This year its funds helped support the drainage and irrigation project on the pitch.

On the inter-county playing fields, the future was forecast to match the desolation of the bad weather and snow. Amongst the highlights were the Senior Hurlers winning the Sraith Naisiúnta Allianz, the minors reaching the All Ireland Final, our Junior footballers retaining Corn Sam Maguire of Great Britain, the senior Camogie side reaching the All Ireland Final, the ladies footballers re-entering the National League and a myriad of successes on the handball courts.

On the local scene na Clubanna had a hard year on the fixtures front trying to work around inter county round robins, an early start, climate changes and the arrival of new grades and competitions. Once again thanks to the resilience of the players, innovative officials and all who work providing the sporting facilities and social and playing opportunities to all ages the challenges were faced down. On the playing fields games were won and lost, the championships ended on a high with Ballyhale Shamrocks taking the craobh shinsearach, whilst many new learnings from the year need to be taken on board.

As we pack away Bliain 2018 and move ar aghaidh le chéile to the challenges of another year our sincere thanks goes to all involved in Kilkenny GAA in any way from our main sponsors Glanbia PLC, to our competition sponsors, players' schools, clubs parent's boards, supporters clubs and supporters. The junior Championship was a matter of who would beat Dunnamaggin. Nobody did. They are now on the road to a Provincial Final, and, as with the Shamrocks, they will have reached the winners enclosure as will the Graigue lads by the time you open this page.

Again the Development squads had some successes, but at the end of the day, they all returned to their clubs better hurlers. The camogie girls were forced to play second fiddle again to Cork. There were many questions asked as a result. Kilkenny handball continues to flourish. A little mention about Joe Hennessy who survived a difficult illness to return with his doubles partner, Johnny Brennan to win yet another Masters All Ireland gold medal - brilliant.



# A Positive Year....

Inter County Senior Hurling Report by Tommy Lanigan



fter last year's poor campaign, the naysayers were out in force for 2018. Rarely has there been less expectation of a Kilkenny senior hurling team than this year, yet the return was satisfactory given the hill that must be climbed to find an All-Ireland winning team. It might be said that 2018 was one of Brian Cody's finest managerial achievements in capturing a League title and being genuine All Ireland contenders while utilising a limited player talent pool. Success is relative. If the year is a step on the road to greatness then we will happily accept the conclusion. Kilkenny often reached the All Ireland hurling final by winning three consecutive games. But all has now changed as the new format of provincial groups will be with us for at least three years.

Is it a better format for the players? Definitely, yes, playing games is infinitely more satisfying than training sessions. Is it better for inter county management? To judge by the whinging of struggling managers after round 3, the pressure has been placed firmly on them.

Unquestionably it is a disaster for club hurling but the solution is an argument for another place.

Everybody agrees the format produced the greatest All Ireland series ever played (despite Kilkenny not making it to the sharp end of proceedings). Given its success, it is likely to be with us for a long time, though this writer would prefer to see the All Ireland finals revert to a September conclusion.

If one was to judge Kilkenny's senior hurling year on the basis of the championship one would be relatively happy. To summarise, a solid provincial campaign, two great games against the All Ireland champions the first of which we could have won and a quarter final exit against superb All Ireland champions.

Initial expectations were gloomy. After all we were coming off a poor 2017 and the conveyor belt of talent seemed rather thin on the basis of a few unsatisfactory u-21 campaigns.

There are several lessons that will surely have been learned. The championship is now a long distance journey rather than a sprint. Teams must be injury-free to make significant progress. Teams must improve consistently for three months. The latter is the most difficult bit.

# LEINSTER CHAMPIONSHIP ROUND 1 Late Kilkenny scoring storm blasts them to thrilling win over Dublin KILKENNY 1-24, DUBLIN 3-16.

Kilkenny began the campaign with seven championship newcomers at Parnell Park. If they didn't appreciate the difference between league and championship they were taught a salutary lesson. How they managed to win against a superb Dublin side remains one of the mysteries of the sporting year.

With five minutes remaining, Dublin were two points ahead and in control

of a game that seemed to have by-passed most Kilkenny players. Against the run of play, Liam Blanchfield took a pass from sub. Luke Scanlon and batted the ball to the Dublin net. It was the first time Kilkenny had led in the game.

They had been thoroughly outplayed by the brilliance of Liam Rushe, Paul Ryan, Conal Keaney, Eoin O'Donnell and several other Dublin stars. However the great Kilkenny character of hanging in and taking a chance was never better illustrated in those final few minutes. The sides scored one point each in the remaining few frantic moments as Kilkenny rode their luck in a wonderful contest.

A week later Kilkenny blew hot and cold, but in the end they got the result they needed when beating Offaly at Nowlan Park.

Again the team came under huge pressure in the latter stages. With eight minutes remaining, Offaly had closed the gap to three points and the young teams resilience was seriously questioned by a physically strong Offaly side who had played very well.

The players responded very well and a goal from Liam Blanchfield followed by two points from John Donnelly gave Kilkenny the momentum to finish strongly.

They probably should never been in a difficult situation as the forwards had been repeatedly off target throughout the game, eventually amassing 21 wides. A few of the younger players played much better than the previous week notably John Donnelly, Conor Delaney, Richie Leahy and Luke Scanlon which gave hope for further improvement. But the next round would tell many tales.

## All-Ireland champions Galway were too strong GALWAY 1-22, KILKENNY 2-11

Much of the commentary about this Galway team reflected on their strength, the quality of their panel and their experience. It was a fearsome test for a young Kilkenny team and they never looked like challenging the power of the Westerners.

Salthill became the first venue to host a Leinster championship game and a huge crowd attended.

For much of the game Kilkenny were trying to recover from a series of hammer blows to their prospects. After sharing the first eight points, Galway took off on a scoring spree, inspired by a Joe Canning goal. Kilkenny's defence was dragged apart repeatedly and it was to the credit of Padraig Walsh and Paddy Deegan that they finally got to grips with a rampant Galway forward division. Eoin Murphy was in superb form in goal as he needed to be.

TJ Reid brought Kilkenny to within four points at the interval having converted a penalty but it was difficult to see from where a Kilkenny revival would come.

The Galway half backs and midfield took full control as the game progressed and an avalanche of points between the 55th and 65th minutes killed off the game as a contest. Kilkenny found themselves at the wrong end of an eight point drubbing. There were few complaints as only three forwards managed to get on the score sheet.

The movement of the Wexford forwards and their superb shooting bamboozled the Kilkenny defence and only a few scores from the ever inform TJ Reid kept Kilkenny in the game.

It was unusual to see three half time substitutions for Kilkenny but they were all needed and greatly improved the team. They closed down the Wexford running game, tackled ferociously and the Slaneysiders couldn't cope with the increased intensity. Joey Holden, Padraig Walsh, TJ and Richie Leahy dominated the game as Kilkenny shot a string of points to take the lead by the 58th minute.

Wexford hadn't finished and the ending was thrilling but Kilkenny held on for a deserved victory and much needed morale boost.

## What a contest! Leinster final 2018. KILKENNY 0-18, GALWAY 0-18

Given the gulf between the sides a short few weeks previously, it seemed that many people were hoping for a respectable result rather than adding another Leinster title to the Kilkenny palmares. Nobody told the team.

We were treated to one of the finest Leinster finals in many years as a hugely improved Kilkenny side gave as good as they got in this enthralling contest.

This time Kilkenny never allowed Galway to run freely as every bit of ground was fiercely contested. The interval scoreline of 0-8 to 0-7 in Kilkenny's favour attests the tightness and ferocity of the encounter.

The second half was similar, tight marking, swift movement and a serious lack of space meant that neither side could gain an advantage. However Galway's greater physical strength began to tell late in the game and they nudged three points ahead by the 67th minute.



However Kilkenny dug deep and a powerhouse finish rewarded them with three points. John Donnelly and Enda Morrissey contributed two excellent points and a TJ Reid free from 60m left the sides level. No complaints from either side.

# Super Galway edge past Kilkenny GALWAY 1-28, KILKENNY 3-15

The first Leinster hurling final outside the province was played in Semple Stadium on 8 July. In scorching weather these two sides surpassed their brilliant efforts of a week ago and gave us a game for the ages.

This time the All Ireland champions got the start they desired and led Kilkenny by 1-9 to 0-1 after 20 minutes. Rarely has a Kilkenny side been as comprehensively thumped in a replay.

The destruction continued to the interval but for a hard earned Ger Aylward goal (that should have been disallowed for overcarrying), Kilkenny would have been swamped. The 1-16 to 1-7 Galway lead did not reflect their superiority.

The third quarter is always Kilkenny's 'moving time' and again they obliged. Led by Richie Hogan and Colin Fennelly, Kilkenny reduced the deficit to one point by the 54th minute. However Galway's superior physical power and experience overcame a great Kilkenny revival and the westerners ran out convincing winners.

The route to an All-Ireland final appearance became more difficult.

### Limerick hold on for deserved victory LIMERICK 0-27, KILKENNY 1-22

In hindsight the Limerick team that deservedly won the 2018 All Ireland title learned much in the quarter final victory over Kilkenny.

They were an even younger side than Kilkenny but were superbly drilled. They played to a plan of short passing and relentless pressure and Kilkenny came up just short on the day. From the start Limerick were a little sharper, more assured and ready 'to deal with everything and anything' according to their outstanding manager, John Kiely.

Almost 19,000 spectators saw a fine game played by two sides filled with character and skill.

After a relatively even first 30 minutes, Limerick found their rhythm and their cross-field passing game inspired them to a 0-15 to 0-12 interval lead.

If Kilkenny had a fault this year they relied too often on the older players to spark a revival. Richie Hogan obliged for the third time this year and somehow Kilkenny found themselves but a point adrift with 64 minutes played. However, three huge points by Tom Morrissey, Peter Casey and Aaron Gillane extended the Limerick lead and they held on firmly to the end.

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# That was the year... that Kilkenny turned a corner\* (\*Possibly)

Well, that wasn't too bad a season, was it?

Kilkenny were as good as they were entitled to be. They won an unexpected National League title in joyous style. They blooded a clutch of promising youngsters. They departed the championship following a narrow and slightly unfortunate defeat to the eventual All Ireland winners. Nothing much to complain about there, you'll agree.

The fear expressed here this time last year was that things might get worse before they got better. That fear proved unfounded. In a season where no more than two pucks of the ball separated the best team in the country from the seventh or eighth best team, Brian Cody's charges ranked fifth, a couple of places up from the previous season. They were only barely better than Wexford and Dublin, they were considerably inferior to Galway at their best but they weren't far behind Limerick, Cork and Clare. This represented progress; not a great leap forward but solid, visible progress nonetheless. The memory of the shambles of the summer of 2017 was firmly banished. Off the pitch as well as on it, Kilkenny were sharper, more coherent and altogether surer of what they were trying to achieve. In their eight outings during the National League they made a staggering 36 substitutions, more than half of them (19) before the 50th minute - even more staggering and very, very unCodyesque. This was the management being decisive and demanding and it was refreshing to behold.

You'll see further facts and figures later on in this article but here's the most relevant stat of all, the bedrock reality. Against Dublin at Parnell Park in May, in the opening round of the provincial round robin, the visitors fielded seven — seven — players starting their first championship match. There's your context. There's the backdrop against which everything the Black and Amber did and did not achieve in 2018 must be viewed.




The first year of a reconstruction programme does not tend to produce miracles.

### **NARROW MARGINS**

The county's championship exit occurred in circumstances about as a desirable as a championship exit can occur. Had John Donnelly been awarded a stonewall free that would have put Kilkenny two points up with time running out in the All Ireland quarter-final, Limerick's comeback might have been strangled at birth. But the young men in green were the better team on the day, even if their opponents did have cause to rue both a string of wides after half-time and the absence of Walter Walsh. In any case, John Kiely's charges had more improvement in them. The Noresiders would not have gone on to win the All Ireland, despite the best efforts of Eoin Murphy, who enjoyed the season of his life, and TJ Reid, who, as the designated leader of the attack, produced a series of performances richer and more rounded than the ones that saw him named Hurler of the Year in 2015. In reaching the quarter-final they found their level. One can't ask for more than that.

Before that there was the National League triumph, and let's not overlook it or dismiss it with faint praise. This was the 20th national title of Brian Cody's reign and among the most satisfying; not that supporters can't enjoy the spectacle of a young side doing their best, but the accumulation of silverware is, after all, the object of the exercise. This piece of silverware was achieved by virtue of a thundering second-half display against Tipperary in Nowlan Park - and what Kilkenny person with a heartbeat could possibly say no to a title won in great style against the old enemy? The sight of the pitch flooded afterwards with jubilating supporters clad in black and amber indicated that this was something out of the ordinary. The victory represented reassurance that New Kilkenny



were going in the right direction. For this the management deserved considerable credit.

The wearers of the stripes had, remember, lost their opening two games of the competition, the second of them against Clare at Nowlan Park in a fixture the Banner started in rampant fashion. For 20 minutes the hosts weren't just being beaten, they were being embarrassed. But Cody and his cohorts didn't stand by watching; they made three substitutions by the 26th minute, the ship righted itself, Kilkenny won the second half – not a footnote to be dismissed; these are the marginal gains in which the great man has long put stock - and at the final whistle there was only a goal between the sides, 2-18 to 1-18.

It was the turning point of the county's season. A six-match winning run followed as the league title was annexed – annexed, moreover, with an XV that included no fewer than nine members starting their first national final. Whatever was to happen come summer, 2018 was now a success.

A quantum leap that had to be seen to be believed had taken place. No longer were Kilkenny a Route One team; now, instead, Eoin Murphy was going short to Paddy Deegan, Deegan was charging forward and offloading to Cillian Buckley, the new chief orchestrator, and the sliotar was being worked through the lines. No longer were the Kilkenny defenders merely defending; now they were pulling strings. Granted, it didn't last. A reversion to the mean occurred in the replayed Leinster final in Thurles, where far too many long balls were struck, to founder on the Galway half-back line. If Kilkenny are to persist with the gameplan, greater faith will be a prerequisite in 2019.

### THE PACK CLOSED IN

What did happen come the championship was that the posse caught up. Understandable; Cody's team had been fitter than most earlier than most because they needed to be. It is not unfair to hold that they were lucky to reach the Leinster final: they got out of jail against Dublin in Parnell Park, they were suffocated by Galway in Salthill and after they predictably had too much for Offaly they just about got past Wexford in the crunch tie. Would they have just about got past Wexford had Davy Fitz's charges not been taking the field for the fourth weekend in a row and visibly tired in the closing quarter? It is debatable. But them's the breaks and you take them when you get them.

The Leinster final brought the first inkling of Galway's mortality. Kilkenny were well worth the draw, despite being required to hit the closing three points of the afternoon to obtain it. The replay was an entirely different story and one that echoed one of the findings from the round robin: the forwards weren't scoring enough from play. They weren't scoring anything like enough from play.


True, one issue from the previous season had been solved. In the 2017 championship Kilkenny were absurdly overreliant on frees and 65s from TJ Reid. Over half of their scoring output came from said source, an unsustainably high proportion. This time around the county's percentage of scores from placed balls was down to 41 per cent. It's still too high  $-25\,$  per cent or lower is the optimum ballpark figure – but it represented a step in the right direction.

