowlan Park, the gods of wind and weather played their part as Thomastown benefited from their physical strength and experience to record a 3-13 to 0-10 victory over the very young Bennettsbridge side. After winning the minor "A" title following a replay against the same opposition just a year before, their well deserved arrival in the final junior game may have been just a year too soon. Three Thomastown points in almost as many minutes was the ideal start. After Nickey Cleere opened the Bridge account ten minutes in, they reduced the lead to a single point when James Moran scored, before two John Joe Farrell goals saw Thomastown forge ahead. The goals followed good balls forward by Richard O'Hara and Michael Donnelly and set Thomastown in front 2-7 to 0-4 at the break. In the end the final result was reflected in the points from frees tally as the Barrowsiders 0-13 to 0-10 reflected the same difference in their 0-16

win over Kilmacow to annex their second county title on the trot in the grade.

All County League Title goes to Lisdowney

After holders, Mount Leinster Rangers, as Carlow senior hurling champions, went the whole way to glory to become the All Ireland Intermediate club Champions in Croke Park earlier in the year, the competition started back at grass roots with twenty teams in four groups lining up. The mid March pre-championship start has moved the competition firmly to be our second most important junior competition.

With no team winning all of their league ties, Piltown and O'Loughlins, who each played a draw in their respective groups, were the trail-blazers. In the semi's, they were joined by surprise packets Clara and Dicksboro along with Kilmacow, Galmoy, Barrow Rangers and the holders, Mount Leinster Rangers.

In the quarter finals, Galmoy surprised Piltown whilst Lisdowney beat O'Loughlins at home 2-19 to 3-14. They were joined for the semi finals by the holders, and Kilmacow who beat Clara and Erin's Own respectively. Entering the final quarter, the Southern selection remained 1-10 to 0-8 and still in control. selector and Club chairman in Piltown he was actively involved as his club won two junior hurl-

ing, a junior football, and two intermediate football titles. A football advocator at club and county level for over a generation he was a senior selector with Kilkenny. To that job he brought with him the experience of playing with his native Scartaglen and the six-club Senior divisional side-then called Castleisland-and now St Kieran's in the Kerry Championships. In his role as Southern board chairman he added to the promotion of the games by ensuring the culmination of all junior grades and having reviews and previews published. Following the amalgamation of the Northern and Southern boards main competittion, the junior championship, under the All County banner, and the synchronization of fixture dates under the County Fixtures committee, overall coverage of the junior grades has suffered, rendering it necessary for both boards to combine their resources, experience and personnel in order to redress the situation. The added responsibility of organizing the County intermediate side would give the body an intercounty aspect and outlet whilst providing many players with the opportunity of wearing a county jersey for their club.

Looking around the scene

With Thomastown having accounted for Lusmagh and Wexford's Naomh Eanna in recent weeks, hopes are high that they may continue on the same trail of success. The new season sees John Lockes return from the Intermediate grade to replace the Noresiders, while Mullinavat join the top junior grade. Across the hurling world, Carlow's participation in the McCarthy Cup has been widely welcomed. Nonetheless, when it comes to the local scene, it is surviving, participating, local rivalries, winning promotion and avoiding relegation through the Junior, Junior "A" and "B" grades, that matters most. With every club in the county losing players to emigration a new challenge faces all involved in the promotion and organization of the games. In such times of so many games being played, the efforts of many club officials including Gerry Drennan, Dan Kenny and Barry Henriques and his loyal bunch of contacts in getting match reports published in both the press and on the county website is to be lauded. To all players and committee members involved on the club and fixtures committees, gatemen, pitch caretakers, referees, linemen, umpires, scoreboard operators, first aider's, media outlets and PRO's etc, who arrange, support and keep the fourteen Junior championship, league and Cup competitions on the road, a word of sincere thanks is ex-



1954 - The New Departure

Extract of Dermot Kavanagh's contribution to a Hurling Discussion Evening organized by St Senans G A A Club held in Kilmacow in February. The other speakers were P M O'Sullivan, Eddie Keher, Enda McEvoy and Willie O'Connor.

For the purposes of this evenings discussion I propose to divide the life of Kilkennys hurling story into two parts– pre 1954 and post 1954

The basis for this division is that in 1954 the County Board introduced the Parish Rule for the senior hurling championship. This move had, to my mind, more far-reaching positive consequences for the well-being of Kilkenny hurling than any other rule introduced by the Board throughout the previous decades.

Pre -1954 Kilkenny had won-

13 senior All-Ireland titles.

32 Leinster senior titles, and

1 National League.

Post -1954 Kilkenny have won-

21 senior All-Ireland titles,

36 Leinster titles, and

14 National Leagues.

Clearly the above statistics refer solely to senior hurling. However the fallout from those post-1954 successes have filtered down to the other grades where Kilkenny have been equally successful. Pre-1954 Kilkenny had won four minor All-Ireland titles. Since then a further 16 titles have been added.

The 1930s were bountiful years for Kilkenny. Four senior All-Irelands, seven Leinsters and one National League were hoovered up between 1932 and 1939. Suddenly the well of success dried up with a mere solitary All-Ireland title being added between 1940 and 1954. In that time span four All-Ireland finals, two semi-finals and three National League finals were lost. From 1947 onwards Kilkenny were finding it difficult to even win a Leinster title.

Amongst the many theories being ventilated for this alarming drop in standard were the several inexplicable selections made on the eve of important games where regular players were dropped, being replaced by inferior players, and sometimes by players who had to come out of retirement to play Club politics were alive and well. However, the problem was closer to home

An examination of how the County Board ran their affairs might shed some light. During that 1940 –1954 period, of the six championships being run by the Board, only the senior hurling was ever consistently completed in its correct calendar year. Of the 14 junior championships played, only six were completed on time, while, in minor, hurling seven were completed on schedule. It is worth noting that during those years there was no intermediate, U 21 or the other myriad junior grades that exist at present.

Clearly something was very amiss both on and off the field during those years. One wonders if hurling had then received serious competition from soccer, rugby, athletics or even gaelic football would it ever have attained the lofty height within the county that it enjoys today.

At the end of the 1940s and early 1950s all of Kilkennys main rivals were consolidating their respective position amongst hurlings elite. For example, Tipperary, Cork and Wexford would share all the All-Ireland titles between 1949 and 1956. Curiously, when Leinster won the 1954 Railway Cup, the team contained nine Kilkenny players. Yet within a few months of that win Kilkenny suffered heavy defeats from Tipperary and Wexford in the National League final and Leinster semi-final respectively.

Hurling within the county had lost its soul. The junior championship was strangled of its best performers by the free movement of the players to the senior clubs. An example would be that of my own club, The Rower, who won the junior championship in 1944, yet, within 12 months, seven of their better players had moved to senior clubs. It would take the club another twelve years before even a southern final was contested. Another example is that of 1947 All-Ireland winning captain Dan Kennedy who won three senior county titles with three separate clubs within a period of seven years.

The irony of the situation was that during those fallow years Kilkenny were served by some of the most committed officials ever to have held office. No one complained. It was simply just how things were.

Mercifully a small beacon of light eventually permeated the corridors of Nowlan Park. In 1953 a Three Parish Rule was introduced. It was difficult to administer, leading to many misunderstandings and objections. Nonetheless it was a start.

The following year the strict Parish Rule was introduced.

That it has remained in situ ever since, says all. The soul of

hurling was returned to where it could best prosper ie, the

parish clubs. One of the immediate benefits of the rule change was that the junior championship, where ¾ of the adult players performed was immediately elevated in status. Players who had earlier performed at All Ireland, inter-provincial and inter-county level were now performing with their parish teams at remote rural venues before passionate supporters. The promotional benefits of their presence at such venues was incalculable. Naturally the standard of play improved. Within three years seven players from junior clubs were on duty when Kilkenny won the 1957 All-Ireland senior title.

The senior championship also benefited. It became more democratic, with most clubs now having a realistic chance of winning the title. New parish clubs emerged, clubs who could progress, confident in the knowledge that their best players would remain with them. St Lachtains, for example, emerged from obscurity to win the Junior championship in 1959, which they followed up with senior title wins in 1961 and 1963. Later on The Fenians, The Rower/Inistioge, Glenmore, Ballyhale Shamrocks, and St Martins emerged as senior title winners On the other side of the page, clubs who had previously depended on the free movement of players were no longer competitive and in some cases ultimately went out of existence, Éire Óg would be an example, while clubs such as Carrickshock and Dicksboro found it difficult prosper when their hitherto player supply line was extinguished.


From 1954 the Parish Rule system has remained on the books. Its now the bedrock of the entire Kilkenny club structure It is arguable that the only other county with a club structure, that so suits its particular needs is Kerry. It is no coincidence that both counties now top their respective Rolls of Honour. Over time extra grades were introduced, but, with the exception of 1961, no intrusion on the system were made. When one considers that players operating at the lowest level of adult hurling, Junior B, will play at least twelve competitive games each year speaks volumes for the broad canvas of the present club structure.