Championship 2018 saw a broader spread of scorers. James Maher was always good for a point or two from out the field, Conor Fogarty ditto. Enda Morrissey popped up a couple of times to swing one over from distance. Padraig Walsh landed a whopper against Wexford. On the face of it this was healthy. Drill down below the surface, however, and it's clear that the spread of scorers disguised a grave weakness: the aforementioned lack of points from play from the Kilkenny forwards.

This isn't the place to lament lost glories, or recall the great winged points of yesteryear from Henry Shefflin and Eoin Larkin, or get all old-timer on it by muttering, "God be with the days". Those days, as Don Henley might have said, are gone forever. At any rate they're gone for the moment. But still. A point from play – a point from play!!! – from the starting forwards versus Wexford? The 1-2 from the same sector in Salthill? The 1-3 in the Leinster final replay and the 1-6 in the All-Ireland quarter-final when the starting Galway and Limerick attacks were shooting the lights out, hitting 1-18 and 0-17 respectively on the same occasions?

Omit the Offaly game and here's an even more frightening stat. The Kilkenny subs hit almost as much from play during the campaign as the starting forwards did, 3-16 compared to 3-22. Scary.

Now you know why the Black and Amber were unable to control any match bar the Offaly encounter. Now you know why they were continually





forced to come from behind. Now you know why they were so heroic, time after time. They were obliged to chase games and they never failed to answer the call. But the figures don't lie. The first item on Cody's To Do list between now and next May entails sourcing two scoring half-forwards and a corner-forward with an eye for goal.

None of this is to ignore the pluses of the campaign, which were numerous, not least the speed of the opening phase of the rebuild. James Maher had his long delayed breakout season and when Richie Leahy – still an under-21 – was good he was very good indeed. John Donnelly was another find, while we can now be certain that Martin Keoghan is not a forward. Enda Morrissey came out of nowhere and performed admirably. Billy Ryan may kick on considerably in the short term.

### **MORE NEW FACES REQUIRED**

Problem is, Kilkenny need all of these guys to maintain their progress in 2019, and that's not a given. They also need two or three more springers to keep the pot bubbling and they need Liam Blanchfield to become the player he promised to be in the 2016 All Ireland semi-final replay against

Waterford. It is quite the ask. It is quite the series of asks, rather.

The curious case of Padraig Walsh demands a prompt solution. One campaign where Walsh was confined to the edge of his own square was understandable: two campaigns of robbing Peter to pay Paul would be overdoing it. Walsh can defend but his spirit. like that of his big brother before him, demands that he attack the ball. He can do that better from

the half-back line and should be allowed to. There has to be some young lad somewhere in the county who can be groomed as a full-back and coached to do the job.

Elsewhere, there was the disappointment of DJ Carey's under-21s, almost but not quite effaced by the achievement of Richie Mulrooney's minors in reaching the All Ireland final after a journey around the houses. If Galway were too big, too strong and too good for Kilkenny at Croke Park in August, no matter; this was a voyage of discovery and one whose real benefits will not emerge for four or five years yet. Not for the first time, St Kieran's managed to reinvent themselves between the Leinster championship and the All Ireland series. Bennettsbridge didn't win the county final but their presence added greatly to the occasion. And talking of grand old clubs, there wasn't a more refreshing occurrence anywhere locally than Mooncoin's unexpected triumph in the under-17 minor grade, not least because it demonstrated that a country outfit can still beat the city giants at under-age level.

A word of tribute to the new holders of the MacCarthy Cup. A couple of years ago I genuinely wondered if we would ever see Limerick win the All Ireland again. After 45 years of unlimited heartbreak we finally did – and

lo, it was good. The greatest, most dramatic hurling championship ever produced not the greatest but certainly the worthiest champions ever.

For the past couple of decades Limerick were the ultimate bacon and cabbage team. Under the management of John Kiely and the coaching of Paul Kinnerk they remained a bacon and cabbage team, except it wasn't the hairy bacon and overcooked cabbage of before. This was bacon and cabbage like never served up previously, possessing a touch of fusion about it — very much nouvelle cuisine for Limerick hurling - but retaining the base flavours.

The single most impressive feature about the new champions, a team of no superstars and an entity all the better for it, was the clean, stringent lines of their hurling. Forget that much overused word 'tactics'; modern hurling is about logistics. Get the sliotar into the strike zone and get it in quickly – but not too quickly and not simply for the sake of it. Limerick, thanks to Kinnerk, got it in there with purpose aforethought. One or two passes in their half of the field to set up the delivery, then the long or the diagonal ball, frequently pitched beyond the corner-back, with the recipient given

time to come on to the sliotar, get his head up, survey his options and either turn to shoot or lay off to a colleague within a 30-metre radius.

The flop against Clare in Ennis excepted (and forgiven; that was their only defeat of the year in normal time in any competition), the Shannonsiders' clarity of thought execution and in their build-up play was a sight to behold. They never took too much out of the ball or ran it into trouble. There

was always someone in the middle third to go long and there was always someone to supply him with clean possession to do so. Everyone took a turn to pass the bullet and everyone took a turn as quarter-back, firing the gun.

The point that put them ahead in injury time against Cork in the All Ireland semi-final began with Nickie Quaid's now fabled intervention, continued with Mike Casey picking up the pieces on the endline and involved two short passes and a long drive before Pat Ryan won the free for Aaron Gillane to convert. This was not so much grace under pressure as precision when the din was at its height. Against Kilkenny they sniped 0-24 from play and against Cork they hit 1-19 in normal time: monstrous tallies both.

Yet all of this did not take place in a vacuum. The restructuring of the provincial and All Ireland championships led to a national summer of hurling that will be remembered for all the right reasons and a local summer of non-hurling that will be remembered for all the wrong reasons. Four months, from April to August, without club games: for Kilkenny, this is a situation that cannot obtain indefinitely.

# REIGN SUPREME

County Senior Hurling Report by Tommy Lanigan



Quality will always prevail and Ballyhale Shamrocks had more than enough quality in their young panel to win them their 16th county senior hurling final and their first since 2014.

Their sixteen titles since 1978 comfortably eclipses the Tullaroan record of sixteen between 1887 and 1933, a remarkable achievement given the vast difference in the intensity of the current contests. With such a young side, five under 20 years and a spine that should be around for quite a while, it is certain they have much more silverware in their sights. Add this to the scoring machine that is TJ Reid and they have much to aim for in future years.


TJ was unquestionably the player of the championship. In addition to hitting frees from every angle and possible distance (except for a memorably faulty day in the semi-final), he turned in magnificent performances throughout. His display against Dicksboro in the quarter final in John Locke Park will live long in the memories of those privileged to have seen it. The Shamrocks talisman has been more influential this year than any other since his senior arrival as a lively 17-year-old in 2005. The importance to Shamrocks of winning the 2017 U21 title was never more apparent than this year. They blooded several young players and were patient enough to give them time, despite some earlier poor

performances. It was Henry Shefflin's first successful foray into senior management. Older brother Tommy is coach and a very influential and astute presence too.

Everybody seemed delighted that Bennettsbridge made it to Nowlan Park on final day. They were there on merit too! The 'Bridge have had an uncanny habit of winning games since their Junior victory in 2014. Their direct path back to senior was adorned by National Junior and Intermediate titles, illustrating their self-belief and ability to grind out victories

Unfortunately for them they took ten minutes to settle into the rigorous demands of a county final and Shamrocks had forged ahead by 1-6 to 0-1 in that time. It was a mountain the 'Bridge willingly climbed and some wayward shooting at crucial times in the second half prevented them from really asking the hard questions of Shamrocks. The southerners kept their noses in front at all times and never looked like being under serious pressure.

However, the 'Bridge can draw enough solace from their first final appearance since 1974 and they will surely return a better team in 2019. They have a few young players coming through their club who have the potential to improve them, particularly in attack. While they will





be disappointed with their final performance, great credit must go to a small group of parents and long-term club members who brought this group to the big stage.

### League form counted for nothing

The new inter-county structures made a pig's ear of the club championship with one round played in April and no action following until mid-August. We hope for better planning in future years. Despite the universal bleating of 'the club is the most important part of the Association', the mantra doesn't seem to refer to fixture-making.

Following Dicksboro's success in 2017 and the proliferation of young hurlers in the City, it was assumed by many that the three city clubs and Shamrocks would dominate club hurling this year. Perhaps some hubris attached to the city teams as a result, particularly as all three managed to avoid the first round by doing well in the league competition. On the other hand, Shamrocks had the relative indignity of having to come through the first round after a poor league. They lost to O'Loughlins and Bennettsbridge in a tough group. But as mentioned above they were playing the long

game with their young team.

James Stephens and the 'Boro dominated one league group while O'Louglins were the only undefeated team in five games. Clara and Carrickshock had miserable leagues with the latter failing to win any game.

The championship turned all expectations on their heads.

Erin's Own stumbled over Carrickshock after a low scoring replay, not giving any indication of improvements to come. Clara accounted for a dismal Danesfort and Mullinavat defeated a disappointing Rower side. Ballyhale trounced an understrength St. Patricks, Ballyragget and gave a good indication of their championship potential.

In the quarter finals, several teams who had pretensions were dumped unceremoniously from the competition. Last year's most improved side, Mullinavat lost comprehensively to the 'Bridge while an ageing Clara side had too much grit and fire power for O'Loughlins. James Stephens were beaten by Erin's Own after two tough encounters in Ballyragget. But the best performance of the championship was Shamrocks demolition of Dicksboro before a huge crowd in Callan. It was clear there was

now one clear favourite. A talented 'Boro team played well but could never get near a Shamrocks side that showed the ancient telepathy continues to the present generation.

The semi-finals produced two tight encounters where fortunes could have swung either way. Erin's Own almost defeated Shamrocks. Superbly drilled in defence and with the Conors, Delaney and Fogarty in fighting form, they gave themselves every chance. That TJ was fallible form placed balls improved prospects of a major upset. Leading by two points at the end of normal time, Comer simply could not finish powerfully and were hit by a smash and grab goal from Evan Shefflin. It was a heartbreaking end to a great season for the Erin's Own men. No doubt they can build on this year as they too have several talented young men on the cusp of adult hurling.

The clash of the 'Bridge and Clara was a first in senior championship hurling, close neighbours though they are. Clara had been hit by injuries throughout the campaign, most notably Lester Ryan and Jack Langton but they are a fighting side. But younger legs and a bravura performance from Sean Morrissey saw the 'Bridge through to the final in a very tight encounter. The new vintage of green and yellow men had come of age in senior ranks and improved with every game. There is surely a championship within their grasp in future years.

### Mixed fortunes for many

At the other end of the championship we bid farewell to Carrickshock United. The year was an unmitigated disaster for them and it was sad to see their veterans trying valiantly to hang onto senior status. What is most difficult for them in the future is a dearth of obvious young talent. They were well off the pace in the relegation final against Danesfort, as if they accepted the inevitable. Danesfort did well to survive. However, they depended so much on Richie Hogan's ability to conjure scores, it is difficult to see a solid long-term future for them unless they place more faith in their panel.

For the teams in the middle ground it was a poor year. After a great start when they hammered James Stephens it was downhill for Mullinavat. They never recovered from the loss of Tom Aylward as they shuffled their defence to no positive effect. They still have youth, power and skill on their side, provided they can believe in their collective talents.

The two city teams, the Village and O'Loughlins have similar issues. Lots of good defenders hides a dearth of forwards. Even the return of evergreen Martin Comerford didn't work for the St. John's parish men and perhaps illustrated their forward concerns by his presence this year. Like James Stephens their forwards will have to learn the essentials of movement in attack. The folly of playing Eoin Larkin as a loose midfielder brought comfort to all opposition.

Intermediate champions Graigue-Ballycallan will be an interesting addition to the mix next year with their blend of youth and furious competitiveness. In 2017 the Bridge were in relegation trouble, Carrickshock had been unlucky, Mullinavat showed great potential, James Stephens looked like the next contenders and Ballyhale went out of the championship race with a whimper. How senior club hurling changed in one year!

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
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The annual twist and turns of the intermediate club campaign kept the ardent Kilkenny club hurling observer more than interested during this year, but intermingled with this was some hugely memorable local derbies (the county final itself being the obvious member of this category) and some surprising u-turns in from league to championship and vice-versa in the case of a number of teams. But when eventually the surviving teams were whittled down to two finalists, we were left with a potentially classic pairing with a distinct history and tradition, Graigue-Ballycallan, beaten finalists from last year, and early season favourites Tullaroan. Undoubtedly, more than pride at stake between these two teams, but it would play a massive part in bragging rights for who ever crossed the line first. As it was, Graigue-Ballycallan were the cooler and calmer team when the time demanded, and they secured a senior spot for 2019. With a junior title won earlier in the year and some serious progress being made at under-age level in the club, hopes will be high to make a longterm impact at the high grade.

With the disjointed league season creating a degree of uncertainty amongst clubs, it was natural that it was extremely difficult to gauge the form of the vast majority of teams. And, realistically, it was only after the full completion of league matches that there was some sense of the

potential for each individual team ahead of the championship. Tullaroan and John Lockes led the way in the two league groups, and surprisingly it was the Callan men who took the league honours with a 2-14 to 1-16 victory over the previously unbeaten Tullaroan in the league final played in Nowlan Park.

The opening round brought four pairings together involving Glenmore and St. Martin's, Thomastown and Mooncoin, Tullogher-Rosbercon and Fenians and St. Lachtain's and Young Irelands respectively. Glenmore and St. Martin's both experienced middling league campaigns, but facing each other with the opportunity of a championship victory could have ensured a massive boost to their respective championship credentials. As it was, both sides could not be separated after a tough battle, drawing at 2-17 apiece. When they faced off again seven days later, the greater forward power of Glenmore through the likes of Alan Murphy and Ger Aylward in particular saw the Southerners through on a 3-11 to 0-14 score line.

Thomastown and Mooncoin were two sides with similar moments of regret from their league campaign, and as a result their first round championship clash held moments of natural tension from an early stage.













showed great composure as James Maher blasted to the Lisdowney net immediately after to regain the lead. This was soon followed by a point from Shane Donnelly, which gave St. Lachtain's a dramatic 2-10 to 1-10 win.

The semi-final weekend kicked off on Saturday, October 13th, with Graigue-Ballycallan taking on Tullogher Rosbercon in Nowlan Park. The story could be effectively summarised by the ability of the teams to take their scoring chances when presented to them. In this case, Tullogher were the team that were found wanting, while Graigue using the economy of effort and opportunity to add to their tally throughout the game. The Southerners hit fifteen wides throughout, some from what would be considered reasonable scoring positions. Credit must also go to the Graigue defence, however, who dealt with the threat of the Tullogher attack admirably throughout. Graigue led by 0-8 to 0-7 at the interval but Tullogher made a number of real threats on the Graigue goal during the third quarter which could have yielded more. Graigue goalkeeper Ciarán Hoyne was particularly sharp at one stage to keep out Tullogher's Conor Hennessy. There was no denying that Graigue, while seemingly not on top form, had just about enough in reserve to secure their county final place. In the end, they did just that, winning by 0-14 to 0-11, and leaving Tullogher-Rosbercon once again wondering what might have been.

24 hours later, having overcame one neighbour in the quarter-final last time out, St. Lachtain's now looked to get the better of another neighbour of theirs, Tullaroan, in their semi-final clash. St. Lachtain's once again looked to Brian Kennedy to act as an extra defender, but Tullaroan were able to keep adding to their tally due to indiscretions by the Freshford men which were duly punished by their freetaker Shane Walsh. The aforementioned Walsh was on top form from placed balls throughout, scoring 0-13 along with another point from play during the hour. Tullaroan led by 0-11 to 0-8 at the half-time break without ever coming near the heights of what they might have expected of themselves. They were particularly relieved midway through the second half when St. Lachtain's Shane Donnelly was fouled in the small square and a penalty was subsequently sent whizzing past the post by the normally reliable Liam Hickey. Tullaroan grew in confidence as the final minutes approached and try as St. Lachtain's might, they could not reduce the deficit, until when at the final whistle Tullaroan were winners by 0-19 to 0-13.

In recent memory, there can't have been a more anticipated intermediate county final. With one side looking to cancel out the disappointment of losing the county final twelve months earlier (Graigue-Ballycallan), and the other attempting to break back into the senior grade after four previous years of being tipped to achieve this (Tullaroan), the stakes could not have been higher. This does not even take into consideration the local bragging rights which would inevitably linger into the future between two well-established rivals.

The game started with Tullaroan looking to establish their authority from an early stage. Martin Keoghan was moved to full-forward from the





throw-in and it proved a shrewd decision as he was central a number of scores for Tullaroan in the opening quarter. The major two of these came when firstly Keoghan scored himself as he batted the ball to the net and later on was fouled as he typically burst through on goal. Padraig Walsh blasted the ball to the net to open up a 2-4 to 0-3 lead for Tullaroan. It could have been more had they not hit a number of aimless wides during that time. Graigue were struggling for any sort of leeway during the first twenty minutes but they appeared more settled as the half went on, having restructured both their defence and attack. Despite this, Tullaroan still appeared comfortable at half-time as they led by 2-8 to 0-7.

Graigue needed a good start to the second half, and they got it, as the increasingly threatening Billy Ryan was fouled for a penalty. Conor Murphy, who was on form from placed balls throughout, dispatched the ball to the net to bring the difference back to a goal (2-8 to 1-8), having pointed a free previously. Tullaroan looked to have composed themselves again as the half progressed, and increased their lead to six by the half-way point (2-11 to 1-8).



At the end of 2017 both the Northern and Southern Boards were disbanded and so ended many decades of divisional competition. Since the Junior championship structure was changed in 2011 the need for both divisions were diminished. But from Little Acorns grow Mighty Oaks, so in March 2018 the new Junior County Board was created with John Lacey of Ballyragget becoming the first Chairman. The Junior board were given charge of the new 'A', 'B', 'C' and 'D' leagues and championships as well as the new Under 19 competitions and the new Under 21 format. Dunnamaggin made a swift return to the Intermediate grade after relegation in 2017 by winning the 2018 junior championship. Their march through the championship was very impressive throughout with wins over Kilmacow, Conahy Shamrocks, Dicksboro led them to a final clash against Southern rivals Piltown.

Piltown had been also impressive throughout the championship, so the scene was set for a very competitive clash on Sunday 21st October. Kilkkenny People's John Knox reports:

"A missed penalty and a scored penalty within minutes of each other helped shape the outcome of this lively Kilkenny junior hurling championship final in Nowlan Park. Piltown missed one, and they bit the dust. Dunnamaggin scored one, and they ended up recording their second win in the championship and climbing back to the intermediate divided from where they descended 12 months ago.

While Dunnamaggin opened backed by the wind blowing down the field from the country end, it took them a while to find their feet in the m atc h.

Piltown opened the scoring through Cian Kinsella, and for 20 minutes or so they gave as good as they got. Indeed, they might have nabbed a goal in the 14th minute, but Martin Power's

All the time Willie Phelan was a powerhouse at the heart of the Dunnamaggin defence; the captain, the leader, the inspiring force. With Michael Cody as a most able wingman and Mark Heffernan solid on the edge of the square in place of the injured Noel Hickey, they d idn't cough up scores too simply.

The teams were together at 0-2 each after 10 minutes and then John Fitzpatrick, a lively man on his feet, won a Piltown puck-out before shooting between the posts.

When deadly finisher, Ronan Coffey, got in on the scoring act the winners found themselves two clear, but not for long.

John Kenny (frees) hit the target at the other end to punish fouls on Kevin Brophy and Cian Kinsella (0-4 each).

Dunnamaggin hit the front again in the 19th minute when a hand on the back of Luke Fitzpatrick offered free taker, Thomas Maher an opportunity from 20 metres, which he snapped up. 
Penalty. Nice goal for Peter McCarthy, but the title was long gone on them.



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

Having condemned Charleville to late heartbreak courtesy of an injury-time point from Bill Staunton in 2012, it was St. Patricks Ballyragget's turn to be on the receiving end last February as they suffered a one-point defeat in the dying moments of injury-time to Kanturk in the All-Ireland Intermediate Club Final in Croke Park.

A superb goal from Michael Brennan as the match entered the final quarter gave the Ballyragget men the outright lead for the very first time, and when Kevin Kelly doubled the lead with a pointed free shortly afterwards, they were in a very strong position.

At that stage, they led 1-15 to 1-13, and when both sides added a point each afterwards, St, Patricks were still in a very strong position coming down the home stretch.

However, Aidan Walsh shipped an injury and had to be aided off, and that stoppage certainly halted St. Patricks momentum.

lan Walsh and a Lorcan McLoughlin free drew Kanturk level entering injury-time, and when McLoughlin pointed from play, it appeared Kanturk had their hands on the trophy.

However, Kevin Kelly replied with a pressurized free to draw them level, and into the 5th minute of time added on, it appeared that extra-time was inevitable.

St. Patricks Ballyragget had a sideline cut around halfway, but it was Kanturk who regained possession and they worked the ball out to the Hogan Stand side and Ian Walsh, who was a real handful during the 2nd half, was in the perfect position and from around 60 yards he calmly struck over the all-important winning point to condemn St. Patricks Ballyragget to heartbreak.

It was a most terrible way to lose.

Having such heartbreak losing three County Finals since 2012, St. Patricks Ballyragget finally broke their Intermediate maiden tag when defeating Graigue-Ballycallan in the decider.

They began their Leinster adventure with a convincing 0-24 to 1-8 victory away to Ardclough, before easing to a 2-20 to 2-10 victory over Kiltale.

The Leinster Final didn't go to plan as anticipated.

A closely fought first-half saw the Ballyragget men leading 0-9 to 0-8, and Glenealy refused to yield throughout the 2nd half.

The Wicklow men took a shock lead when a Wayne O'Gorman goal in the 45th minute gave them a 1-11 to 0-12 lead.

They stretched the lead further when Jonathan O'Neill pointed to lead 1-13 to 0-13 with 10 minutes remaining.

St. Patricks Ballyragget were certainly tested to the limit, but to their credit they responded when the chips were down and they outscored Glenealy 0-6 to 0-2 over the closing period.

Kevin Kelly pointed three times from frees, before points from Seoirse Kenny and Brian "Brookie" Phelan drew them level with time running out.

There was time for a winning score and Kelly duly obliged to strike over the winning free as they got out of jail against an unfortunate Glenealy.

Having won the Leinster Championship, attention turned to their All-Ireland Semi-Final clash against Toureen of Mayo in January.

The Semi-Final clash was scheduled to be played in the Gaelic Grounds in Limerick but due to an unplayable surface, the match was switched half an hour away to Cusack Park, Ennis.

Playing with a very strong first-half breeze, St. Patricks built up a 0-7 to 0-2 lead at half-time, but struggled during the opening 10 minutes of the 2nd half as Toureen narrowed the gap to just three points. 0-8 to 0-5.

Eoin Bergin scored the all-important goal that sent them on their way, and when Joe Brennan rifled home an unstoppable shot, victory was virtually assured.

Joe added a second goal near match end after he was set-up by his brother Michael, and while Toureen grabbed an injury-time consolation goal, St. Patricks won 3-14 to 1-9.

Kanturk easily defeated Middletown Na Fianna of Armagh in the other Semi-Final in Newbridge and that set-up an intriguing



showdown in Croke Park on Sunday 4th February.

The All-Ireland Final was half-an hour later starting than scheduled because of the extra-time played in the Junior decider between St. Mogues Fethard (Wexford) and Ardmore (Waterford) which Ardmore won by a point.

Kanturk held the edge throughout the first-half, and a superbindividual goal late in the first-half by Man of the Match Ryan Walsh gave them a 1-9 to 0-8 lead at half-time.

During the third quarter, St. Patricks Ballyragget started to gain supremacy with Seoirse Kenny lording proceedings in midfield.

Entering the final quarter, St. Patricks trailed by two points, but a magnificent goal by Michael Brennan gave them outright lead for the first-time, before Kevin Kelly pointed a free moments later to turn the game completely on it's head. 1-15 to 1-13.

As mentioned earlier, the injury sustained to Kanturk's Aidan Walsh broke the St. Patricks Ballyragget momentum, and Kanturk suddenly found a new lease of life.

The manner in which St. Patricks Ballyragget lost was most heart-breaking and they deserved at least another 20 minutes of extra-time.

However, they hurled themselves to a standstill and they did themselves justice in the manner in which they fought courageously right to the bitter end.

Despite Ryan Walsh being named AIB Man of the Match after





wards, Seoirse Kenny was the most consistent outstanding performer throughout, scoring 0-5 from play in an exceptional 5-star performance.

Kevin Kelly deserves immense credit for togging out not having trained since the Leinster Final, and played his part, while Joe Brennan, despite being quieter than in the Semi-Final, along with the hard-working Bill Staunton also led the siege to their comeback during the 2nd half.

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# **New U19 Competitions**



As a result of the deliberations of the Special Games Administration Committee, where the minor grade was erased from the structures, to be replaced by an under 17 grade, and as a consequence of the same Committee altering the under 21 grade to under-20 (football) for 2018, with hurling expected to follow suit in 2019, Kilkenny decided to bring in a special under-19 competition to bridge the age gap between under-17 and the expected under-20. Former Cathaoirleach Ned Quinn, wile accepting that the competition did not get off to an auspicious start this year, but who still believes in its value in helping clubs to retain a large cohort of their players in that age bracket, explains as follows—

"In response to a survey in 2017 which indicated that less than 20% of those playing on their club u21 teams were up to the age, together with the decision of Congress to change the minor age to u 17 and to make it illegal for u 17's to play on adult club teams Kilkenny Co Board took the decision to alter the age grades of their league/championship competitions to u13, u15, u17 and u19 while retaining u21 as a knockout championship as heretofore. The introduction of the u19 grade offers a developmental pathway for players to graduate to adult level and should help clubs offset the hemorrhage of players previously being experienced at this age level. While it is accepted that the unprecedented number of games that our county u17 team were involved in this year had a seriously adverse effect on the playing of club games at both u17 and u19 level, it is this issue that needs addressing rather than the reduction of games for our club players in these age brackets."

So Kilkenny County Board decided that whilst the minor (u-17) players at club and inter-county levels are well catered for, the under-21 players were rendered victims of a system that offered little competitive action. For instance half of that band of hurlers were non-operatives after one game, given that the competition was a knock-out one. Incidentally our minor team that played in the All Ireland against Galway played an unbelievable 12 games in their Championship. That kind of extraordinary demand on the minors rendered the running of the local u-21 Championship nigh on impossible. Note that whilst the expectations are that the inter-County u-21 Championship is anticipated to be turned back to u-20 inside the next two years, the local Kilkenny Championships will not follow suit. We will still have an under-21 Championship, which will always be a knock-out competition.

Again both sides shared points to leave two in it at the break, 1-8 to 1-6, in what was proving to be an absorbing contest.


McDonald and Holden added points on the restart which were soon followed by a converted penalty by McDonald. Danesfort lifted their game as it looked like it was about to slip away from them.


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
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# Magical Displays in Under 13 Championships

# He loved Hurling all his life

# Bishop Laurence Forristal 1931 - 2018

than hurling, it was surely talking about hurling.

If there was one thing in life that the late Bishop Forristal enjoyed more

Any regular visitors to his homes down through the years, whether that be Peace in Christ, the Freshford Road or more recently Gowran Abbey Nursing Home, will tell you that plans could very quickly become derailed. Whether intending to call on diocesan matters or simply for a quick hello, visitors found themselves engaged in lengthy discussions on Kilkenny hurling.

While those discussions would often begin in the present, it wouldn't be long before the Bishop would take his one person audience on a trip back in time. What made these journeys to the past so entertaining was the vivid memory with which he could recall some of the great names and great days out for the Black & Amber.

His interest should probably come as no surprise. In his first ten years of life, Kilkenny competed in eight All Ireland finals, winning four of them. While Bishop Forristal was a young boy, Lory Meagher was firmly cementing his place as one of the all time greats of the game.

And so it was that a passion for hurling developed in the young Larry that would follow him for the rest of his days. Though at times, his attempts to closely follow the exploits of the Kilkenny team ran into obstacles.

In the 1990 version of this very publication, he recounted the struggles he faced as a young seminarian desperate for news of his beloved hurlers.

In 1949, as a young man, Bishop Forristal entered Holy Cross College on Clonliffe Road in Drumcondra. This was the diocesan seminary for Dublin at the time and as most readers will know, was a stone's throw from Croke Park

Despite the proximity, seminarians were not allowed to attend matches. In fact, every Sunday they were allowed no contact whatsoever with the outside world. This was before televisions and transistor radios became ubiquitous, never mind smartphones. Newspapers too could not pass through the college gates which left people like the Bishop painfully unaware of what was happening on the field a few hundred metres away.

Of course, as any economist will tell you, where there is demand, so too is there supply. It wasn't long before some of the Bishops fellow classmates began to stand outside in the grounds and train themselves By Kieran Cuddihy

to identify when a point or a goal had been scored depending on the type of cheer. Some even claimed to have worked out a means to identify which team had scored based on the timbre or pitch of the full throated celebrations.

Alas, these experts were often anything but. Which left Bishop

Forristal mired in ignorance. Though perhaps he should be thankful. After all, while in the seminary, he missed Kilkenny losing to Tipperary, Laois and Wexford in Croke Park.

In the end, it was one of the priests in Holy Cross College who lifted the veil. Despite having no interest himself in Gaelic games, he knew that the Bishop and others were desperate for information. Every Sunday night, when the voice of Sean O Ceallachain came on to RTE to read out the results, he would turn up his private radio loud enough to be heard through the walls. Before long, news would spread amongst the student body.

Many years later, Bishop Forristal conveyed this thanks to the rule makers in Holy Cross. As Bishop, every Sunday in Spring and early Summer was taken up with communions and confirmations. Meaning that he once again began to miss out on seeing Kilkenny hurl. Thanks however to his training on Clonliffe Road, he was able to cope with the frustration!

Another event in the life of Bishop Forristal involved Holy Cross and Croke Park, though it came several years after his time as a seminarian.