That the respective county teams have benefited from the Parish Rule system is without question as the table of titles won demonstrates. In addition to the 20 senior All-Ireland titles, 36 Leinster titles and 13 National Leagues won since 1954, Kilkenny now head the minor Roll of Honour (20 titles) and share the U21 list with Cork. Kilkenny are always competitive at Intermediate level, while Kilkenny clubs are serial winners of the various club championships. Even the occasional drought which the senior team have endured from time to time has been minor compared to Corks 12 year gap, in the 1950s and 1960s, or Tipperarys 18 year divide in the 1970s and 1980s.

What was the spark that lit the flame that has ignited the Kilkenny juggernaut? Was it the establishment of the U 14 championship in 1940 and the U16 championship in 1951? Was it the emergence of Ollie Walsh as a hurling force of nature in 1956? Or was it the emergence as team coach of Fr Tommie Maher in 1957? Perhaps it was the appointment of County Board Executives with the vision to be imaginative and ambitious, and not be tied down with suffocating tradition and/or club self interest? It was all of these and more. But to this observer the more was the introduction of the Parish Rule in 1954 that jolted the county out of its slumber and comfort zone, and paved the way for the above mentioned innovations to bear the fruit that is now in evidence in every parish in the county. The evidence is compelling.

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
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ST KIERANS

Senior Hurling

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
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
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
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Junior Camogie





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
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DOUBLE BY-PASS FOR THE INTERMEDIATES

The All Ireland Intermediate Hurling Championship 2012 was another exciting affair. After the disappointing defeat of losing to Clare in last year's final, Kilkenny were out to atone for that loss. After the legacy created by Pat Hoban, it would be a major incentive for new manager Pat O'Grady and his backroom team to bring back the Michael Cusack Cup in their first year in charge. The intermediate panel successfully defended their Leinster title by defeating Wexford, then beating Galway in the semi finals before making a gallant effort only to fall short against a formidable Tipperary team. Some individual players did their inter-county ambitions a power of good which was translated onto the U-21 and senior teams during 2012 none more so than in the guise of Walter Walsh. This provides hope for the future of Kilkenny hurling. Kilkenny's first game would be against the Slaneysiders in the Leinster final in Wexford Park on June 27th.

Pat O'Grady's side made a strong start; they rallied from an early scare and then clicked into gear as they accelerated away from their rivals. It was a solid display, with a strong defence merging well with sharp-shooting forwards.

The power of the six attackers really shone through at the start of the second half, as two lightning goals in quick succession left the Cats with one hand on the trophy.

Captain Robbie Walsh grabbed the first, with Lisdowney's Rory Hickey adding the second from close range to leave the Noresiders handsomely ahead with little over 20 minutes to play (3-13 to 1-9).

Exchanges were a little closer at the beginning of the game, but the winners were still sharp from the off. Opening points from Niall Walsh, Paul Murphy and Walter Walsh meant Kilkenny were swiftly out of the blocks, but a Padge Doran goal gave the Wexford crowd reason to cheer. Kilkenny's response was swift, Walter Walsh flicking a booming Pat Hartley free past goalkeeper Noel Carton.

Kilkenny pressed on after that, adding a flurry of points through Rory Hickey, Cathal Kenny, Walter Walsh and Paul Murphy. Tommy Dwyer led the Wexford charge but they were left chasing shadows as the Cats speedily worked the sliotar around the field to create scoring chances. Wexford did rattle off some points in the closing stages, Doran grabbing the last of those, but they trailed by four at the break (1-12 to 1-8).

That early brace of second half goals killed off Wexford's hopes. Kilkenny were becoming somewhat lethargic, but continued to pop over points to stay that bit further in front. Wexford had closed the gap to eight by the three-quarters stage, but Rory Hickey, Ger Aylward and Niall Walsh saw them move back into double figures. Tommy Dwyer did swell the Wexford tally when he booted the sliotar to the net in the closing stages, but it couldn't prevent Kilkenny from securing their fifth Leinster intermediate title in a row.

Kilkenny had to endure a seven week break before playing Galway in the All Ireland semi-final in Tullamore on August 18th. Maestro Rory Hickey put in a five star performance with free taking by over 13 placed balls as the Cats convincingly marched on to a final appearance against Tipperary.

Precious little had separated them during the opening 30 minutes where they were deadlocked on four occasions, including at the interval, 0-10 to 1-7.

Former senior star Niall Healy and his 1-8 contribution would have caught the eye of senior boss Anthony Cunningham. But the remaining Galway forward threat was snuffed out by the unwavering defending of Kilkenny with Brian Kennedy, Mark Phelan and Alan Walsh being exceptional.

Kilkenny introduced Michael Malone and Luke Harney and the subs made a big impact. Malone's 47th minute point that made it 0-17 to 1-10 marked the beginning of the Cats' surge for the finishing line.

Two Healy points gave Galway a glimmer of hope. However over the final five minutes dominant Kilkenny with scores from JJ Farrell, Hickey (2 frees) and Paul Murphy sealed their fate. Full time Kilkenny 0-21 Galway 1-13.

With an All Ireland place now firmly secured, the cats were pitted



against their old foes Tipperary in Semple Stadium on 1st September.

It was Kilkenny who started brightly and led by 0-4 to 0-2 with nine minutes on the clock. But they didn't score again for the next 13 minutes while their opponents established the lead which was to win the game. Michael Heffernan registered Tipperary's first goal in the ninth minute followed by David Butler nine minutes later by which stage the wind-assisted Premier were in complete control. Their third followed in the 25th minute, finished by Kieran Morris. This potent full forward line thrived on a regular supply of ball and all three had registered 1-2 each by half time.

Kilkenny did have a couple of chances in first half stoppage time but Ger Aylward and Rory Hickey were kept out by the resolute James Logue. The score board at the interval read Tipperary 3-9 Kilkenny 0-6

But Kilkenny to their credit won the second half by 1-11 to 0-4, scoring 1-7 without reply and reducing the deficit to a single point with nine minutes left on the clock. James was Tipp's hero by making some fine saves including a penalty by was beaten when Kilkenny substitute Geoff Brennan's long range delivery went all the way to the Tipperary net in the 42nd minute. This goal gave the black and amber real hope as they went close to a great comeback.

However the Cats had left themselves too much to do and Tipp ran out victorious on a score of 3-13 to 1-17. Bear in mind that this was Kilkenny's second successive final defeat it should be mentioned that Tipperary, with home advantage, started with thirteen senior club players while Kilkenny picked from junior and intermediate clubs only.

Sincere thanks to the management and the players for their dedication throughout the year and let us hope their continuous hard work will bear fruition next year with the Michael Cusack firmly in their grasp in 2013.

All Ireland U21H Championship Report by Jimmy Walsh

Planning for the under twenty one campaign to regain the Cross of Cashel Cup commenced in early November with the County Board's appointment of Richie Mulrooney as the side's new manager with Adrian Finan and Brian Ryan as his selectors. Their aim was to build a team to bridge the gap to the last national title in 2008. To do so, a home gameagainst Wexford, who recorded a last-minute victory in Wexford Park in 2011, was to be the first serious hurdle.

As in recent years, the U21's, under the new management team, backboned the county's Senior Development Squad in the Walsh Cup when they played NUI of Galway in the first round in Freshford. Starting with newly promoted senior squad members Cillian Buckley and William Phelan, the team took the lead for the first time seven minutes from the end as they recorded a narrow 0-13 to 0-12 win. Amongst the NUI players, who made his mark on the scoresheet and who would become a familiar opponent later in the year, was Galway's Niall Burke. A week later in Castlecomer the side which had been further strengthened by members of the Kilkenny Teachers team played Westmeath in the semi-final. Kilkenny led comfortably early on before a Westmeath rally was counteracted. On the day, John Power again topped the scoring list as the local side ran out 1-23 to 1-16 winners. Their achievement marked the end of the development squad's efforts as the full senior panel travelled to Salthill for the final. Here they recorded a fine 2-20 to 1-14 win over Galway to collect their eighteenth Walsh Cup.

Building a squad

In the ongoing preparation of the squad, a series of challenge/trial games took place against Tipperary in Gortnahoe, and in Ballyragget against Waterford, and also against four of the senior clubs in the county. Of the competing counties, Galway, the dominant minor team of 2009, appeared the main threat. However, locally the word was out that a firm marker had been set by Clare in the game in Templetouhy for all teams seeking the ultimate championship prize. As the season developed, the squad's progress was paralled with the ongoing involvement of many of the players with both intermediate and senior county sides.

Wexford visit Nowlan Park for first round

In Kilkenny's opening Bord Gais championship tie they faced a Wexford side in Nowlan Park that was fresh from a win over Offaly and looking for a third Leinster final appearance in a row. Somewhat


wary of the opposition after their experience in Wexford Park a year earlier, a slow and worrying start saw the home side 1-4 to 0-1 behind after just ten minutes. However, with Richie Doyle and Padraig Walsh now showing their experience from their presence on the senior panel, the side took over the game to win comfortably. The amazing turn around was started by man-of-the-match Walter Walsh with Kevin Kelly, John Power, Ger Aylward and Martin Gaffney leading a fluent scoring attack. The latter stages saw Wexford finish with two goals in a late rally that left the scoreboard reading 3-20 to 4-6 in Kilkenny's favour at the final whistle.

Laois make rare appearance in Leinster Final

The result set Kilkenny up for a unique final with a Laois side that had to battle all the way to overcome a stiff Carlow challenge in the other semi-final. For this game Kilkenny conceded home advantage and travelled to O'Moore Park, Portlaoise for the home side's first final since their title winning appearance in 1983. On a damp evening the game attracted a huge following as early arrivals were able to browse through a scene-setting full colour match programme that filled in the gaps of the sides' progress since they last met at final level twenty two years earlier. In the game Kilkenny took the initiative from the throw in and, with the start Laois would have required, led 1-4 to no score within four minutes. After John Power became the sixth Kilkenny forward to score when he added the sides second goal after fifteen minutes, his side went on to lead 3-14 to 0-6 at the break. On the restart, Laois who had surprised many pundits by beating the Provincial title holders Dublin in the quarterfinal by 2-15 to 0-17, were more competitive and there was little separating both sides' second half tally. In this half, both goalkeepers- Kilkenny's Dylan Walsh and Eoin Fleming the Laois net minder-were called upon to make excellent saves as both sides gave their full substitutes list a run. The win saw Kilkenny collect take their first Leinster title in three years on a 4-24 to 1-13 scoreline.

Senior final preview against Galway in Semi Final

In the semi-final Kilkenny faced a favored Galway side now trained by senior helmsman Anthony Cunningham. With five senior players in their ranks and another dozen in the senior panel the sides met in Thurles just two weeks before both counties' All Ireland senior final clash in Croke Park. After a flying start to the game, Galway led by 0-6 to 0-3 at an early stage. Approaching the quarter way

stage, the old adage of goals winning games proved crucial as Kilkenny hit three, to lead by 3-9 to 0-11. Their arrival after confident classy spells of play from Ollie Walsh, John Power and Ger Aylward gave Kilkenny a well earned breathing zone at the break... On the restart John Powers's penalty strike extended the lead to ten points. Looking good for victory at the three quarter way stage, two Galway goals from Davy Glennon and Joseph Cooney that were followed by a series of points had the lead whittled down to three with just five minutes to go. However a strong belief and steady hand saw Kilkenny add four unanswered points to record a final place on the high scoring tally of Kilkenny 4-16 Galway 2-15

Clare provide opposition in final under lights

This result scheduled a return visit to Thurles for a Bord Gáis Energy All-Ireland U21 final clash against Clare in a game that was to be played under lights. In the interim the following week's games rewrote hurling history books with the first All Ireland Senior final replay since 1959. As Kilkenny's dual players had unexpected new commitments Clare's preparations continued as the All Ireland minor champions of 2010 studied how their U21's collecting their first ever title in the grade with a win over Kilkenny in 2009. Buoyed by the last minute injury time goal win against Tipperary in the Munster final that helped erase the memories of the disappointment of 2008, the Clare side, having appeared in four of the past five provincial finals, had the added experience of eight senior players on board. With Kilkenny having disposed of championship favorites Galway, and Clare having easily accounting for Antrim, the scene was set as almost ten thousand people attended to view the game

Against the wind the Kilkenny opened with a Kevin Kelly pointed free but, facing a combination of speed and top class touches, found themselves 1-5 to 0-2 behind when Cathal O'Connell goaled after just seven minutes. Into the second quarter after Kilkenny found their touch the score was reduced in points to three with as many minutes left in the half. With time running out the regularly high-scoring forwards struck a rich vein when John Power, having been fouled, goaled the resultant penalty while Ger Aylward struck another in injury time to elate home fans with an unexpected 2-7 to 1-7 half time lead.

However the Clare hunger was re-ignited after the visit to the dressing rooms and they were a point up (1-11 to 2-7) after eight minutes. Kilkenny had to wait twelve minutes of the new half for their first score, while Clare's hunger, pace and excellent skill factor had delivered seven in total. With Clare 2-14 to 2-8 ahead, a Kilkenny revival was briefly threatened before a goal chance was cleared. From there to the end both sides tacked on three points apiece as Clare finished stronger to take the title on a 2-17 to 2-11 scoreline.

AN ALL-TOO-SHORT-SEASON

ESB All-Ireland Minor Hurling Championship 2012 By Conor Brennan

The Kilkenny minor hurlers experienced a disappointing and without doubt, an all too short season in their quest to achieve honours for 2012 as they came unstuck in their only championship game of the year. Effort, honesty and determination were in full supply throughout the panel assembled by team manager Adrian Ronan and his backroom team of Br. Damien Brennan, Barry Power, Thomas Mullally and Niall Lacey. But good fortune, together with an ability to combine all the elements to succeed on the big day, eluded the Kilkenny men when they lined up to face the challenge of an ambitious Dublin side in the opening round of the Leinster Minor hurling championship.

The two sides met on a wet and windy evening as the curtain raiser to their senior counterparts in O'Moore Park, Portlaoise on June 23rd. Reports were that preparations had gone very well for Kilkenny, and players and management were optimistic of gaining revenge on the Metropolitans, who defeated Kilkenny in last year's Leinster Final. But when it came to the crunch, Dublin's more physical stature and robust style of play was far more suited to the softer conditions. That said, Kilkenny did have their moments during the game, particular in the second half when only two points separated the sides. But the fact that free-taker Conor Martin was the only Kilkenny player to raise a flag in the opening half tells its own story about the overall Kilkenny performance. Dublin led by 1-5 to 0-4 at the half-time break, their goal coming from corner-forward Paul Winters after Kilkenny had started brightly, scoring the opening three points of the game, all from Conor Martin, without a Dublin reply. Indeed, the same player could have managed more than that had he goaled an early Kilkenny penalty following a foul on corner-forward Shane Don-

nelly. But his shot was diverted for a 65 which he subsequently

'in the game's momentum, allowing Dublin to hold that four point lead at the interval. But even still, Kilkenny should have been entitled to feel confident with the breeze at their backs going into the second half.

As stated earlier, that confidence looked justified at the deficit was

reduced to two points early in the half thanks to a well-taken point from substitute David Bourke. Dublin were fortunate, however, to have a number of players like Cormac Costelloe and Sean McClelland who had vital experience already at this level. This meant that Dublin continued to be assured in their play while naivety and panic was consequently affecting the Kilkenny performance.

The final minutes of the game, while exciting until the end, were played out with the sense of foreboding for the Kilkenny men. As one would expect, there was effort and persistence in abundance, but calmness and assuredness were sadly lacking in the face of adversity. Dublin were able to hold the Kilkenny charge at bay, advancing on a 1-10 to 0-9 score line.

The key message that Kilkenny's minor vintage of 2012 must now bring forward into the future is that they should continue to take the positive aspects of what would be initially perceived as a disappointing season and make them a basis for developing into being the best hurlers they can possibly be for both club and ultimately the county also.



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

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"Not the Finished Article"

Miles to go before he sleeps, and all that. Still, for the moment, let's hear it for the boy....

(The following article appeared in the Sunday tribune on the last day of the year 2000. It was the first interview that Henry ever gave and is reproduced here in view of Henry's remarkable progression since those early days.)

Every day between Easter and the summer holidays the routine was the same. The bell rang at 3.00pm in Ballyhale National School, the children galloped off and Joe Dunphy stayed behind for 20 minutes or so to take care of the bits and bobs the way prin-

cipals do. The tableau in the Shamrocks' field never varied as Dunphy drove past on his way to Thomastown – a pair of junior goalposts, a pair of small boys hurling each other between them. Defending one minute, attacking the next, keeping goal the minute after that. Henry and his younger brother Paul had already been home, jettisoned their schoolbags and headed straight for the hurling field and the heartbeat of their existence.

Was there ever an afternoon that Dunphy slowed down, paused, eagle-eyed the wristwork of the chap with the red hair and visualised him weaving spells in Croke Park years later? It is easy to imagine so. After all, Dunphy, who retired last month after 38 years at Ballyhale, knows a good one when he sees one, having had two All Ireland winning captains as pupils. Liam and Ger Fennelly were gifted hurlers; Henry Shefflin, Dunphy has long suspected, might turn out to be more gifted still.