In 1984, the GAA began the process of planning a redevelopment of Croke Park. It became quickly apparent that it would be necessary for the Association to acquire land in and around the stadium to accommodate the new design. Thus began a series of negotiations with private homeowners, Dublin City Council, local businesses and of course, the Dublin Archdiocese.

It was in these latter negotiations that Bishop Forristal played a central role. His position as Bishop of Ossory (and a former seminarian on Clonliffe Road) and as a avid hurling supporter, meant that he was well placed to view this issue from both sides.





While the details of the negotiations were and remain private, a letter from outgoing GAA President John Dowling in 1991 to the Bishop, is telling.

In it, he wrote;

"I want to thank you sincerely for your wonderful assistance in connection with the purchase of Clonliffe and Belvedere properties for the association. All of this has made the redevelopment of Croke Park possible."

"Due to your kind intervention, guidance and help, you made the purchases possible. I am satisfied that without your help the future for Croke Park would have been very bleak."

So it transpired that with the acquisition of this land, the GAA were able to develop the stadium that now exists. And it was a stadium that Bishop Forristal spend many a Sunday afternoon in.

As anyone who accompanied him to games can attest, he was a well known face to many of the stewards and staff around the ground, often stopping to chat with those he knew best.

In recent years, as his health began to decline, travelling to Croke Park became impossible. Television and radio coverage filled the void, though nothing compared to seeing the game in the flesh.

Much as he had done as a seminarian, Bishop Forristal found a solution.

As Kilkenny approached some of their more important fixtures, the crowds attending training could become a distraction. So Brian Cody began holding sessions behind closed doors. No 'outside eyes' would be allow to pry.

None that is, except the Bishop.

On many evenings in recent years, you could finding him sitting in front of Aras O Cearbhaill, casting an eye over the emerging talent.

Throughout his life, hurling brought him much joy. From the clandestine attempts to acquire information as a young priest, to those training sessions in Nowlan Park, he never tired of marvelling at those who played the game.

## Major General Kieran Brennan talks with Barrie Henriques

The Clan Brennan has brought tremendous fame, acclaim, achievement, and honour to its home base in Kilkenny over many years. Many of them have distinguished themselves in various fields of excellence. In the near past, we have had one - the third Kilkenny man to do so - reach the highest levels of the GAA. I speak of course of Nickey. Another one has trod a similar path of meritorious achievement in the GAA world but also in Forsaí Cosanta na hÉireann - Irish Defence Forces.

Kieran Brennan, has risen through the ranks of our armed forces to the heady heights of Major General. Kieran most certainly did not come from a Military background. To rise to the position of second-incommand of the Irish Armed Forces is a major achievement for any member of the Army Officer Corp. Invariably such standards are achieved by Officers reared with a strong Military spoon in their mouths, and coming from Military Academies.

I met up with the Major General recently for the purpose of this profile. A more captivating, centred, lucid gentleman you would not meet on a day's walk. We spoke of things Military, things Conahy, things GAA, and, more importantly, things Kilkenny GAA, of which more anon. He had just returned from a meeting of the United Nations Military heads in the UN Headquarters Building in New York. Pushing him on a date for a little tete-a-tete, he told me that he was scheduled to be in Syria for a few days, so a later date was set. On reflection I got to thinking of what the man had achieved in his chosen career. From the day long ago when he took the Oath to Country and President at his Commissioning day, when caps were tossed aloft in the Curragh gymnasium, Kieran Brennan has come a long, tough, uncompromising journey that has seen him rise through the ranks with distinction. His meteoric rise from 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant to Major General is, and should be, a great source of pride to his friends, family, the people who served with him and under his command, and his hurling colleagues at club and Inter-County levels.

Prior to his entrance to the famed Cadet School in the Curragh, the only Military College Major General Kieran Brennan attended involved milking cows, cutting ditches with a slashers, thinning beet and turnips with hessian bags tied to his knees, and pulling calves from cows etc.- his words, not mine.

"Why the Army Kieran? I asked. "Is there a family connection with the defence forces?

"None whatsoever then, but presently there is nearly a platoon of Brennans serving. My two brothers, Gearoid and Canice gave distinguished service before retiring. Then my own two sons, Kieran and Shane are making their way. My nephew Stephen - Paudie's son - has just been commissioned, while yet another nephew, Eoin Fennelly is presently serving in Syria, and I hope to meet him next week out there".

"Not an all-out Platoon?" I observed.

"Well, a little Platoon", he laughed.

The Brennan family were totally devastated when, in 1985, their father, Kieran died from an accident in their farmyard. Being away from home, Kieran was somewhere in the Glen (Imaal) training Cadets. "A colleague came with the sad news. We were all very close to our Dad who was all things to our mother and his kids. I was rushed to the Dublin Hospital, but he had passed away. He was a very practical man,



who had the intelligence and forethought to realise that the way forward was through Education. We were each sent to Kieran's College in our turns. Each of us is eternally grateful to our parents for the sacrifices they made for us in the '70s, not an easy period for family life in Ireland", he said.

Kieran spoke glowingly, and with an obvious pride about the status and esteem afforded to the Irish Cadet Corp. He pointed out that the Cadet Corp is front and central to all important State occasions. He spoke too in like vein about the enormous pride felt by the entire Nation when the Corp were invited by the Kennedy Family to flank the cortege of the late President on its way to Arlington- a fact well commented upon in the Press and TV the World over.

Kieran Brennan talks a great talk about the values and opportunities available to all ranks of the Army. He speaks of a system which was endorsed by the High Command some years ago where a rank and file (NCO) soldier could enter the Officer Corp, where, on completion of a year-long course in the Cadet School, they become commissioned officers.

"The Defence Forces is an organisation of opportunity, among other things", he said. "I've known Cadets who have had tremendous careers as Officers. I've known enlisted soldiers who have had great NCO careers, who have had opportunity in technical areas of operation, and acquired apprenticeships. We now have a Professional Military education model, which endeavours to fully optimise the potential of all personnel if they have the necessary ambition.

In 1982 - October to be precise - two months after Kieran had played for Kilkenny in the victorious All Ireland Final against Cork - he was Platoon Commander of an anti-armour Platoon in the 52<sup>nd</sup> Batt. With his All Ireland medal in his pocket, he had great banter with his great friend, Dermot Early- God Rest him, (one of the greatest footballers not to win an All Ireland medal). That was a traumatic Tour!

Let Kieran take on the story.

"Within one week of taking up duty, three Irish soldiers were shot at a checkpoint at Tibnin Bridge . At the time we felt that it was as a result of enemy fire — Lebanon was a dangerous place at that time. It transpired later that one of our own soldiers had shot our three colleagues. That was a very tough tour for all the wrong reasons", Kieran's next tour was again in the Lebanon, in a base in Haddatha. Now with the rank of Captain, he was  $2^{\rm nd}$  in Command of an Infantry Coy.

"That was a real pressure situation where we were bunkered most of the time, because of the continuous action between the opposing forces - we were very lucky not to have had casualties. At times we were the meat in the sandwich in the continuous fire-fight between Hezbollah and Israeli forces", he said.

It was a dangerous place to be Kieran?

"It was no barrel of laughs I can tell you. Since the peace keeping started in the Lebanon, the Irish Army has lost 47 men. That probably answers your question"

A seven month tour of duty to KOSOVO followed in 2004 where, now in Command of an Infantry Company, the horrors and sufferings of the Balkan Conflict was much in evidence.

He recalled his most difficult posting in Chad in 2008/2009 as the Commander of a Multi-National Battalion

"I had a big number of Kilkenny lads whom I knew intimately in my Command of 400 Irish troops. I also had 70 Dutch Marines and 30 French engineers. Everything had to be airlifted into and out of Chad. We had a tough time protecting the Darfur refugees and internally displaced Chadians from Sudanese rebels who came across the border frequently. We were operating in full battle dress in temperatures of over 50 degrees plus, and frequent sand storms".

Major General Brennan had yet another posting far removed from the war zones that necessitated peacekeepers. Posted to Vienna, he enjoyed being part of an International gathering of Military Attaches, Ambassadors, and Leaders within the OSCE. He enjoyed being a member of the civvy street gang, doing civvy street work for a change.

The GAA was hugely important and valuable in framing your life?

"Unquestionably. I would not be talking to you about my life so far but for the influences of the GAA in my development. Even before my Conahy club days, there were games at home in the yard between Nickey, Paudie, Gearoid, and myself — Canice was still in the nappies — as tough and demanding as any I ever played, relatively speaking. St. Kieran's College was a tremendous learning curve for us all as well, but we should never lose sight of the fact that the men in our Conahy club like Dermot Healy, Martin Coogan, Mick Brennan and others were worth gold on reflection. I played in a Leinster Colleges Senior Final against St. Peter in 1973 when I was 15. I captained the winning Senior Colleges team against Sullivan's Quay of Cork in '75. Paudie was on that team". He played on the losing Kilkenny Minor All Ireland Team of 1974 when Mickie Lyng was the captain

Kieran with his brother, Paudie, at full forward, won his All Ireland minor medal in '75, beating Cork in the Final. "That was a super minor team", said Kieran. "Richie Power was corner back that day. Harry Ryan was our captain, and many of that team- John Henderson, Paddy Pender, Harry, Dicko (Hara), Paudie Lannon were to win senior All Irelands later", he said. He made it three from three (Colleges, Minor, U-21) in '77 when collecting his U-21 gong. Kieran made his debut — in a way — as a sub on the Kilkenny team in the Leinster Final against Wexford in 1976. That was the swan song of a mighty Kilkenny team, who were well heaten

"I was on the bench, but imagine being in the same dressing room as Henderson, Delaney, Purcell, Keher, Skehan, Orr; its what a young lad's dreams were made. They were such household names that they were known the land over by their surnames", said Kieran. He made his playing debut against Limerick in the National League of 1976 and remained on the panel until the end of the 1978 Championship, losing two league finals to Clare in the meantime.. He didn't return to the fold until '81.

"Why? I asked.

"I was caught up with my studies and Army duties", he answered.

Then the glorious Double Double years happened.

"What do you remember of them?"

"The '82 one is somewhat of a blur, but I have vivid memories of the '83 one. A windy day, and how Cork persisted in driving the ball down on top of Ger (Henderson), Cummins (Frank), Joe (Hennessy) and our half back line I will never fathom. Richie got that great goal, fashioned by the bravery of Harry Ryan, and Cork could not peg us back. I must say that Brian Cody has been a fantastic manager for Kilkenny, but I have to say too that Pat Henderson was truly a brilliant, intelligent tactician, and a fantastic man Manager, where he convinced you that you were the greatest hurler on the pitch. You couldn't but respond. He was bloody brilliant".

"To what do you attribute your success, Kieran?"  $\,$ 

"I suppose, I worked hard at it, and, as they say, behind every man there is a better woman, and Maria and the family have been my rock, and mega support all through it".

"Would you change any of it?"

"Not a milli-second", he smiled the smile of a contented man.

From Suttonsrath to Suttonsrath, and a lot in between!

A truly remarkable story.

# The Last of the '47 Team

Monsignor Edward "Ned" Kavanagh (1925-2018)

The death has occurred of Monsignor Edward "Ned" Kavanagh in Sacramento

Edward is the Last surviving member of Kilkenny 1947 All Ireland Senior Hurling team that beat Cork in the Final when he went in as a sub at centre-back. The win was the sole McCarthy Cup victory in the famine that lasted from the 1939 win over Cork to the 1957 win over Waterford.

A native of Urlingford he was one of four children and spent much of his time helping out with his family's bus transport and newspaper distribution business. He played his first competitive hurling during his school days in St. Kierans College. In a time when no Leinster minor hurling championships were played in 1942 and 1943, he made his debut on the senior inter-county scene at the age of twenty-two.

At club level he played for Tullaroan in the 1947 Senior Hurling Final when the side went down to Eire Óg by 3-10 to 0-13. After being ordained in St. Mary's Cathedral on June 6th in 1948, he was ordered to leave for his new post in America but he refused to go until Tullaroan were finished in the county championship. In it, he won a County Senior Hurling medal at full back on the side that defeated Carrickshock by 1-12 to 2-3. On the day 11,000 spectators attended the game in Nowlan Park where the gate receipts were £155-12 shillings and 6 pence.

After the game he left for New York and took a cross-country train to via Denver. In Sacramento Msgr. Kavanagh, pastor emeritus of St. Rose Parish served as a priest of the diocese for nearly 70 years, serving 58 of those years at St. Rose Parish as assistant pastor and pastor. Over the years Msgr. Kavanagh served as pastor, the parish expanded its Sunday Mass schedule from three to twelve.

During his time he baptized more than 16,000 people and celebrated 4,000 marriages. His extensive outreach extended to the Latino community and several Masses were celebrated each weekend in Spanish in the Kavanagh Community Center. Msgr. Kavanagh was appointed Chaplain of His Holiness on July 21, 1965 by Pope Paul VI and appointed an Honorary Prelate on Jan. 21, 1977 by Pope Paul VI

Aged 93 Edward got his final wish

when he passed away on St. Patrick's Day at the Mercy McMahon Terrace Centre. On Friday, Bishop Jaime Soto will preside at a funeral Mass for Msgr. Kavanagh in the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacramento. In his reflections on "Father Eddy" Bishop Jaime said "He cared deeply for the community, working tirelessly on behalf of the poor and children. 'Did you need a job? A place to live? Maybe an old car to get to that job? A few dollars for gas?' Monsignor Kavanagh would always find a way."

In his time in the United States he remained close to home and his family that he regularly visited. He also looked forward to getting and reading the copies of the Irish magazines and the local newspapers that were posted out to him.

James Maher was a man on a mission this year, determined to make up for lost time after two serious injuries had derailed his progress.

The St. Lachtain's man was first called up to the senior panel in 2015 but didn't make his full debut until the 2016 National League first round tie against storied rivals Tipp. He certainly made his mark scoring four points in a man of the match performance and looked sure for an extended run in the team until a freak farm accident in April ruled him out of the championship. James broke his kneecap and faced a lengthy period out of the game. Then, just as he was almost on the verge of recovery, he suffered another devastating injury last summer when breaking his jaw during an accidental clash in county training. Thus, in his own words, 'I didn't make a proper comeback until this year'. The 23-year-old started

the first round of the League against Cork and was an ever present all season, with a string of consistent displays leading to a well-deserved All-Star nomination. A good display which yielded three points, in the Wild Geese Trophy match against Galway in Sydney last month, rounded off the year nicely.

How would he reflect on Kilkenny's season overall? 'It was nice to win the League but the aim is always to win the All-Ireland, when you don't do that it's always going to be disappointing in the end.

James is steeped in hurling stock; his mother Gillian is a holder of three All-Ireland camogie titles, his father Noel played underage with Kilkenny and won three All-Ireland colleges' with St. Kieran's (winning captain in his last year like James) while his grandfather was the legendary Pa Dillon, holder of three Celtic crosses.

James' brother Darragh was right-half back on the Kilkenny minor team which reached this year's All-Ireland Final losing out to a fine Galway side

while another brother, Patrick plays with the club.

James was a county minor for three years and also played under-21 but interestingly while he played halfback and centre-back at minor,

with the seniors, he has played at wing-forward and midfield. How did this change in position come about? 'In my Freshers year at UCD, I was picked at centre-forward and midfield and I also hurled there for two years in the Fitzgibbon Cup where Nicky English was the manager. I think Brian and the senior selectors were at some of these games and felt I had something to offer in these positions.'