When he wasn't hurling his younger brother, Henry was watching his older brothers. The routine on Sundays didn't vary much either. Somebody would be detailed to mind the family pub, and then the rest of the junior Shefflins – four boys, three girls – would pile into their dad's Toyota and strike out for new lands. To Walsh Park and Portlaoise to see Tommy, the eldest brother, win All Ireland colleges' and under 21 medals. To Semple Stadium to see John, the next boy, pick up an All Ireland minor medal. To Croke Park on St Patrick's Day to see Ballyhale Shamrocks beat Ballybrown in the All Ireland club final. A luminous childhood in a fanatical GAA household.

Time moved on. Henry Shefflin moved and grew with it. Five years in St Kieran's brought him and All Ireland colleges' medal. Third-level life in Waterford IT introduced him to the Fitzgibbon Cup testing ground. Come the spring of 1999, Brian Cody didn't have much to think twice about making the 20-year-old Shefflin one of the planks of his new black and amber vision. In truth, he barely had to think once.

The Antithesis of the capgun forwards the county had been churning out with such abandon throughout the 1990s, here at last was a Kilkenny attacker who was physically capable of displacing water. But there was more to Shefflin – another big, red-haired side of south Kilkenny beef – than the obvious Christy Heffernan comparison suggested. Infinitely more.

Shefflin was not a target man. He was a touch player built like a target man. "Henry's pure hurling ability is something that not enough people comment on," DJ Carey argues. "His size is a

great asset, for the team as well as for himself. But his skill is the first thing." If Shefflin's touch is strikingly delicate for a big man, Cody adds, it's partly because he "puts an awful lot of work" into it.

He works equally hard on his frees. Always has. Ten years ago, a Kilkenny minor selector who called to Shefflin's to check on John's well-being found him out pucking with Paul. Henry was down the other end of the field, busy practising his frees. From both sides of the field. At the age of 11.

Coming in cold to take over the frees from Carey – and in the process taking the weight of John's Bridge off the Gowran man's back – proved no bother to Shefflin, then. His intercounty debut season yielded a Leinster medal, an All Ireland appearance and a raft of nominations for this and that. But how would he cope with the "difficult" second album?

When Tom Williams decides to start keeping your scoring statistics, you can take it you have arrived. Williams is a Wexfordman and a historian and an author and a poet and a songwriter and a hurling obsessive. Often Williams manages to combine his passions, as he did when he wrote 'With Heart and Hand', the story of his county's 1996 McCarthy Cup triumph. And when he's not writing, he goes in for hurling statistics.

Stats, for example, on every Wexfordman who's scored in the championship, from the 21-a-side era to the present. Nicky Rackard? A total of 59 goals and 89 points, of which 43-51 came from play, in 35 outings. Tony Doran? Forty-two goals and 56 points, all from play, in 40 appearances.

Occasionally a promising outsider is allowed to enter the hallowed halls. One such youth is Henry Shefflin. Eight championship outings to date, 3-18 from play, and 28 points from frees, an average of 3.38 points from play per game. Higher than DJ Carey's average of 2.95 per game, Williams notes.


Whether Shefflin goes on to become one of hurling's all-time greats is a matter for debate. Whether he goes on to become one of hurling's all-time great scorers is not, Williams believes. "Henry has everything except speed. If he had he'd be another Mick Mackey. But yeah, the way he's going he's shaping up to be one of the leading scorers ever."

A scorer of great scores, at any rate. Rewind to some of Shefflin's points in the millennium championship. The one over his shoulder into the Canal End against Galway, the one when falling while on the run in the opening minutes of the All Ireland final. And, approaching half-time in the same game, a gorgeous touch with hurley aloft to kill a delivery from Canice Brennan and deposit the sliotar into Carey's waiting paw for a collector's item of a point. "His role in that point," says Carey, "took something that, again wouldn't comment on with Henry. 'Vision'. He had to keep his eye on the ball but he also knew where I was."

Not that Shefflin was Dead Eye Dick on every occasion. He botched badly in the Leinster final when Charlie Carter tossed the sliotar across the face of the Offaly goalmouth – "Unusual of Charlie to do that," he offers – and Shefflin, unmarked on the far corner of the small square, took a big wind-up and smashed the ball harmlessly into the ground of feet away. A worse miss followed against Galway; he still can't explain it. "I went to rise it first, missed, decided to pull. I honestly don't know what happened." In declaring that Shefflin still has edges requiring planning, manager Cody isn't peddling propaganda.

Then there's the perceived lack of pace. "That's true alright probably" Shefflin nods. "I know it's true, actually. I've just a big lanky stride. Simon Whelehan, Michael Kavanagh, Noel Hickey – they're all much faster. I spend half my time trying to put my backside in the way. Fighting to win back the ball, harassing the opposition defenders, is something the Kilkenny forwards did better this year. Defending starts from number 15, Brian Cody said. I was 15."

Cody he places up there beside Joe Dunphy in his Biggest Influences drawer. Cody's earnest manner, his decency, his ability to empathise. "Brian will take you to one side if things are going

wrong and will tell you what to do. But he'll always encourage you at the same time; tell you you're very good. He and the selectors did everything right this year. We had a couple of meetings early on, another when we went away for a weekend in Clare before the All Ireland semi-final. We had only one aim. They made sure we kept our eye on the ball."

An All Ireland medallist and an All Star at the age of 21 – so far so good. Shefflin is too young to think of the years ahead, to fret about how will Kilkenny will cope when John Power and DJ Carey – "They'll be irreplaceable" – depart, to worry about the day he himself will be forced to carry the load. All he's sure of his that when he finishes up, he'll be thrilled to be able to look back and say he hurled with the men he did. "A fierce honour."

The new season? He talks of getting down to hard training once Kilkenny return from holidays in Thailand next month, of the need to show the same hunger they did in 2000, of the danger he feels Tipperary in particular ("Eamon Corcoran, Eoin Kelly, a coming young team") will pose. The rub of the green will not be Kilkenny's ally forever he knows.

"Some of the breaks we got this year were very lucky. Like my goal in the All Ireland final – nine times out of 10, that wouldn't happen. I didn't even know where the ball was, it just fell into my hand

"It was our year, and when it's your year you get breaks like those. We won't get them again."

The last word to Cody. "Henry is an outstanding trainer. He's anxious to improve all the time and doesn't have any illusions about himself – which is how trains. He's not the finished article, won't be for some time and realises this."

Miles to go before he sleeps, and all that. Still, for the moment, let's hear it for the boy.

A Great Friend of Kilkenny GAA Yearbook talks to

Barrie Henriques

This Yearbook Publication established a link with one of Ireland's great Sports photographers (Ray Mc Manus) back in the last century, and it has never been severed to this present day. Well I remember the first day, when as a fledgling Yearbook greenhorn, I was despatched to Dublin to see if the bloke that did the photography for the Carrolls All Star poster might be able to contribute to our first Kilkenny County Board Yearbook in 1990. We met in a dingy, basement premises in Denmark Street, on the corner of Great George's Street.

That first meeting was nerve wracking for me, because this

particular photographer was a rale Dub, with an acerbic Dublin wit, that was foreign to us culchies.

At the time I felt that an interpreter was needed!

We became very familiar later on, and very good friends (I think), but that first meeting was testing.

The Kilkenny GAA Yearbook had found Ray McManus, and by extension the Sportsfile organisation.

Our Yearbook is still a must-have publication, making the bookshelves in advance of Christmas. Central to its continued progress along the road of excellence is the contribution made by great photographers, chief among them Ray McManus, and his Sportsfile team.

But Ray McManus was not born a photographer.

Born in Harolds Cross, his academic progress through the nuns in North William Street, the CBS in O'Connell Schools to North Brunswick Street was less than remarkable.

Leaving school after a failed Inter Cert, he learned the rudiments of marketing and selling from a man by the name of Ted Maguire. He won money on a greyhound in Harolds Cross, bought a camera for $\pounds 50$, and started taking a few pictures with his new Zenith E camera. He was still in gainful employment, and his picture taking was very much a hobby.

Then the day job went AWOL, so Mac was on the dole.

"I started going to matches, not predominantly Gaelic matches, and with plenty of bluff and spoof, I would get a few shots off. I met with, and eventually formed a partnership with the late Jim O'Kelly. He could take a better picture than me, but I could sell a picture better than him. It was an ideal marriage of two talents".

They realised that there was a particular niche in the market that they could lucratively explore. They saw that the pictorial coverage of games was dated to the extent of embarrassment. Library pictures of players were never updated. McManus and O'Kelly created the need of current pictures, and went about servicing that need. - the golden rule of good salesmanship. They took the pictures, developed them in their chemical solutions, and promptly brought them to various newspapers where they were left in the respective libraries. A new Sports Publication, Sports World Weekly came on stream. That provided a solid grounding

for the McManus/O'Kelly linkup.

"Fergal Herbert's publication was way ahead of its time. It was progressive, colourful, very current in every respect. It was a great pity it didn't last", he told us.

"We didn't make a lot of money through the Monday-after papers", he said, " but we fared far better on the week prior to the games, because our pictures were current. We did a bit of work for some English papers who were trying to break into the market here. They were great, as you had your money promptly, and it was all sterling, so instead of getting a tenner for our picture, we were getting twelve pound fifty".

He worked long hours, doing work for all papers. Jim O'Kelly left the partnership to explore other avenues of excellence. Mc-Manus moved from Denmark Street.

His new establishment on the South Circular Road, close to Portobello Bridge, and close to his roots in Harolds Cross, is a product of Ray McManus' ingenuity, and forward planning.

Though he is the proprietor of Sportsfile, with his lovely wife Ann, a Clare woman of great charm and fáilte, he regards all of his staff as colleagues. The American model of Management is of no interest. He is not into the culture of high fives, or backslapping.

"If one of the lads called me Mr. McManus, I'd nearly sack him", he stated.

Sportsfile employs nine photographers, and six support staff. The photographers are all equipped with the finest technology on the Planet. A camera costs €5000, while the lens would cost double that

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
That is the McManus philosophy.

"There is no room for "if only" in this job. You have to deal with what you see at a moment in time. Unlike Television, we do not have the facility of action replay. We get it or die. No point in saying to me afterwards, "if I had this or that".... We provide the this or that, and that is why we must succeed, and produce the goods".

Which leads me on to Sportsfile on All Ireland day

"Tell me about your forward planning for an All Ireland Final?"

"We have a meeting on the Wednesday before the game here. I get a copy of the Clár an Lae. It is an all-hands-to-the-pumps job, and complacency has no room on the bus. No, we don't assign photographers to individuals. At our pre-final get together, we discuss potential developments, the movements of particular players, what they are likely to do if certain situations happen, based on a vast wealth of shared experience. We will have some eight photographers, and three remote controlled cameras inside Croke Park. We either get the shot or not. The only day in the year we know that Brian Cody will react is if

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Kilkenny win. We have got to get it. It's a tough day, but it is so well worth being part of it".

The Sportsfile team take in excess of 7,000 photographs on All Ireland Final day. They start sending back pictures (their own individual selections) to the well staffed Sportsfile world-wide distribution centre within ten minutes of the game starting. The people on the South Circular Road would probably have fifty chosen pictures with their customers by half time in the game, and it continues apace. Most of the work of selection, and processing is done before the photographers leave Croke Park.

He is a huge admirer of Brian Cody, and by reflection, the Kilkenny ethos.

"He strikes me as a man with a two colour concept of dealing with issues. It is either black or white with no grey area in between. They say that this team is the greatest team of all time. I wouldn't like to comment on that because I haven't seen every team, but I will say that it is not their winning record that impresses me, rather their consistency over a long period that is truly astonishing".

Ray McManus won second prize in the World Press sports photography competition recently. He took a picture in Anglesey Road at a rugby game between Old Belvedere and Blackrock.

"It was wet, dark and mucky, with mist falling and steam rising from the players. It was more like a painting, but more so a

Caravaggio than a Ray McManus", he smiled. He was chuffed to say the least.

Sportsfile's photographers are multi-talented. Like Matt Browne, who specialises in Rugby, and Golf, while he also covers Gaelic games, but McManus himself has a great grá for the Games. Brendan Moran does other specialist assignments, and so

Ray produces an Annual of GAA pictures, invariably not seen during the year. They

are his personal choice, with the minimum of descriptive text. If you really want to see Sportsfile GAA pictures, you will find A Season of Sundays in all bookshops this Christmas.

I have known Ray McManus since 1990. I'm delighted to be his friend, and like all the Yearbook team am extremely grateful to him and his team for their expertise and generosity.



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Pursuing a Different Dream

Dreams. It's a funny thing, but ask a Kilkenny man what their dream is and the majority would say it involved walking up the steps of the Hogan Stand in September. In fact, I imagine when watching Henry Shefflin climb up to collect his ninth All-ireland medal this year, every Kilkenny man in the stadium was dreaming it could be them.

But then again, there are some people who are born to pursue a different dream. For Darren O'Neill, an inter-county hurler up to under 21 level, it was easy to imagine him winning that coveted All-Ireland medal. And yet, despite not fulfilling that destiny, as he looked on in

that sacred ground just months ago, here sat a man at ease with himself. Because, for all Henry and co's achievements over the last 13 years, he has achieved something, they never will.

Anyone who watched the documentary "London calling" on RTE prior to this summer's Olympic Games, would have had whatever illusions they had about being an Olympian, brought into sharp perspective. Strip away two weeks of glamour every four years, and what you're left with is a resolutely lonely pursuit for athletes, one that demands outrageous personal sacrifices for, more often than not, very little reward.

And yet, despite these sacrifices, there are those who cannot possibly envisage living their lives any other way. Growing up as a young boy in Paulstown on the Carlow-Kilkenny border, it was "Always the dream" of Darren to become an Olympic boxer. And even though, he could hardly have picked a lonelier or more difficult ambition ("there is no hiding place in the ring" as he says himself) there was something about the nuances of the sport, that brought out the best in him.

Then again, it was hardly a surprise he took the route he did. If there is one thing sure about Darren O'Neill's career, it's that he didn't pick up his talent from the trees. In a sense, his story is not just about him, but of one overriding influence that has been ever-present throughout his career.

Ollie O'Neill, his father, and an ex international boxer himself, was a founding member of the Paulstown boxing club a number of years ago. He was the man who almost single-handedly built the club from a small coterie of people, to one which currently includes approximately a hundred members, hosts eight national champions, and was recently voted the second best boxing club in the country.

Given his background, it was inevitable that Darren would be attracted to the sport. But, despite his aptitude, there was another game tugging at his heart-strings in the interim. He was a star player on Barrow Rangers underage hurling teams throughout his youth, and won an All-Ireland college's medal with St Kieran's in 2004, alongside such luminaries as Richie Power, and the Hogan brothers.

But after stepping up to inter-county Under-21 level in 2006, fate started to force his hand. Like Katie Taylor, a women's international soccer player in her spare time, Darren's conundrum involved excelling at more than one sport. Given his geography, the choice may have appeared obvious. But he decided to take the road less travelled.

In one sense, he is not a pioneer. Kilkenny has always had its Olympians in the past. Adrian O'Dwyer competed in Athletics in 2004. Eileen O'Keeffe did likewise in 2008. Mick Dowling twice represented us in boxing in 1968 and 1972. But given the opportunity to play hurling for Kilkenny, rather than face the highly daunting world of international boxing, most people would not have batted an eyelid. But then again, Darren O'Neill, is not most people.

Ask him now if he's happy with the choice he's made and he's emphatic in his response. "I definitely do not regret the choice that I made. As a Kilkenny person I would obviously have loved to have played senior for Kilkenny but the Olympic Games were always my dream and something I will always treasure. Looking at the strength of our team anyway, there's nothing to say I would have made the current day squad"

If specialisation was a pre-requisite for his success, it didn't necessarily make it any easier. Fighting in the national Light heavyweight Final in 2005 and 2006, he found Olympic silver medallist Kenny Egan blocking his path. Then after stepping down a division to middleweight in 2008, he came undone against the equally accomplished, Olympic Bronze winner Darren Sutherland.

As it was, he found himself looking at that year's Olympic games in Beijing from the comfort of his girlfriends' home in County Galway. And even if his disappointment was still raw, the success of his colleagues made him proud, and more importantly, made him realise he wasn't far away.

With Darren Sutherland moving to the professional ranks following those games, the path to success for him became somewhat smoother, and he finally set about fulfilling his promise. February 2009 was a notable benchmark, as he captured his first senior title. Others were gleaned in 2010 and 2011. He also secured a silver medal in the European championships during that time. But it was October fourth of last year that dreams finally became reality. Defeating the Bulgarian Mladen Menev in a world championship qualifier in Azerbaijan meant he had finally achieved it, that life-long goal of becoming an Olympian.

As the first Irish boxer to qualify for the games, he was allotted special status within the group. Aside from his boxing capabilities, his natural leadership qualities resulted in

him being selected as captain for the team. As the competition progressed, and the level of success within the boxing team accumulated (four medals were eventually won, two bronze, one silver and Katie Taylor's gold) there was a desire to honour their achievement in the closing ceremony. As a result, Sonia O Sullivan asked him as Boxing team captain to carry the Irish flag, an experience he describes as "surreal".

If there was one fly in the ointment of such a life-changing period, it was his own performance in his second round fight against Sterfan Hartel of Germany. After comfortably disposing of the Nigerian Mudeen Akanji in his first bout, he found himself up against a stronger, defensively watertight opponent in the following tie, who opened up a precious lead in the first round, and never looked like relinquishing it. Even now, there is lingering disappointment.