The transition from club to county can be a big one so I asked what were the main differences the Freshford native noticed? 'It is a fairly marked step up for sure, particularly the physicality and volume of training.' Honours: 1 All-Ireland Senior Colleges (Capt)

> Regarding the new structure of the hurling championship, James had some interesting views. 'It was great to get a load of games though for lads that aren't starting it is a bit of a disaster as it is hard to prove themselves in training games, where the focus is more on recovery with the games coming week in week out - they don't get as much of a look in.' James felt the new structure also had

an impact for the clubs. 'It can give the younger lads of 20/21 the chance to go travelling but for the lads that have to stay around it is more difficult as there can be a long gap between games.'

Staying with club matters and St. Lachtain's reached the county intermediate semi-final, losing out to Tullaroan. How does James view their future prospects? 'We have a lot of good young players, we had two on this year's county minor team - Cathal O'Leary and Darragh







(Maher). We are a small club struggling with numbers so it is good to have potential coming through.'

James has also excelled at athletics, having won All-Irelands at cross-country with the Kilkenny City Harriers while he has also competed for Ireland at the Celtic Games and in another discipline, Tetrathlon which is a combination of shooting, swimming, horse-riding and running.

I asked James if it had ever come to a point where he had to choose between the athletics and the hurling? 'If I had stuck with the athletics,

the ambition would have been to represent Ireland at the Olympics. However, I got sick and became very run-down from the sheer volume of training involved with both so it was a case of having to concentrate on the one sport.'

After a promising 2018, Kilkenny will eagerly look forward to the new season and we look forward to seeing James play his part for many years to come.

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# The Man who had Half the Philippines praying for Muckalee

Fr Martin Ryan (1929-2018)

Revered by the people of Muckalee Parish, Fr Martin Ryan gave most of his life as a Columban missionary in the Philippine Islands, but always managed to remain deeply involved with his native place. Throughout his fifty one years of exile, he made many visits home, primarily for matches, and when he couldn't get home, he included his beloved Muckalee in the bidding prayers at all his masses. Many a Filipino found him/herself praying for success for St Martin's in a county championship game.

His involvement in the amalgamation of the Coon and Muckalee/Ballyfoyle clubs resulted in the new club adopting his name. His proudest moment must have come when he saw the newlyfounded St Martin's win the 1984 County title and the All Ireland SH Club final.

In later years, his recording of the "Sporting History of Muckalee Parish" in a six-volume video was a priceless contribution to the history of sport in the Muckalee area.

Fr Martin's brother Lar was also a Columban missionary in the Phillipines where he was tragically killed in 1995. (See his obituary in Kilkenny GAA Yearbook of that year.)

There follows a tribute from Martin's lifelong friend Nicky Morrissey:

Fr. Martin was born January 22nd 1929 in Wildfield, Muckalee, Co Kilkenny, to Jim and Mary Ryan. He was the third eldest of a family of seven: Jim, Ned, Fr. Martin, Tom, Lar, John and sister Josie. He started primary school (old school) in 1933, and then started in the present new school in 1935. In 1942 he went as a boarder pupil to St Kieran's College for secondary education.

Fr Martin, like most Muckalee boys, had a great love of Gaelic Games, and played on St Kieran's teams in the forties. It was a great achievement for him as there was no competitive hurling in Muckalee at that time, only football.


During the summer holidays, Fr. Martin worked on the family farm, making hay, milking cows and doing all types of farm work. He also helped out on his neighbours' farms. Fr.Martin played on all the Muckalee football teams. At a very young age, he was a very talented player. His brothers Ned, Tom, Lar and John also played on Muckalee football teams.

In 1947, Fr. Martin joined the Columban Brothers in Dalgan, County Meath, where he studied for the priesthood and was ordained in 1954. He was assigned to the Philippine Islands, the mission of his choice. He spent the next 51 years of his life devoting all his energy and spiritual love to the people of the Philippines.

Before leaving for the Philippines, he visited every house in Muckalee to say goodbye. Fr. Martin was loved (and still is) by all the people of the parish. His first term was seven years, after which time he was allowed home for one year. He came home in 1962, before returning to the Philippines at the end of that year. He came home again in 1968 for a period of six years. In later years he came home almost every year until he retired in 1990. He would return to the Philippines yearly from this time onwards, and the last time he visited was February 2014. He had a feeling of happiness and a life well devoted to the Lord at this time.

His health gradually declined in the last few years, and he was very well cared for in his real home-from-home in St Columbans, County Meath. The people of Muckalee visited him regularly. During his retirement, Fr. Martin did a great amount of charity work, and was

always ready to help the parish priest of Muckalee, Fr Larry Wallace. He said Mass every morning for the Presentation Sisters in Parnell Street, Kilkenny. Fr. Martin was a very generous man, and any money he received was sent to support *I.T. Works*, an organisation he helped set up in the Philippines to support and help people struggling with substance abuse. He was very proud of how well it had done,



and how many people have recovered because of the I.T. Works

Fr. Martin's sporting career goes back to minor days. He played minor hurling with Castlecomer . there was only football in Muckalee then.

As mentioned before, he played on all the teams in St Kieran's and on all the Muckalee football teams. When studying for the priesthood in Dalgan, the seminarians were not allowed to play outside of Dalgan College. Fr. Martin made his place on the hurling and football teams within the college. Some of the best players in Ireland were studying there, so one had to be very good to make the team. They played challenge games against the County Meath football team, and UCD teams, on many occasions. He was also on the hurling team who played challenge matches against the Teacher Training College. On numerous occasions, Fr. Martin would have made the grade in both hurling and football in Kilkenny, if he had been allowed out of the seminary in Dalgan to play and practice.

When Fr. Martin came home after seven years in the Philippines in 1962, he won his place at corner forward on the Coon junior hurling team. He played in all the rounds and the team was beaten by Thomastown in the County Final of 1962.

Fr. Martin returned again on leave from his missionary work in 1968. He took over the training of the senior football team in Muckalee (with help from others) and brought them to a new level of fitness and skill. The team went on to win the first Senior Football Championship in the parish, and history was made. Fr.Martin, at 39 years of age, was good enough to play on that team – he played a couple of practice matches but got a knee injury that ruled him out of selection.

Fr. Martin introduced racquetball to the parish. He organised doubles tournaments in Mothel Handball Alley in the mid.1980's. He had a big input in the building of the community centre, and Mick Dunne of RTE performed its official opening. Fr. Martin and Mick played an exhibition game on opening day.


Fr. Martin always kept fit, he would be up early every morning (5am) and go for a few miles run or jog as he would say. He would travel to Dublin on a regular basis and stay with his good friend Ned Coogan, they would have serious friendly games of racquet ball in the Garda Headquarters at St Phoenix Park. He loved the challenge – no give on either side.

He just loved his native parish and all the people in it. Saying Mass in the church in Muckalee gave him great happiness. The Video of Sport in Muckalee gave him great satisfaction, as did the writing of the book about his life in Muckalee and the Philippines. Copies of this book are still available.

Kilkenny again went Cross-Channel to compete in the British Junior Championship in a competition they have dominated in recent years and they gained further success when defeating Warwickshire in the final to complete a hat-trick of consecutive titles.

Under the guidance of Christy Walsh once again, Kilkenny defeated Scotland 2-13 to 1-8 in the Semi-Final in Leeds, while Warwickshire defeated Hertfordshire in the other semi-final 0-13 to 1-7.

Kilkenny had a narrow victory against Warwickshire in the group stages, and a close final was expected, but Kilkenny gave a dominant display in the blistering heatwave, and they eased out to an emphatic victory.

The victors took control from the outset and by half-time victory was virtually assured as they led 3-7 to 0-4 at the interval.

Top scorer on the day lan Duggan got the ball rolling and his goal in the 17th minute put Kilkenny 1-4 to 0-1 ahead

Despite losing Martin Gaffney to injury, Kilkenny maintained their rhythm, composure and confidence and further goals from Mullinavat duo of James Culleton and team captain Michael Malone gave them a 3-7 to 0-4 lead at the interval.

Kilkenny continued their dominance after the restart, and they added three further goals during the second-half to run out resounding and convincing winners.

Michael Kenny blasted home an unstoppable effort to extend the Kilkenny advantage, and further goals from Ian Duggan and substitute Ben Hickey confirmed their far superior dominance as they ran out 6-12 to 0-9 winners.

The gulf in class was very evident right from the outset as the Tribesmen already had three points on the board inside two minutes, with the games outstanding performer Padraic Cunningham on target twice in those very early stages.

However, Kilkenny fought back to draw level in the 4th minute with a very well worked goal.

John Walsh punched to the net to finish off an excellent move involving Patrick McConigley, Michael Malone and Edward Moylan, but immediately Galway regained full control and goals from Jonathan Ryan and Matthew Redington confirmed their superior dominance as they led 2-12 to 1-3 at the interval.

Kilkenny battled away bravely during the 2nd half, with the Mullinavat trio of John Walsh, Michael Malone and Ian Duggan adding points to their account, but Paddy Cunningham was giving an exhibition for Galway at full-forward and he was scoring at will as they maintained supremacy. Kilkenny goalkeeper JJ O'Sullivan denied Galway three certain goals with a host of wonderful saves, but despite a late sub from substitute Mikey Jones, Galway had long assured of victory and they qualified for an All-Ireland Final showdown with Kerry, but the Kingdom winning out 2-13 to 2-11.



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
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

# John O'Shea (R.I.P.) - A Proud Son of Piltown

John O'Shea passed to his eternal reward on Monday 8th October leaving a family and community devastated at his passing at such a young age. The late Mr. O'Shea packed a lot into his almost sixty-six years as an entrepreneur, benefactor and wonderful community activist.

His sharp business brain was key to the founding of Iverk Produce in 1980. It is now one of the leading providers of fresh vegetables to over 750 retail stores nationwide, especially the Aldi and Super Valu Groups.

In 1991 Iverk Produce formed a joint venture with Total Produce plc, Europe's largest distributor of fresh produce.

Away from the business of Iverk Produce, John O'Shea was an extraordinary generous benefactor, helping many charities, organisations and individuals in need. This help was provided privately with the late Mr. O'Shea seeking no headlines for his generosity. Many in Piltown and further afield have acknowledged the kindness of Mr. O'Shea and the impact his help has had on the lives of so many people.

The influence of John O'Shea is visible everywhere around Piltown and the adjoining hinterland. Among the groups he provided support to were the local Tidy Towns, the Iverk Show, Piltown National School and the Piltown Community Centre,

which was one of his early initiatives. In truth there were many more!

Through his entrepreneurial vision John O'Shea provided both guidance and support to the Piltown Community Enterprise Centre which became a hub for local businesses. The success of the Centre is testimony to the business acumen of the late Mr. O'Shea. In more recent times his energy and expertise saw an investment of €360K in the old Piltown Creamery complex.

# Hurler's Co-Op Draw

Mention the 'Hurler's Co-Op Draw' in Kilkenny and it is fair to say that most people in the county will be familiar with the annual Kilkenny GAA fund raising venture. It may be even more familiar to some people as the 'The Piltown Draw'.

Thirty seven years ago four natives from Piltown became the driving force behind the 'Piltown Draw'. Sadly Sean Gorey, James O'Keeffe and now John O'Shea have been called to their eternal reward. Billy Norris, thankfully, remain hale and hearty and continues to guide the fortunes of the Hurler's Co-Op Draw locally in Piltown. The inspired leadership of these four men continues to see the draw remain a vital source of income for the GAA in Kilkenny.

Billy Norris recalls the early planning for the 'Piltown Draw'. At that time the DeLorean car manufacturing plant was operating in Belfast and John O'Shea thought 'why not have a DeLorean car for the first prize in the Hurlers Co-Op draw'. That headline grabbing prize never materialised, only to be replaced by a new house adorning the tickets as first prize for many years. John O'Shea was strongly of the view that 'we need to think big to ensure we made the sales'.

The 'Piltown Draw' organisers hit many a bumpy road, not least when the organisers led by John O'Shea were called into the Bank Manager in Carrick-on-Suir to explain a worrying overdraft. They left that meeting with the Bank Manager convinced that he need have no worries about his bank loan.

What is probably not know by many, according to Billy Norris is that discussions between the 'Piltown Draw' organisers and Government representatives was an important factor in the establishment of the National Fás Scheme around 1983.

## **Facilities Developed**

The initial purpose of the 'Piltown Draw' was to raise funds to develop the facilities at the local GAA club. Anyone visiting the facility nowadays cannot but be impressed by the pristine pitches, a hurling wall, floodlighting and a very impressive Club House. It is fair to say that the vision of the original founders of the 'Piltown Draw' has been well and truly fulfilled and the players, mentors and supporters of the club can proudly claim to have one of the finest facilities of any club, and not just GAA clubs, in Ireland.

The early days of the Piltown Draw saw club members travel far and wide selling tickets. Those journeys took them outside the Kilkenny borders. It is no exaggeration to say that many GAA clubs throughout the South East and Midlands of Ireland used their proceeds from the 'Piltown Draw' to good effect to enhance their facilities.

It became clear in the early years of the 'Piltown Draw' that its success required clerical help and that is when the long-serving administrator Gerri Hickey came on board. At the launch of the 2018 draw, Gerri recalled

three members of the organising committee, led by John O'Shea, knocking on her door seeking her interest in taking on the role of draw administrator...

In the early nineties as the Kilkenny GAA County Board sought to increase its own fund raising ventures, the organisers of the 'Piltown Draw' were approached with a view to creating a funding partnership. Following a series of meetings between the parties, agreement was reached to establish the 'Hurler's Co-Op Draw' with the administration remaining in Piltown with Gerri Hickey. John O'Shea played a key role in these discussions as he was strongly of the view that the interests of the Piltown GAA Club would be paramount in any new arrangement.



Kilkenny GAA County Board Treasurer, Barry Hickey, outlines some fascinating statistics on the last ten years of the draw noting that 'since 2008 Kilkenny GAA Clubs have received €2.448M, the Nowlan Park Development Fund has benefited to the tune of €864K, while prize money in the period amounted to €1.184M'.

Barry Hickey was also keen to point out that the redevelopment work undertaken in Nowlan Park and planned future work, would not have been possible without the 'Hurlers Co-Op Draw'.

The County Board Treasurer also noted that 'if Kilkenny GAA County Bard has been a significant beneficiary of the 'Hurler's Co-Op Draw', so too have the clubs of the county. Proceeds of €2.448M have been raised by clubs over the past ten years'.

# A Great Irishman

Former Kilkenny County Board Chairman, Ned Quinn, remembers John O'Shea as a great Irishman. Living in the neighbouring parish of Mooncoin, Mr. Quinn saw at close proximity the array of development which took place in Piltown under the guidance of John O'Shea,

It was during Ned Quinn's term as Chairman of the former Southern GAA Board that Iverk Produce came on board as their championship sponsors. That sponsorship remains to the present day.

As a regular at every 'Hurlers Co-Op Draw' since its inception, Ned Quinn pointed out that the draw never took place without John O'Shea being present to pull the numbers. And that often mean John O'Shea having to return from a business meeting somewhere around the country.