"I allowed the German do what I expected him to. I allowed him to push me before punching which in turn gave the illusion he was landing scoring shots even in cases where he shouldn't have. All I can do is be content and proud that despite an under par performance I gave all I could at the time"

Before he qualified for London he had envisaged retiring from boxing, after the games. But now, after achieving that ambition, he realised what he thought was a full stop, was in fact just a comma. Right now, he couldn't consider quitting; "I'm enjoying it too much", but the road ahead is paved with stones. Considering the surge of young boxing talent in the country at the moment, just winning a National title is a herculean achievement in itself. Even still, he has designs on a fifth national title next February, and European and World Championships in Belarus and Kazahkstan respectively after that.

And through it all he hasn't stop dreaming. London was his ambition, but now there are other ones ahead. Belarus. Kazakhstan. Perhaps even Rio in four years. Maybe we're getting carried away. But it's strange. Before, all Kilkenny people ever dreamed of was Croke Park. Now, thanks to Darren, we're allowed to dream some more.

PM O'Sullivan talks to Pat Dwyer

He wrote the date on the hurl - July 15, 1988 - and put it away safe.

He thought that would be that as regards hurling for Kilkenny, a Junior All Ireland. Yes, a sweet one, beating Tipperary in the final. But he would not be eligible in the grade for 1989 and reckoned on being forgotten by the time 1990 rolled round.

As for Senior... "Never thought I was good enough to make it," he says, not a whit of false modesty, even though he is a remarkably modest individual.

Pat Dwyer, the man in question, walks into Carroll's Hotel, Knocktopher. He still has the natural athlete's spraddled walk, easily recognisable as the man who won two All Ireland medals at fullback in 1992 and '93, the same erect figure. Immediately Pat is warm and friendly. "Going along, you'll have to draw me," he counsels. "I wouldn't be great to remember everything."

Not at all. Bright, articulate and good-natured, an out and out gentleman, Pat Dwyer is an ideal interviewee, as precise with his descriptions as he was with his clearances. His story is heartening, the ascent of an unheralded hurler to the pinnacle of the game.

A native of Croan, a townland whose postal address is 'Dunna-maggin' but whose pulse is pure Carrickshock, Pat Dwyer went the classic route for someone of dairy farming stock. There was national school in nearby Newmarket, followed by five years as a boarder in St Kieran's College. Club front and school front were alike barren as regards trophies. "I suppose that's where my love of hurling started," Pat muses. "You had to have a passion for it to stay with it. It certainly wasn't for a love of winning…!"

Still, there were hints. Pat Dwyer played on goal as a 15 year old in the 1981 Intermediate Final, when Clara beat Carrickshock United. There was a year with Kilkenny at Minor in 1983, beaten first time out by Dublin, and a year with the U21s in 1986, beaten first time out by Wexford. "Lean times seemed to follow me around," he notes, likeably wry.

Hence his emphasis on 1983 for Carrickshock, winning U21 B in both football and hurling. "It was an important achievement at the time," he relates. "The club hadn't won anything since the Junior in 1979."

1988 proved the hinge. Just getting the beck from Ollie Walsh for Kilkenny's Junior panel was massive. "I'd never actually seen Ollie play," Pat says. "But we'd read the articles and seen the clips of old games on the television. And there you were, going in training under him... But he really made you feel at ease."

Warming to this theme, he elaborates: "Ollie had a fabulous gift. I've often said it to people, particularly about the Senior set up later on, where you had Eddie O'Connor and myself. You couldn't have two more contrasting people. Eddie would be the one that's very vocal, whereas I wouldn't be heard behind a newspaper. Yet Ollie could get on with both types of people. He was able to handle everybody, and to coax the best out of them."

Sterling performances during that campaign earned Pat a phonecall from then County Secretary Ted Carroll, inviting him onto the Senior panel for 1988-89. Diarmuid Healy, having succeeded Pat Henderson, was looking for an infusion of fresh talent. Dwyer was one needle.

He was impressed by the new manager's abilities: "Diarmuid was the first *coach* I came across, very *one on one*. The hooking and the flicking were probably two things I picked up or developed. I suppose, when I wasn't a physical player, you had to develop other skills to counteract the opponent. And you had to be able to *read* the other players as to what they were going to do."

Diarmuid Healy had a share of bad luck and was succeeded by Ollie Walsh in late 1990. Pat Dwyer, established as a full-back by this stage, was always going to be one of his lieutenants. Following searing disappointment against Tipperary in the 1991 All Ireland Final, it all came right the following September against Cork.

Pat speaks in that special tone about afterwards meeting his father and a paternal uncle, Fr Christy. "It was under the Lower Hogan," he says. "Again, neither of them were drinking men. They wouldn't be pub people. They were happy to go home to Croan. But they were just *elated*. It's family, that thing. They're the first you want to see. You needed the back up, of your family, particularly when you're in the farming game."

1993 against Galway was another watermark September day. Pat was hailed going off the field by Nicky Purcell, a County Board official from Kilmanagh, who said: "Do you realize you've now gone two full championships without conceding a free from full-back?" Pat smiles, makes it simple: "I looked at it in the sense that you're playing full-back, and the frees you're giving away are on the 21 yard line. So it's a score every time, if you concede a free."

A groin injury picked up in the 1993 Leinster Final replay had nearly prevented him from lining out against Galway. This factor hindered him during the two frustrating seasons that followed. Undeceived about himself to the last, Pat knew 1996 would be his last hurrah. Besides, the dynamic was changing and it was hard not to have Ollie Walsh in the dressingroom with them.

His death in March 1996 put all in perspective. Pat Dwyer was asked by the Walsh family to be part of the Offertory. "I consider that one of the highest honours I got," he says with feeling. His partner in that part of the funeral mass was Mick O'Flynn, the panel's immensely popular trainer. Pat is still grateful for the Cork native's input: "For those of us who struggled at training, he still coaxed along and got the best out of them. Every player had great time for Micko."

The end was nigh. Kilkenny's old enemy applied the axe in the Leinster semi-final. "The goal Wexford got that day, it was a long ball into Billy Byrne at full-forward," Pat recalls. "The previous year, three years before that, I'd have flicked the ball off his hurl before he could strike it. I knew then how slow I'd got, mentally, because the mind tells you what to do — and the mind wasn't able any longer to do it. That really nailed it for me, that I was gone way too slow for the intercounty game." The man departed, as he had played, without fuss or noise, never a bad word said about him.

That hurl Pat put away in the summer of 1988, unsure of himself? He laughs hard: "It's after disintegrating a bit, but I never used it after. It's still there, anyway. I put it into retirement...!" Memories of what Pat Dwyer did with all his hurls are i mperishable.

Kilkenny Camogie Review of 2012 by Michael O'Leary PRO

INTER-COUNTY REVIEW

Senior

The year began with Kilkenny under new management as Brendan Williams returned to the helm having guided the county to an All-Ireland final appearance back in 2001. Having trained the county to four consecutive minor All-Ireland victories between 2006 and 2009, and a whole host of All-Ireland colleges titles, there were expectations that Kilkenny could finally end their long famine from All-Ireland glory that stretched back to 1994. However, it was always going to be a very difficult uphill challenge. Having lost 17 of last years panel for various reasons and with 13 newcomers used throughout the course of the year, bridging that 18-year gap was always going to be a mammoth task, and so it proved. Kilkenny began the league campaign down in Killeagh in Cork as they shipped a 17-point defeat losing out 3-14 to 0-6. Matters improved, and a 0-9 tally from Aoife Neary helped overturn a 5-point half-time deficit against Clare to emerge victorious, as they won 0-11 to 1-4.Up next was the challenge of All-Ireland champions Wexford, and Kilkenny lost out 0-11 to 0-10 following a spirited display. Victory was essential up in Dublin to maintain their league hopes, and it was achieved, but only just. Goals from Aoife Neary and Siobhan Holland built up a 2-5 to 0-1 lead, before Dublin responded with two goals. However, Dublin squandered numerous chances in front of goal, and Kilkenny held out for victory as they won by a solitary point, 2-9 to 2-8.

Kilkenny would be re-acquainted with Wexford in the league semifinal. Despite another spirited display, Kilkenny came up short losing by a point to a fortuitous scrambled goal, 1-4 to 0-6. Defeat to Offaly in the Leinster semi-final before attention switched to the championship. The championship unfortunately was a disaster for Kilkenny as they exited before the quarter-final stage. Kilkenny began the championship with a 2-15 to 1-9 victory in Dublin, as 17-year-old Miriam Walsh played a starring role on her championship debut scoring 1-4 from play. However, it was downhill from this point, as Kilkenny went on a losing sequence of results that ended their championship prospects. They were defeated 2-11 to

1-7 by Galway, before suffering a double disaster late on against Tipperary the following week .Kilkenny were in control and well on their way to victory as they led 1-15 to 0-13 with 53 minutes gone. However, Tipperary rallied and two late points followed by late goals from substitutes Noreen Flanagan and Michaela Graham shocked Kilkenny and that result would subsequently prove to have a devastating effect.

A heavy defeat to Cork by 11 points (2-15 to 1-7) a week later was another major blow before suffering another defeat up in Offaly(2-13 to 1-11) which meant a play-off encounter with Dublin was required to try and progress to the quarter-final. However, having suffered defeats the four previous weekends, confidence was at a very low ebb, and defeat to Dublin after extra-time by a solitary point wasn't a surprise, 0-17 to 2-10.

A year of massive disappointment for the seniors, and with the managerial position vacant at the time of writing following the departure of Brendan Williams, there is going to be a major task ahead to try and compete for silverware in future.

Intermediate

It was a disastrous year for the Intermediate who were defeated in all eight games between the league and championship. Their opening league encounter against Cork ended with a 2-8 to 2-5 defeat having made a remarkable fightback from 11 points down. They then suffered an unfortunate one-point defeat at home to Tipperary, 1 -11 to 2-7. Further defeats against Meath and Down completed their league misery. Having lost a number of players for various reasons, Kilkenny's championship was also a misery. A 16-point defeat suffered at the hands of Galway was a recipe for disaster, before suffering an unlucky injury-time point defeat to Tipperary from an Aoife Shinners free. Heavy defeats to Cork and Wexford compounded their championship misery.

Minor

The Minor Championship commenced earlier this year as to avoid a clash with the Senior Championship later on in the season.A dramatic contest in their opening game against Galway saw them

The All-Ireland final against Galway is one that Kilkenny will look back on with regrets. Having led 1-7 to 1-2 early in the second-half, Kilkenny were in a promising position. However, Galway buoyed on by the strong wind advantage rallied to draw level with five consecutive points in as many minutes, before a second goal from Rachel Monaghan killed off Kilkenny hopes to emerge victorious on a 2-12 to 1-10 score line.







Obicaries



Andy Herrernan

One of Kilkenny city's best known residents and most loyal GAA followers, Andy Heffernan was born in John Street where his father Michael ran a construction and cabinet-making business. His mother, a member of the Byrne family of Conlagar, had an antique furniture business in the shop. Andy and his brother Billy served their apprenticeship there and on the death of his father Andy began his own business.

During the Second World War Andy's father Mick, a native of Glenmore and a member of the Kilkenny County Board, made a submission to have a four-foot wall constructed in front of the old stand in Nowlan Park in order to replace the existing timber railing. Owing to the war, medals were unavailable, and when Glenmore won the county football final they agreed to divert £15 – the price of the medals – to help pay for the new wall. This gesture helped begin the redevelopment process at what is now one of the finest county GAA grounds in Ire land.

Andy was one of Kilkenny's finest Gaelic footballers ever. That was no insignificant achievement, for if the big-ball sport has for a century been the "other" game here then the county has still produced its share of very good footballers. Andy was one of them, a corner-back with a great left foot. His old Clann na Gael teammate Seamus Delaney in Patrick Street, for decades Kilkenny's Mr Football, describes him as "a stone wall - it was the Glenmore stuff in him". Andy and Seamus played with Muckalee before Clann na Gael, a forerunner of the modern-day O'Loughlin Gaels, were formed in 1960. Success came quickly; the new outfit were county junior champions in 1962, then senior champions in '63 and '64. Andy occasionally spoke of the occasion when he played football for Kilkenny in Croke Park following a Leinster hurling final. The football match was still going on at 6pm, at which stage the referee stopped proceedings for the teams to say the Angelus!

It would be interesting to know how many matches Andy attended in his lifetime. It's a fact that he attended every All Ireland hurling and football final for over 60 years, and how fitting it was that in the closing years of his life he was present to see Kilkenny beat Tipperary not once but twice on the first Sunday of September. Having attended his first All Ireland final in 1945 he saw all the greats of Kilkenny hurling from Jim Langton to Henry Shefflin, and if he admired every one of them he reserved

a special place in his affections for DJ Carey and the excitement he brought to the game. He knew his hurling and football, his facts and figures, his matches and dates, without ever being a knowall.

Andy loved attending schools matches, identifying potential prospects and following their progress through the grades. If they made it through to senior ranks he'd take pride in having spotted them years beforehand. He was never one to criticise a player for a poor display; "ah, sure it wasn't his day" would be as far as he'd go. But Andy was no big-day-only merchant; he was one of those low-key hurling men who form the backbone of the GAA in the county. Any round of club championship matches would find him and Ann attending three or four fixtures over the course of a weekend and frequently two or even three games on a Sunday. His only gripe might be a clash of throw-in times. When asked why he went to so many matches he responded simply, "Because the day will come when I won't be able to go any more."

He harboured a special grá for his ancestral Glenmore, his own Dicksboro – he served as chairman of the club – and the various Kilkenny CBS teams. And last year he had another team to support: the Wexford minor hurlers, with whom his grandson Colm – Deirdre's son – lined out.

It has become a cliché in circumstances like these to use the words "Ní bheidh a leithéid arís ann". But in the case of Andy Heffernan the phrase could not be more accurate or more apt.

He was interested in the promotion of football, particularly at under age. He was also a keen and loyal follower of the Black and Amber.

He was a great community and voluntary worker both in the parish and in Nowlan Park where he could always be depended upon to help when the occasion demanded. He could be seen regularly in "The Angle" helping with the car parking.

The esteem in which he was held was clearly in evidence by the massive crowds that attended his wake at his home, removal and burial. A Guard of Honour was provided both days by members of Barrow Rangers GAA Club

His wife, Mary, sons J J and David and daughter Catherine will miss him so much, as will his extended family and friends, As has already been stated he was one of those 'can-do' characters, impossible to replace. Ní beidh a leithéid ann aris.

Too Ryan

TOM RYAN late of Tutestown, Dunamaggin died peacefully on Monday 10th September after a long illness. He is survived by his son, John, and daughters, Siobhan and Regina, in-law's, grandchildren, relatives and friends. Tom who worked in the machinery section of Kilkenny County Council until his retirement and was a great GAA man

Tom's medal collection started early when in 1945 Tom won a NKSL school medal when P. McLoughlin was principal in Dunnamaggin and this was his most prized medal. He was the only Dunnamaggin player on the team that won such medals.

Tom's hurling prominence really came to light when occupying a corner forward berth on the last Carrickshock team to win a Kilkenny Senior Championship in 1951. He went on then to win Leinster Junior titles with Kilkenny in 1951, 1956, 1958 and 1967. He also won All-Ireland Junior Honours with Kilkenny in 1951 and 1956. He later played with his native parish Dunnamaggin winning a Southern Junior Title with Dunnamaggin in 1966. The team were beaten in the County Junior Final. In 1978 Tom and his son John were the wing backs on theDunnamaggin team with Malachy Hogan in the centre.

Tom's greatest contribution to the GAA is probably as a coach. Tom coached Shamrocks (Ballyhale) to their first Kilkenny Senior Championship in 1978. He was on the line for the Shamrocks for subsequent SHC wins in 1978,1979,80, 82 and 83, Leinster titles in 1979, 1981 and 1984 and All Ireland Titles in 1981 and 1984.In 1995 he trained Glenmore to County and Leinster titles. Tom switched codes in 1985 taking charge of the Kilkenny Senior Camogie team and at the same time trained the Shamrock's to not only County but also All-Ireland Club glory. Kilkenny's dominance in the ensuing decade was credited to Tom's shrewd hurling brain and affable nature. He trained the Kilkenny Senior Camogie team to 7 All-Ireland titles in a row from 1985 - 1991 inclusive and 1994 with his son John beside him as a selector, 6 National League titles in 1985, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1993.He also trained Freshford to win 3

Tom's analysis of players and teams was always fair and the brand of Hurling played by his teams was never less than attractive. One of the enduring memories of the man would have to be his full participation in a series of drills with a Junior Camogie Team at his old club Carrickshock when in his late seventies. Doing was always the best mode of instruction for Tom. Where he led others followed.

Having hurled for Dunamaggin and Carrickshock the colours of both clubs and of Kilkenny draped his coffin. He had a great love of gardening. His wife Carmel preceded him by almost 4 years. May he rest in peace.

Enda's popularity was attested to by the huge numbers that attended his obsequies in St.Mary's Cathedral, where his Requem was concelebrated by Fr.Jim Murphy. His passing will have caused unbridled sorrow for his Dad, Tom, the Mother he treasured, Bernie, his sons, Tom and Sam, his wife Frances, his sister Sinead, brothers, Donagh and Eoin, and a vast number of cousins, friends, relatives, and business acquaintances.