People far away from Ireland also benefited greatly from the generosity and astute business skills of John O'Shea. He had a long and close involvement with Vita, the Third-World Charity which strives to address agriculture developments and sustainable livelihoods in rural communities in the Horn of Africa.

John O'Shea's loss will be especially felt by his close family. He will be sadly missed also by the community of Piltown and the wider GAA community throughout Kilkenny and indeed further afield. But, he will be greatly missed also among many communities in the Horn of Africa.

John O'Shea lived a life in the service of others with his generosity helping to make a huge difference in the lives of many. What a wonderful legacy for one individual!

Since the National Hurling League became a contest of two groups of six teams in 2012 we have had the most competitive and high quality NHL games in the history of the competition. There are few dead rubbers, lots of close results and very serious games of exceptionally high quality. Kilkenny have won four of the seven leagues in the 6-team format.

The new championship structure may well cause much harm to the Allianz League since now teams have a relatively short window of opportunity after the league to train for the early first rounds. It is unfortunate because the current format has treated us well, though the playing of quarter-finals cost the clubs a championship weekend. After a dismal 2017 there was much pessimism among supporters about Kilkenny's prospects and this gloom was deepened after the first two rounds.

However Kilkenny rocketed to victory despite a poor start, losing narrowly to Cork and Clare in the first two rounds. They gained great momentum from the return of TJ Reid for round 3 and his stirring performances showed him to be the best player in the whole contest. It was also a measure of how much Kilkenny depended on him, a factor also illustrated in the championship. Several players were blooded in pressure games and the experience accelerated the progress of Martin Keoghan, John Donnelly, Enda Morrissey, James Maher and Richie Leahy among others. The Walsh Cup is worthy of note this year if only because of the manner of the final result. After facile wins over Laois and Kildare and a close encounter with Offaly, Kilkenny and Wexford met in the final. They finished level 1-24 each after extra time following a highly entertaining contest. Under experimental rules each side had five 65s to win. As darkness and cold fog closed in, Wexford won the shoot-out 3-2. Opinion was divided among the crowd as to the merits of deciding games in this manner.







# CORK 2-19 KILKENNY 0-18

Kilkenny's attempt to win an unprecedented third All Ireland Intermediate Hurling title in succession came to nought at the hands of Cork in the All Ireland final played in Nowlan Park on Saturday 28th July 2018. The Leesiders recorded their ninth title when they had the better of a closely fought game. Two goals from towering Cork full-forward Dan Mangan proved the crucial scores as the St. Catherine's player found the opposition net in both halves

The opening stages were evenly contested and after six minutes scores were level at two points apiece before Cork playing with the advantage of a strong wind took the lead thanks to Mangan's first goal. Undeterred Kilkenny fought their way back to parity after ten minutes thanks to scores from centrefielder Paul Hennebry and two James Bergin frees. A pointed free from Stephen Condon re-established Cork's lead and the Munster team registered the next four points in succession, two from former county senior player Cormac Murphy. James Bergin kept Kilkenny in touch displaying his accuracy from placed ball but further Cork minor scores from Michael Collins, Stephen Condon (free) and Jack Walsh saw the Munster team head for the dressing room at the interval 1-10 to 0-8 to the good.

Kilkenny's best chance of a goal came on the resumption when Conor Hennessy brought a good save from Cork goalkeeper Shane Hurley, the net minder turning a good low shot round the post. Bergin converted the resultant 65'. Despite playing with the strong breeze to their backs Kilkenny found it difficult to reduce the deficit in the second half and by the three-quarter stage the Leesiders were 1-16 to 0-13 to the good. Kilkenny raised their game at this stage and appeared to be timing a final run when Conor Hennessy and Patrick Walsh put a hat-trick of points together between the 49th and 52nd minutes to reduce the deficit to three points but then came Mangan's smartly taken second goal for Cork which put the game beyond the reach of the home team.

It was a brave effort from an entirely new Kilkenny team from last year's All Ireland winners due to the rules of the competition. Credit to Manager Dave O'Neill and selectors Nigel Skehan,, John Brennan and Tom Phelan for their team and its performance despite a short preparation time.




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# No Silven, but back on the big Stage

Not since the introduction of the "backdoor" in 1997 had the minor championship witnessed such an overhaul as it did in 2018.

The age limit on players was reduced from 18 to 17 and two round-robin stages were brought in. The first would be played at provincial level with a later one at the quarter finals.

It was through this new format that Kilkenny hoped to regain the Irish Press Cup for the first time since 2014.

Their campaign began on 13th May against Dublin in Parnell park in what was billed as Round One of Tier One. While seven goals were scored in all that day, it was the point scoring of Conor Kelly that proved the real difference between the sides.

Dublin enjoyed a decent start to the game, taking advantage of their size and strength advantage. In the third minute, full-forward Luke Swan put the ball in the Kilkenny net. They held this lead for the first quarter before Kilkenny edged in front. The remainder of the first half saw the lead switch over and back again before Kilkenny went into the break with a three point advantage.

Playing with the breeze in the second half, Kilkenny began to pull away, thanks in no small part to the aforementioned Kelly. The O'Loughlin Gaels clubman scored the opening three points of the half. Ultimately he would contribute a haul of 12 points to Kilkenny's winning margin of 3-23 to Dublin's 4-12.


The second outing in the Leinster round-robin for Kilkenny was a home game against Wexford. From early on that day, it looked like it would all be one-way traffic, with Kilkenny taking a four point lead after only five minutes.

Wexford however played themselves back into the game brilliantly and were it not for the shot stopping of Jason Brennan, Kilkenny could have been in trouble.

The second half though saw Kilkenny completely dominate the contest. They outscored their opposition by 3-12 to 1-3, leaving the Cats with two wins from two.

That would become three from three after the final group game against Laois in O'Moore Park on 25th May.







Cian Kenny, Jack Doyle and Niall Higgins all played their part in what turned out to be a 14 point win.

With the cessation of the group stage, a Leinster quarter final against Westmeath was next on the cards. On a windy day in Mullingar, Kilkenny were never really in trouble throughout the first half, leading by five at half time.

The opening minutes of the second half put paid to any notion the hosts might have had of staging a comeback. Goals from Jack Buggy, George Murphy and Eoin Guilfolye inside five minutes brought the contest to an effective end.

That high scoring form would follow Kilkenny into a semi-final against Offaly, though the game would prove to be a much tighter affair.

Having had an early goal disallowed, Kilkenny found themselves under pressure from the Faithful county. Ciaran Teehan's goal for the home side on the 17 minute mark ultimately meant that for the first time in 2018, Kilkenny would go into the break with a deficit

Conor Kelly dragged Kilkenny back into the game early in the second half with some impressive point scoring, only for Offaly to find the net again, this time through DJ McLoughlin.

However, with 11 minutes to go, Cian Kenny found the posts twice before a final point from Kelly saw the game out.

A repeat of the 2017 Leinster final beckoned for Richie Mulrooney's men, and it would prove to be a thriller.


13 goals were scored between Kilkenny and Dublin in a remarkable game with Dublin eventually emerging victorious. Luke Swan, the Dublin full forward who had provided Kilkenny with so many problems back in May, again scored 3-1.

It was Kilkenny who enjoyed the better start in the game, with a goal each from George Murphy and Killian Hogan giving them a seven point lead after just six minutes. Amazingly, by the nine minute mark, Dublin had scored three goals themselves. Things continued in that vein through to half time, with Kilkenny leading by 4-8 to 3-10.

The second half started no differently. Two quick goals from Dublin gave them a five point cushion. A great strike from Conor Kelly found the Dublin net and helped Kilkenny to reduce the deficit but Swan completed his hat-trick moments later. The final scoreline was 6-19 to 7-12 in favour of the Dubs.

The loss meant that instead of Kilkenny progressing straight to an All Ireland semi final, they would instead compete in a second round-group stage.

First up in that group was Galway in Semple Stadium on 15th July. The tribesmen had already played one group game already, beating Limerick the previous weekend. Victory for them would assure them of qualification and so it proved that when they final



whistle went, they were seven points the better team against Kilkenny. That scoring difference would prove a portent of things to come.

Losing to Galway meant that when Kilkenny faced Limerick the following week, it was a 'winner takes all' scenario. This was the third time in four weeks that the Treatymen played in Thurles and in the opening stages, they looked the more at home. After 20 minutes, they were a point ahead but at that point, the game began to turn.

Kilkenny reeled off 1-4 in the closing ten minutes of the first half, Jack Morrissey bagging the goal.

The Noresiders picked up where they left off after the break with Jack Morrissey inflicting yet more damage. A goal from Killian Hogan was the final nail in the Limerick coffin and Kilkenny now found themselves facing into an All Ireland semi final against neighbours Tipperary.

Much like in the game against Limerick, it was in the ten minutes before half time that would be decisive. In this instance, Kilkenny managed a haul of 1-3 without reply which meant they returned to the their dressing room at half time six points up.

That lead was maintained for much of the second half but in the closing minutes, Tipperary piled on the pressure. Substitute Mikey O'Shea scored 1-2 from play but they had left themselves to high a mountain to climb.

A two point victory meant that Kilkenny were through to their first All Ireland final in four years. Galway would be the opposition, a repeat of the quarter final group fixture played a month previously. Much as they had done in other games, a lightning start put Kilkenny in the driving seat. They hit the first four points of the game without reply. The last of those was a superb sideline cut from Ciaran Brennan.

With that, Galway awoke from their slumber and reeled off the next six points. Not to be deterred, Kilkenny fought back into the lead with, remarkably, another point from a lineball. This time from the hurl of Jack Buggy.

By half time, Kilkenny were two up. The opening stages of the second half maintained these tight margins, but by the beginning of the fourth quarter, Galway had begun to show their class.

A wonderful solo effort from Evan Duggan put them three up for the first time and they would go on to extend that lead.

Despite a late goal chance from Kilkenny, Galway ran out victors on a scoreline of 0-21 to 0-14, thereby repeating their seven point winning margin from July.

For the fourth year in succession, Kilkenny would be returning home without an All Ireland but much solace can be taken from the level of their performances throughout the campaign and their return to the biggest stage.

The Handball year for 2018 was another busy time for all the people involved in the sport. There was plenty of activity on the courts of Ireland and at the World championships in Minneapolis, but the main talking point of the year were the proposals for the growth and development of the game. These proposals have generated considerable debate across the country and have led to excitement regards the future of handball.

On the playing front the Kilkenny players were very active during 2018 with success on the National and International stage. With local players involved in all codes of handball there were plenty of titles brought back to the county during the year.

The highlights of the year were the victories in the All Ireland 60 x 30 Intermediate and Minor championships. Here the county was the dominant force in the Minor grade where it won both titles on offer along with success in the Intermediate Singles championship.

60 x 30 - As one of the strongest participating counties in the 60 x 30 championships there was All Ireland success for Kilkenny in a number of adult and juvenile grades. The county had some good outings in Croke Park during the season when winning Minor and Intermediate titles. In early October Jack Holden from Kilfane brought home the All Ireland Minor Singles title to his club. The young player dominated the Leinster championship and was a comfortable winner over Cavan,21-8, 21-7 in his All Ireland semi-final. The Kilfane player continued this form in the final against Daire Keane (Kerry) as he controlled the match when winning in two games, 21-12, 21-8. This was the second time the club has won this title with the previous winner Liam Egan winning in 1950.

Later in the month it was the turn of the Clogh

club to dominate at headquarters. First up was the All Ireland Minor Doubles final with Ciáran Cooney and Billy O'Neill taking on Cork's Conor Walsh and Cian O'Driscoll. The Kilkenny duo had improved steadily throughout the campaign and having defeated Cavan in three sets in the semi-final they were quietly confident of success in the final. A good start was rewarded by them taking the first set 21-10 with the Munster duo levelling the match when winning the second 21-11. The third, and deciding set, was a close affair up to 10 when Ciáran and Billy made a break and secured the title when winning the game 21-10. A great win for the Clogh pair who brought the title back to Kilkenny for the first time since 2005.

To complete a good season for the North Kilkenny club Brian Mahon captured the Intermediate Singles title with a victory over Waterford in the final. This was a tremendous feat for Brian as he had to juggle the traditional game along with his successful exploits at the World championships in August. His Leinster championship resulted in a win over Wexford in the provincial final. This was followed up with a two set victory over Ryan Mullan (Tyrone) in the semi-final to set up an All Ireland final meeting with Waterford's Philip Butler. Here Brian was dominant in the first game when winning 21-9, with the Munster player upping his game to take the second set 21-13. In the third game Brian regained the advantage to close out the match 21-13, and secure the Intermediate Singles crown for the county whose last victory in this grade was in 2009.

For the second year running the Clogh/Kilfane pairing of Ciara Mahon and Aoife Holden contested the Ladies Open Doubles final where they lost to Cork's six in a row chasing pair Catriona Casey and Aishling O'Keeffe. In the



Mens Open Doubles Ciaran Neary (Talbots Inch) and Keith Bourke (O'Loughlins) were beaten by eventual champions Meath's Garry McConnell and Brian Carroll at the semi-final stage.

Otherwise in the adult 60 x 30 season it was our Doubles competitors who brought home national success when winning two All Ireland titles. In Emerald Masters A Doubles Philly Parsons (O'Loughlins) and Eamonn Purcell (Windgap) reversed the 40 x 20 defeat to Cork when defeating John Herlihy and John Hedigan in the final 21-6, 9-21, 21-17, and in Diamond Masters A Doubles Johnny Brennan (Mothel) and Joe Hennessy (O'Loughlins) needed three sets to defeat Tipperary's Billy and Pakie Mullins 7-21, 2-14, 21-12. The county also suffered defeats in U21 Doubles where Dylan Caufield lost to Galway, in Masters B Doubles when John Morrissey (O'Loughlins) and Willie Murphy (Kilfane) were defeated by Limerick and in Ladies Junior B Doubles Windgap's Margaret Purcell and Caoimhe O'Shea had to concede a walkover in the final due to injury.

The county contested four All Ireland Singles finals which all resulted in defeats. In the U21 final Dylan Caulfield (Kilfane) lost out to Diarmuid Mulkerrins from Galway 21-5, 21-6 and in the Diamond Masters Singles decider Johnny Brennan (Mothel) found the going tough when losing to Billy Mullins (Tipperary) 21-5, 21-12. There was no luck for our ladies in their two finals with Dearbhail O'Keeffe (Kilfane) going down to the impressive Sinead Maher (Tipperary) 21-10, 21-3 in Junior Singles and Margaret Purcell (Windgap) coming out on the wrong side of a 21-6, 21-4 score line to Laura Finn (Sligo).