Enda Cantwell put in the hard yards in many respects, he deserves to Rest in the Arms of the Creator.

Ito Hogan

In addition to being a dedicated, hard-working, family man, Jim Hogan, who passed away on November 27th 2010, was a tremendous hurler with his native Tullaroan, Kilkenny, and Leinster. It was probably at Railway Cup level that the fame of Jim Hogan manifested itself. Playing in the Railway Cup Final of 1954, well I remember seeing Hogan being chaired off by delighted Kilkenny supporters. The game was played on the day after the traditional St Patricks day, and Jim, hurled up a storm at corner back, facing the mighty Cloyne genius. Leinster, for whom Pat "Diamond" Hayden, Paddy Buggy, Johnny McGovern, John Sutton, Dick Carroll, Jimmy Langton, Paul Fitzgerald (Henry Shefflin's uncle), and Mickey Kenny beat the might of Munster in front of a crowd of over 43,000 supporters.

Legendary Commentator Micheál O Hehir referred to Jim – for ever a Tullaroan man – as the short striding, long striking Kilkenny man. Jim often faced Ring prior to that game, and in subsequent days, and whilst his success against Ringey was no better than many of his fellow defenders from other Counties, on March 18, Jim Hogan had a game that most of that era could only wish for, or dream about. His tenacity, and anticipation were so sharp on that occasion, that he managed to keep Christy scoreless. To put that in context, Jim Hogan's feat was probably replicated on no more than two other occasions, if that. The National papers were bursting with the Hogan story on the day after the game. Jim Hogan was the featured Sports Star of the Week in the Indo on the following Friday – a much coveted award.

With Kilkenny, Jim's biggest regret was the defeat to Tipperary in 1950, when the Cats went down by 1-9 to 1-8. He won three Leinster senior Titles, three Walsh Cups, and Oireachtas in 1957, two Championships with Tullaroan in '48, and '1952.

At the time, all of the above achievements were highly valued, and proudly acclaimed.

Jim was just gone 82 when he passed away in the quiet, caring comfort of his home in Lacken, Rathmoyle, surrounded by his loving family. He will have left a legacy of honesty, decency, dedication to family and neighbour, a love of his sport including hunting and coursing, and of course hurling. He gloried in the achievements of Kilkenny's hurlers of all ages. His own place Tullaroan was always special, all of the lads he played with, and all of the games in which he donned the white with the green sash were never forgotten. He had great time too for his adopted Dicksboro, with whom his sons played.

His passing will have caused much grief and continued sadness for his wife Bridget, sons Philip, Sean, Seamus, William, Richard, Michael, Mark, daughters Josephine, Alice, Breda, Pauline, sister, Mai, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and a wide range of relatives, friends and neighbours. A huge crowd attended his Requiem in St.Canice's Church and at his internment in Ballykeeffe Cemetry in Kilmanagh

Joe Foley 1939 - 2012

Joe Foley of Birchwood, Skough passed away on 5th January 2012 in the care of his family. Born on 17th July in 1939, he lived and farmed his entire life in Birchwood.

From the last house in the parish of Windgap Joe went to Owning primary school and then attended the local Christian Brothers in Carrick. There he began hurling with Carrick Swans of Tipperary where he played in goal. After the Swans, he turned out for Piltown and later Windgap. Team mates and opponents of Joe characterised him as a ''hard yet clean'' player, whether in goal or outfield where he featured in the full back line.

Outside of playing hurling, Joe followed the sport and almost all others enormously.

John McCormack

On Thursday November 8th 2012, Galmoy G.A.A. lost one of it's great characters when John McCormack, Glashare, suddenly passed to his eternal reward. John was a real favourite of all who knew him, both in his native birthplace and in his new found home in Dublin. His popularity was reflected in the mingling of G.A.A. people from clubs in both Kilkenny and Dublin at his funeral.

John was raised at Glashare Castle in the parish of Galmoy and was introduced to both hurling and football when he attended Galmoy National School. John's talents were recognised when he was chosen to play for Kilkenny Minor Hurlers in 1956. He played at right half back on the team which won the Leinster Final, sharing a solid line of defence with Paddy Moran and Ted Carroll, in beating Wexford 4-7 to 3-7. Unfortunately they had to give best to a strong Tipperary side in the All Ireland final. A year previously, in 1955, John was a member of the Galmoy minor football team which won the Kilkenny Minor A Football County Final beating St Canice's Rosbercon 2-7 to 1-2. This was a unique occasion for the McCormack family as John's two brothers, Thomas and Francis, were also members of this winning panel.

John went on to play for his native Galmoy for many years and was a key member of the Galmoy team which beat Rower Inistioge 7-3 to 6-2 in the 1963 Junior County Final. Unfortunately, an objection was lodged and a replay ordered, resulting in a 2-11 to 1-7 win for the Rower Inistioge. John also played at Intermediate level for Kilkenny.

John later moved to Dublin in pursuit of employment and as travel arrangements were different in those times, John transferred to the MoonDarrig G.A.A. Club before joining Kilmacud Crokes Club in South County Dublin. John went on to win two Dublin Senior titles with Crokes in 1974 and 1976, on a team which featured fourteen intercounty players. Curiously they also won the Dublin title in 2012. John finished his own playing days with the Parnells Club.

Throughout his time in Dublin, John remained a firm supporter of Galmoy and, along with his brother Francis

and his good friend Michael Hennessy, they travelled down to many Galmoy games around the pitches of Ireland. He also continued his allegiance to Kilkenny and was regularly found on a summer Sunday morning in the late Michael Hennessy's pub 'The Sunset' in Summerhill sharing memories with the Galmoy folk up in Croke Park for the day.

John belonged to a renowned Galmoy G.A.A. family of nine children. His brother Dick, who passed away in September 2011, was a staunch club member. Dick farmed the family farm in Glashare and after his own playing days, served as Club Chairman for a period. He was also Club Vice President at the time of his passing. John has four sons and two daughters. One of his sons, Damien, representing the Trinity Gaels club, has played Senior and U-21 hurling for Dublin, while another, John, has played football for London.

John was one of life's real 'charachters', a jovial man with a hearty laugh who was also an outstanding singer from as far back as his schooldays. His thrilled many a gathering with his rendition of his favourite 'Fraulein' and rumour has it that he has passed this talent on to his siblings

Billy Walton 1961-2012

The club and community were devastated on Sunday 18 November when the news spread of Billy Walton's sad and untimely passing. Everybody knew of Billy's brave battle with serious illness over the previous eighteen months and we marvelled at his determination to continue to live his daily life in the face of terrible adversity. His humour, optimism and determination to win the battle were utterly admirable and demonstrated his courage in the face of adversity.

Billy was a wonderful family man, so proud of his Tullaroan ancestry and he had a deep and abiding knowledge of his family connections. One of his greatest days occurred in October 2011 when his son David won a county senior hurling medal with James Stephens to become the third generation Walton winner, following in the footsteps of his father Tom with Tullaroan in 1948 and Billy himself with his beloved James Stephens in 1981. It is a record few families can boast.

Billy had a hugely successful and lengthy hurling career, beginning with a schools title with St. Patrick's in 1972, coached by current county chairman Paul Kinsella. He hurled with distinction in St. Kieran's College and graduated to the county minor hurling team as goalkeeper aged 17 in 1978. He quickly joined a very successful James Stephens senior side while still a minor. He played in the All Ireland U-21 hurling final in 1981 against Tipperary and won his only county senior medal with the Village in the same year.

In 1982 he struck gold three times, first winning an All Ireland club title on his twenty first birthday against Mount Sion. Within a short time he won a NHL medal with Kilkenny seniors and capped it all with an All Ireland senior hurling medal on a Brian Cody-led Kilkenny team

Billy continued to shine for James Stephens as a stylish, skilful and free-scoring hurler for many years, ending his career where it began as the goalkeeper on the junior team.

For over twenty years he acted as selector and manager of a host of underage and adult teams, including the National Feile winning side of 2003. In 2001 he became the Juvenile Coaching Officer and supervised the transformation of the club coaching programme with great success.

But it will be for his extraordinary work on the development of the Kells Road site that Billy will be most remembered. He gave so generously of his time and expertise in matters agricultural. He contributed hugely to the safety of the site by changing the profile of his own property. Billy cajoled a wide range of specialists and experts to assist in the project. His painstaking attention to detail kept everybody focussed and ensured the highest quality control and finish.

A week before his passing, he organised the purchase and spreading of fertiliser from his 'corporate box', his bedroom that overlooks the development of which he was so proud. While Billy passed away so young, he accomplished so much in his short time among us and the manner in which he faced his greatest challenge has been inspirational to all.

We extend heartfelt sympathies to his wife Nuala, children David, Michelle, Fionnuala, Caroline and Tommy, his mother Breda, brothers, sisters, family and a very wide circle of friends.