The county's juvenile had a very successful year in the traditional big court championships. The young Kilkenny players contested seven finals winning titles in four grades. First up to collect a winners medal was Amy Brennan (Clogh) who was victorious in the Girls U14 final when she defeated Clodagh Munroe (Tyrone) in two sets. Also successful for the Clogh club on the day was Kyle Dunne as he produced a fantastic display to win the Boys U16 title with a tie break defeat of Eoghan McGinnity from Monaghan. The Kilfane club also had two winners in Boys U14 Doubles and Girls U16 Singles. The U14 crown was won by Kyle Jordan and Sean O'Keeffe in impressive style by overcoming the strong challenge of Charlie Treen/Sean Callaghan (Waterford) in three sets and in the Girls U16 decider Roisin O'Keeffe was in top form when comfortably defeating Chloe Philpott from Clare in two games

Unfortunately the county suffered three defeats at the finals when James Love (Clogh) and Tom Carroll (Talbots Inch) were beaten in Boys U17 Doubles by Cork, Eoin O'Brien (Windgap) lost his U17 Singles decider to Waterford and in Girls U16 Doubles Aine Duggan and Doireann Knox were runners up to Tipperary.

# 40 x 20

-The first action of the year was in the 40 x 20 Singles and Juvenile championships which were completed in Kingscourt on the St. Patricks weekend. Here Kilkenny contested adult and juvenile All Ireland finals with success in three under age grades. In the Minor Singles final, Eoin Brennan (Kells) was defeated for the second consecutive year when he lost out to Tiarnan Agnew (Clare) 21-8, 21-9 and in Ladies Junior B Singles, Margaret Purcell (Windgap) lost to Eimear Ní Bhiadha (Galway) 2-14, 21-11.

On the Bank Holiday Monday it was the turn

of the county's juveniles to make their way to Kingscourt as they played in six All Ireland finals. Here the county collected three titles when winning the Boys U14 and U16 Doubles and U17 Singles championships. In Boys U14 Doubles, Daniel Hanrahan and Thomas Sharkey from Galmoy defeated Conor Owens/ Patrick McCann (Tyrone) 15-7, 15-8 to claim the title and in the Boys U16 Doubles, Kyle Dunne (Clogh) and Jack Doyle (Windgap) beat Tipperary's Jack McGrath and Conor O'Dwyer 21-4, 21-7. Completing the Kilkenny wins at the Cavan venue, Jack Holden (Kilfane) was a comfortable winner of the Boys U17 Singles grade when defeating his Donegal opponent 21-5, 21-11.

In the Girls U14 and U16 Singles finals, Amy Brennan (Clogh) and Roisin O'Keeffe (Kilfane) lost out to Tyrone opposition. Amy lost her final 15-10, 15-8 and Roisin was beaten 21-9, 21-15 by her Northern opponent. There was also defeat for John Doheny (Galmoy) in Boys U15 Singles as he was beaten by Tipperary by two sets to one.

To complete the 40 x 20 season the All Ireland Doubles finals were also played at the Cavan venue with the county collecting two titles. The Clogh duo Shane Dunne and Padraig Cooney completed a good U21 campaign with a 21-7, 21-13 over Tipperary's Colin Ryan/Jason English and in Silver Masters A Doubles Eddie Bourke (O'Loughlins) and Willie Holden (Kilfane) defeated Fergal Coughan and Tom Kirby (Clare) in three games, 21-12, 13-21, 15-21.

Elsewhere there was defeat for Eoin Brennan (Kells) / Padraig Foley (Windgap) in Minor Doubles when losing to Clare, in Ladies Junior B Doubles Windgap duo Margaret Purcell and Caoimhe O'Shea lost to Galway. Defeat was also the order of the day in Ladies Junior Doubles when Aoife Holden (Kilfane) and Claire Love (Clogh) lost out to a strong Tipperary pair and in Emerald Masters Doubles Philly Parsons (O'Loughlins) and Eamonn Purcell (Windgap) were defeated in three sets by Cork. There was also disappointment in Junior B Doubles as Kells duo Anthony Martin and Diarmuid Burke from Kells came out on the wrong side of a 2-1 defeat to Waterford, and in Intermediate Doubles Ciáran Neary (Talbots Inch) and Brendan Burke (Kells) came up short against Cork.

# **World's**

The World Handball Championships were played in Minneapolis, USA during ten days in August. The championships were dominated by the travelling Irish players with all the major grades coming back to Ireland. The poor performance of the host country in almost all grades leaves the future of these championships up for debate before they return to Ireland in 2021. From Kilkenny's point of view the travelling party returned with medals in a number of competitions.

In the Men's B championship, Brian Mahon (Clogh) was top seed in the grade and he lived up to the favourites tag by claiming the title. Coming through a field of forty nine entrants the Clogh player was in great form all week and recorded some notable wins along the way. In the decider he faced the second seed Seamus O'Conghaile from Galway in a match that went to the tie break set. In the Mens 23 and under grade, Brian and his partner Galen Riordan (Wexford) toppled the top seeds, Daniel Hedigan / Michael Hedigan (Cork) in an exciting final, 21-14, 20-21, 11-4 to add another



gold medal to his growing collection of trophies. Elsewhere at the championships Shane Dunne (Clogh) was part of the Irish team having won the right to represent when winning the Irish National 19 and under title earlier in the year. The North Kilkenny player teamed up with Sean Kerr (Tyrone) to claim the 19 and under Doubles crown. In the Ladies under 23 grade Ciara Mahon (Clogh) was defeated in the final by Ciana Ni Churraoin (Galway) and in Girls 19and under Doubles Aoife Holden (Kilfane) partnered Ella Donnellan (Clare) to a silver medal when losing the decider to a Kildare pair.

In the juvenile grades players from Kilfane and Mothel will have fond memories of these championship. In the Boys 13 and under grade Kyle Jordan was the dominant player when winning all four titles on offer over the ten days, two Wall ball and two Four Wall. His sister Katie also collected two gold medals, one each in the Four wall and Wall ball girls 11 and under grade.

There was also glory for Noelle Dowling from Mothel when she teamed up with Clodagh Munroe (Tyrone) to win the girls Wall Ball 15 and under Doubles title. In the girls 15 and under four wall event, Noelle progressed all the way to the final where she lost out to top seed from Tyrone.



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# Paddy Deegan Getting to Like the No.4 Jersey

Over the last two years Kilkenny supporters have witnessed the integration of a large number of new players into the Kilkenny Senior Hurling panel and team and are following those players' progress with interest and encouragement. One of those young players is O'Loughlin Gaels, Paddy Deegan who, having played a number of games for Kilkenny senior team around the midfield area in 2017 has become domiciled in the full



back line in the last year. Speaking to Paddy it is apparent that, like many players, he is happy to play anywhere but states he has become accustomed to and grown to like the corner back role.

Son of former O'Loughlin Gaels player Eugene and with Mam, Mary, hailing from the Galvin family of Clara, Paddy was probably always destined to be a hurler. He can remember coming to St. John's Park as an Under 6 with coach Hugh Mahon in charge. Weather was no issue as there was always the option of ground hurling in the Hall on rainy days. On to St. John's senior school where there was plenty of hurling with teacher Brian Roche looking after teams with Padraig O'Neill and John Cooney providing the support. At second level with Kilkenny CBS there was to be the disappointment of losing three senior All Ireland Colleges finals in a row against a Jason Forde inspired Nenagh CBS team, a combined Waterford Colleges team featuring a number of current Waterford players and old rivals St. Kieran's College.

Strangely, while Paddy was a constant on O'Loughlin Gaels underage teams, he enjoyed little or no success. His team seemed to fall in between two very successful groups





representing the St. John's Park outfit and Paddy was a minor player before he won an underage championship match with his club. Having done so that team reached the County Minor final before losing out to a talented Rower Inistioge team. His first championship title was at under 21 level in 2015 when O'Loughlin Gaels defeated

Glenmore in the county final. This success was followed quickly with a county senior title the following year with a victory over Ballyhale Shamrocks.

Having spent time on the training panel, a full call up to the county senior panel followed the January after the County Final success. A student in Maynooth University at the time without a car Paddy had to travel from there to Dublin and get a bus to Kilkenny for training for a time, before Richie Hogan came to the rescue, providing transport to and from Dublin. Paddy made his first senior appearance for Kilkenny as a sub against Waterford in a league game and got his first start in the following game against Cork. The O'Loughlin Gaels man was on his way.

Asked to pick his favourite players growing up Paddy identifies fellow O'Loughlin Gaels players Brian Hogan and Martin Comerford along with club stalwarts Alan O'Brien, Alan Geoghegan and Brian Kelly while at County level Tommy Walsh and JJ Delaney would be his choice as two of the best defenders ever.

While Paddy can see the benefit of the new inter county structure for the players involved and for supporters, he cautions that he would not be too happy if he were a club player as they suffered badly under the new system this year, with some of the best months of the year for hurling passing by with no championship games.

Looking forward, following on Kilkenny's Allianz Hurling League success and an encouraging championship Paddy feels the outlook is extremely positive and with the good young players coming through Kilkenny will be winning All Irelands again in the near future.





# THE WEXFORD MAN IN THE HILLS

### Barrie Henriques meets Jim Bolger

The elevation of Wexford's J.S.Bolger to the pantheon of equine Royalty is a story worth the telling by any standards. It is a story of courage, entrepreneurial nous, luck, and downright cussedness. From a very early age he knew that his DNA would shuffle him towards the equine world, even though he was a qualified Accountant in the Motor Industry. He was a showjumper of modest success, and all through his show jumping sojourn, he was convinced beyond redemption that his life's future would most definitely be corralled-pardon the pun- by horses of one denomination or another. But racing was his first equine love However whilst his show jumping CV career was of a modest spectre, he did manage to engage a certain Major Muammar Gadafi in a business transaction which saw cash exchanged for a decent show jumper.

He began in the sport with six of "my own horses", or to be correct, "six of our own horses" he smiled. Maybe the fact that his wife Jackie was transiting their cosy sitting room at the time prompted the meticulous Jim to make the hurried correction. Having taken out his Trainers license in July 1976, he had four winners. It wasn't exactly burning the bushes time as far as racing headlines were concerned, but it was striking the match time. "Two of the winners came in the same day, one in Clonmel and one in the Curragh", he beamed. Far greater than I have chronicled the rise and rise of one of Wexford's finest in the high rolling world of equine perfection. It is well known that whilst JS Bolger Racing in '76 had barely rippled the waters of racing excellence, the following year, with a little help from friends swelling the yard to 18 equine athletes, he rattled off 22 winners. The acorn of success had broken through the top soil! The pragmatic Jim Bolger was fully aware that the realisation of his ambitions would need a relocation of operation. He got a fortuitous break when the iconic Nugent racing family inquired if he could be interested in leasing Lohunda Park on the Clonsilla Road, not too removed from his own 22-box yard on the Coolmine Road, Clonsilla, where he had started. His equine stock

had risen to 35 horses including 10 from Sir Hugh's Family.

The Bolger family tree is an impressive creation of various tangents. Jim worked on the Family farm in Wexford with his six siblings, as he attended and negotiated a high standard of Education Christiaan with the Brothers in Enniscorthy. He became very familiar with the hard-work ethic that was, and still is his mantra for success. With no Television, telephones only with the local Priest, Doctor, or Garda, Jim Bolger never saw a film until his 16th Birthday. He

never saw a double decker bus until he went to Dublin as a cost clerk in an electrical firm. A pair of horses was the unaffordable Massey Ferguson of many Farming families including the Bolgers. His Aunt was married to the Irish Free State's first Ambassador to Washington, Robert Brennan, as well as being the Founder of the Irish Press newspaper, and National Director of Elections for Arthur Griffiths and Michael Collin's Sinn Féin Party. He had been condemned to death after the 1916 Rising, but was sent to Frangach instead with Collins and many more.

Jim spoke with a wry smile of the days in Coolmine Road and how the sale of a show jumper for £13,000 precipitated his "arrival" into racing, with an eight boxes at the back of the house. He spoke of the gallops in the Phoenix Park which finished outside the American Embassy, when Jackie would pick up the tack etc. He remembered when they only had three staff, one of whom, David Downey, still plays an active role to this day. He recalled with obvious reflected satisfaction that his first Group one winner was a filly called Condessa. He spoke of a man who gave him 20k to buy a horse for him. "I bought Condessa for 13k but I just couldn't for the life of me come near anything else, so I had to give him back 7k. That hurt, I can tell you. Condessa proved a very lucrative purchase for the owner, as she won the Yorkshire Oaks in 1982 against all the odds in a hugely eventful race. We also sold her on for £350k, so all were happy with that arrangement. He had two Group One victories in 1983

when Give Thanks won the Irish Oaks and the Musadora, and Flame of Tara won the Coronation Stakes at Ascot. The astute Bolger recalled how he tried to buy Give Thanks at the Newmarket sales, but a retired American Banker, Ogden White was "carrying too heavy" for the Bolger purse. However when Jim was asked for his opinion about the filly, his honest appraisal was enough for the American to plunge. The silver lining to the cloud of disappointment came when Mr Ogdon White asked Jim to train her, hence the story about Give Thanks.

In '82, Jim Bolger arrived in Kilkenny. He built two gallops- one a sand

gallop- with both rising 150 feet. He also started a stud farm down in Wexford (Redmondstown) managed by his brother Paddy. It was not a bed of roses for JS Bolger Racing. They sailed close to the wind on the books betimes. Never actually insolvent in his own words, but there were times when they were exposed in matters of book balancing. In 1992 the fastest horse ever to win the Irish Derby, St Jovite came storming home pulling a train to win by 12 lengths. He coupled the King George with the Derby. A magnificent athlete, his success was not without controversy. An eleventh hour decision by the Turf Stewards freed Christy Roche to take the mount. It was not the first nor would it be the last time that Jim Bolger and Officialdom would face-off across the table of autocracy. He was the best racehorse in the World and rated as such that year.

For a man who was a late vocation to the serious business of racing,

Jim Bolger had an uncanny methodology in eauine judgement. Even before he got serious about his ambition, he would be a floater at all of the major auctions, bloodstock in particular Goffs. After the St. Jovite carousel of euphoria had slowed, he invested in a stallion called Last Tycoon. A Breeders Cup winner, with an astonishing reputation and bloodline. He rolled the dice, and piled on the chips. It was a disaster that practically dismantled JS Bolaer Racing. A mistake admitted Jim. However with the cool head and encouragement of Jackie beside him, he started to build up his

stock of good mares. He went "all in" backing the stallion Galileo. JS Bolger struck gold.

you have a mind to, grab a DVD "The Master of Cool" produced by Setanta. It's all there for the World to marvel at. Given that many of the Bolger horses are carrying names as Gaeilge, I asked him about his fluency with the Irish language. "I love the language, and whilst I would not be very fluent, it wouldn't bother me if the News was as Gaeilge or Béarla. English bookies and indeed some Irish commentators have problems with pronunciation, but they compromise by calling "the Bolger horse" he smiled

The World and his Mother now know that the Racing Empire up in Kilkenny's Coolcullen is a mecca of equine excellence and success. Its racing progeny have graced the race courses from Kilkenny to the US, France, Germany, Australia, Hong Kong, et al. In equine parlance the name Bolger is emblazoned in neon wherever horse racing is mentioned. If racing was and still is Jim Bolger's greatest sporting love, you would not be more than the "minimum distance" behind, if you suggested that hurling was a close second. He was around as a nipper when the greatest band of Wexford hurlers swept all before them during the halcyon days of Rackards, Wheeler, O'Donnell, Flood, Morrisseys, English – I could stay rattling on. He had a particular grá for the elder Nickey. Any time you would mention that era, those giants of hurlers, the battles with Cork


and Galway, and Kilkenny, the Bolger persona would bubble with the impossible hope that a time warp could be reversed. "I met Ned Wheeler the other day at poor Tom Neville's funeral", he said. "Still as straight as a rush. A great Wexford man", he smiled.

And so we come to Newbridge, hurling, and the Cancer Research annual game in St.Conleth's Park. The how, why, who, and when was put to the Master of Cool. "It was going on between myself and Davy Russell. I am sure that if Davy wasn't a jockey that he could have won an All Ireland with Cork at some stage. He was that good. He was aware that there were plenty of hurling men on my staff including myself, and he persisted with the query of when are all ye Kilkenny lads going to take on the jockeys. Davy persisted for a couple of years, and then I met Professor Fitzpatrick who was doing marvellous things in the field of Cancer research. He asked me could I come up with something to raise money for his Research. I suggested that we could broaden the idea to include golden oldies, former stars of other sports and have a 15 a side game of hurling. We could go somewhere with the game, have an admission fee etc. get a bit of sponsorship as well. Davy was still pushing the idea, when I met a great man, the Chairman of the Kildare County Board Jack Wall -also a labour TD for South Kildare- at a function. I told him about the idea, and he asked why not play in Newbridge. I asked if he was offering the ground gratis, and he was delighted to do so. I was somewhat apprehensive initially, but we had over 2,000 the first day, and last year we had over 5,500 coming through the gates. We have a few very big sponsors but most of the money-and we are closing on the €1m figure-is

from individuals. The agreed house rules initially were that all players had some affinity with the racing industry. I don't know whether Davy or I took a bit of a swerve, but eventually guests became the norm, and a more welcome norm it became. Last year for instance we had 83 All Ireland medallists and 66 All Stars playing. It is a PR exercise of monumental value, as everybody stays around for photographs, and autographs. I have only had one refusal over all of the years. Players and supporters come from all over the land in support. It is such a marvellous occasion. We obviously don't go near teams who are in an All Ireland Final, but the golden oldies like DJ Carey, Ollie Canning, Damien Fitzhenry, Lee Chin, and many, many others show up every year. Umpires include Colm O'Rourke, Ronnie Delaney, Ted Walsh, Tadhg Furlong and Sean O'Brien. Lineswomen are Katie Walsh and Miriam O'Callaghan".

We spoke further about the state of hurling. He gloried in the excitement of the Championship scene. His next game was to watch his own club Oylgate play in the Leinster Junior club Championship. He would be totally agin the idea of a Professional game. He is certain that even though the game is such a terrific spectacle presently, but the players of yore were equally as good, from a relative viewpoint.

I could give many hours talking to Jim Bolger. My opinion of him has not changed one iota from the first time we met. He is still the most modest, decent, God-fearing individual, who still subscribes to this mantra of expecting nothing more from his fellow man than an honest attention to everything he does and says.

# She's Got the POWER!

Say Hello to Katie Power.

She plays camogie for Piltown and Kilkenny. She is a three-time All Star. She commutes half an hour each way every day to work in Michael Lyng Motors on the Hebron Road in Kilkenny. She loves the chicken goujons in Langton's, albeit – being an athlete – not as regularly as she'd prefer. She idolised DJ Carey when she was younger and still does. She has a rake of All Ireland under-age medals. She has one All Ireland senior medal. She hopes to hell she'll have a second All Ireland medal by the time she turns 28 next November.

The lack of a second – or third or fourth – medal niggles her. It niggles her even more because in her teenage years she never knew a rainy day with the county. She was part of a cohort that included Denise Gaule and Anna Farrell, a cohort so talented that from under-14 upwards, Katie never lost an under-age match in the black and amber. Two All Ireland under-16 medals, three All Ireland under-18 medals, innumerable Leinster honours. Upon which she graduated to the Kilkenny senior team and her adult career commenced.

It wasn't easy going at first, and not only because Kilkenny themselves were treading water. It wasn't easy going for a long time. Adjusting to the big girls' arena didn't take her merely a year or two. It took her "three, four, five years. Up and down. We were very inconsistent – but very young, so it probably comes with the territory. I was worried about my own consistency though. One day I'd be fine, the next day I'd hurl absolutely stink."

Her form wasn't helped by injury, in this case a troublesome left kneecap that required four operations. Each procedure killed off her chances of a proper pre-season that particular year. "I was just rehabbing and not getting the same training in. It was difficult on the mind and on the body playing catch-up the whole time." The last operation was at Christmas in 2015, meaning she's had three whole campaigns free from injury and preceded by a satisfactory pre-season. It may be a coincidence that those three campaigns have seen her, and Kilkenny, reach Croke Park each September. Then again, it may not be.

In any case there was no lightbulb moment. Kilkenny improved gradually and eventually became true championship contenders once more. Their presence on a regular basis on the national stage prompted the realisation that she must be benefitting the team in some way. In what position she was deployed on the field wasn't an issue. "Anywhere from midfield up. As long as I'm on the ball I don't mind."

Paradise was regained in 2016. Kilkenny were All Ireland champions for the first time since 1994. To Katie it felt like a dream. It still does, she says. "The few weeks after we won the All Ireland, even the first few months after it, were very emotional. The goodwill towards the team and towards camogie around the county was incredible. Getting to train in Nowlan Park, for instance, is



amazing. Girls from other counties can't get over the fact that we're able to do so."

After the dream, alas, came the nightmare. She hasn't been able to stop processing this one either. Losing by a point to Cork in 2017 was bad enough. Losing by the same margin to the same team in 2018 was worse. "We'd been performing better all the way this year than in 2017. But it was up to us to perform on the big day and we didn't. That was very tough to take. It still is. We just played so badly."

None of which stops her producing, unprompted, a torrent of praise for the Kilkenny management. Ann Downey: the boss, and nobody's in any doubt about that. "You couldn't look for better." Paddy Mullally and the way he's helped bring the players to a higher level. Liam Egan and his enlightened fitness and conditioning regime. Conor Phelan and his knowledge. Angela Downey-Browne and Breda Holmes: kit women in name, "like mothers in reality". A great set-up.

### MORE SILVERWARE, PLEASE

You can probably guess our girl's overriding ambition. To win the All Ireland again. If they don't, she declares, this generation of Kilkenny players will have underachieved. "There's so much more in the team. It would be a shame to be remembered as one-hit wonders."

On the thorny subject of the refereeing in this year's All Ireland final she is diplomatic yet firm. "We train to be stronger, we train to be faster, we train to be tougher. But come the day of a match you're not allowed to express that." She brings up the episode in the closing stages of the All Ireland final when Davina Tobin was penalised "for being stronger than her opponent" and Cork were awarded a crucial free. "You can give out about referees but the real problem is the rules."





This darkest of clouds produced an unexpected silver lining. As is the way of the world, Katie went back to her club the following week, "never feeling as down in my life". They didn't put their arms around her – not literally, anyway – but they made the hurt go away for a while. Then something odd happened. Piltown, unfancied Piltown, surfed a wave and reached the county final. Unbelievable.

Although they didn't win it, there was no dishonour in losing to Thomastown. What's more, getting that far was a triumph in itself. In previous years they'd always hoped for the best but deep down were probably afraid of the big guns. Not any more. Now Piltown know they're good enough and Katie can look forward to 2019 with her club as much as she's looking forward to it with the county.

Behind every great camogie player who wants to be on the ball is a great family – in this case Jim and Martina Power. Jim played in goal for Piltown throughout her childhood and beyond, and it was no surprise that she and her brothers Martin and Jamie lived in the local hurling field. It's only now she's a little older that she appreciates how much her parents sacrificed, ferrying her around to games. "When you're young you take it for granted."

We'll finish with a pop quiz.

Most difficult opponents? Edwina Keane and Claire Phelan locally, Pamela Mackey and Sarah Dervan nationally.

Funniest ladies on the Kilkenny panel? Grace Walsh, Meg Farrell and Grace O'Donnell.

Coldplay or Taylor Swift? Coldplay. She saw them in Croke Park and was blown away.

Most recent movie trip? A Star is Born. "I didn't know what to expect but it was unreal

Life in Michael Lyng Motors, which one scarcely needs to add is a hotbed of hurling – and now camogie – chat? "I landed on my feet there. They look after me brilliantly."

Pastime outside camogie? "I did a course in health and nutrition. It's important to take care of yourself during the winter months. Keep ticking over. No point in going back training in January and having to slog it out."

January. New year. New hope. But the same ambition as ever. The return to Noreside of the O'Duffy Cup. Nothing less.

What Katie does next.

Kieran's appeared to be cruising to victory at half-time when a goal-

Goals from team captain Daithi Barron, Ciaran Brennan and David O'Carroll appeared to have assured them of victory by the interval, and they were in an even stronger position when adding further points to stretch the lead early in the 2nd half.

However, the Athenry School have battling qualities in abundance which they proved during their All-Ireland Semi-Final clash against Kilkenny CBS when overturning a 10-point half deficit, and they proved it again in the final.

A scrambled goal credited to Adam Brett began the comeback, and they had given themselves hope as they trailed by 6 points entering the last 5 minutes.

Another goal moments later by Mark Kennedy left just three points between them, before the comeback was completed in the dying moments of injurytime

It was goal or bust as Presentation Athenry dropped a free in around the goalmouth which caused havoc.

Shane Quirke got his shot goal-bound in which their appeared to have been a foul inside the penalty area, but play continued and Adam Brett smashed home the all-important levelling goal for the most incredible of comebacks. 3-12 each.

It was such a massive shock to the system to have such a huge lead reeled in, but to their eternal credit they responded and took control of the game in extra-time.

The substitutions who were introduced in the 2nd half came to the fore in extra-time and a superb goal from Jamie Young re-asserted control once again, before Ciaran Brennan confirmed victory with another magnificent goal towards the end of extra-time.

St. Kieran's also won the Leinster Senior Schools League Final a few months earlier when defeating Borris Vocational School in the Final 3-5 to 0-7, but lost out in the Leinster Championship Final to Dublin North 1-14 to 1-11

However, because the Dublin school were an amalgamated combination,

they weren't allowed compete in the All-Ireland section.

The Leinster Championship competition itself began before Christmas last year when Kieran's defeated Castlecomer Community School 1-12 to 0-9 after extra-time, while Kilkenny CBS safely negotiated their passage to victory against St. Peters, Wexford winning 0-16 to 0-7.

In the new look format competition, Kieran's defeated Kilkenny CBS 0-16 to 0-12 after extra-time while Castlecomer Community School had a 1-14 to 0-8 victory against St. Brendan's, Birr, before Kilkenny CBS ended Castlecomer Community School's hopes in the Quarter-Final of the competition when winning 2-16 to 0-13.

Any hopes of an all Kilkenny all Leinster Final were dashed when Dublin North defeated Kilkenny CBS 3-12 to 0-18, but Kieran's did prevail overcoming St. Peters 2-13 to 2-8.

Meanwhile in Munster, Ardscoil Ris were living up to their billing as competition

Meanwhile, Kieran's upset the odds with a hard fought 0-19 to 1-14 victory over competition favourites Ardscoil Ris to qualify for their 5th consecutive final

Their regaining of the Croke Cup saw them complete the Junior/Senior All-Ireland double after the Juniors had defeated Thurles CBS to win the Junior All-Ireland in The Ragg last December.

Peter Donohue struck home a magnificent goal after brilliantly fielding possession before rifling home an unstoppable shot to give them a 1-5 to 0-4 lead at the interval.

With Captain fantastic Daragh Maher, Kieran's held the upper hand and they held a 5 point lead intact approaching the closing 5 minutes. Thurles CBS added two points to narrow the gap before they were awarded a penalty on the stroke of full-time.

However, Darren Flood's well struck attempt just went the merest fraction of inches over the crossbar, and Kierans held out for victory.





# APAPTING TO AGE GRADE

Development Squads Report by Seamus Norris



Development Squads in 2018 have had to adapt as a result of the age grade changes. Minor became Under-17 for the first time and this led to a domino effect for other ages. The Tony Forristal and the Sonny Walsh All-Ireland tournaments remained at Under-14.

The Arrabawn, formerly Under-16 moved to Under-15 and added a qualification process which led to the unprecedented situation where the holders could not compete in the Cup competition on the National Day. The Under-15 Michael Foley tournament in Wexford moved to an Under-16 competition while The Under-17 Mallow tournament moved to Under-16. Meanwhile club competitions also moved to Under-15 and Under-17. The Development Squads took on the challenges posed with vigour. Communication events were held for clubs, coaches and parents. Sean Kelly led the Kilkenny County Board winter strength and conditioning education programme. It became common to see squad players proudly wearing the black and amber. The development coaching sessions commenced including specialist ones like the PJ Ryan led goalkeeping session. The MW Hire Training Centre became the home of the Development Squads. The measurement at the end of the year was the improvement in all participants with skills they are also expected to bring back to their Club. A secondary measure is the success in the National Day tournaments in August.

#### **HURLING DEVELOPMENT SQUADS**

The Paddy Grace Féile Na Gael Tournament once again provided the selection foundation for the 2018 Under-14 Development Squads. 2018, saw the end of the North, South and Central format which has served the county over the last number of years. Over 100 Players were selected from the Féile Tournament and viewed in the initial squads. This was further reduced following a series of trials to two working squads of 30 known as Amber and Black. These players were then developed through intensive coaching sessions and inter county challenge games to finally reach the Tony Forristal (Amber) and Sonny Walsh (Black) match day panels.

In the Under-14 National Day tournaments, Kilkenny reached the final of the Tony Forristal with very good wins over Tipperary, Waterford and Dublin. In the final they faced a Cork team who had topped an easier group in the Walsh Park final. Victory went Cork's way despite a valiant Kilkenny effort on the score of 3-6 to 2-15. In the Sonny Walsh Tournament, Kilkenny suffered a narrow defeat to Westmeath

before going down to a strong Offaly first team. Cork pulled off the double by beating Tipperary in a penalty shootout final.

The Under-15 moved format also moved away from North, South and Central to Amber and Black. Their selection was based on feedback from the previous year at Under-14, communication with clubs and viewing matches involving players of the age by the squad coaches. No stone was left unturned so that nobody was omitted and any player who had not made it previously but had since developed well got every opportunity to join or re-join the system.

The initial Under-15 Arrabawn tournament had a nonsensical prelude. For the first time ever qualifying rounds took place and Kilkenny were drawn in a round robin with Offaly and Cork with winners going into the Cup Semi-Finals. Offaly withdrew so it meant a Kilkenny had a one-off match in Cork (Ballyhea) with a Cork referee. The valiant Kilkenny boys brought the game to extra time and the exertions of the long drive took its toll amidst some controversy regarding the officials score and the "disappearance" of two Kilkenny points from the officials notebook. Kilkenny still made the shield on National Day but found both Wexford and Waterford too strong. However, the Kilkenny Black Under-15 squad beat Kildare and then Limerick 2-11 to 1-9 in the Plate Final to register All-Ireland success.

In Wexford at the Michael Foley Under-16 Tournament, Kilkenny Amber beat Waterford and Offaly before going down by three points to Wexford in the Semi-Final. Kilkenny Under-16 Black travelled to Mallow (formerly an Under-17 competition). They lost by two points to Cork before beating Kerry in the round robin section, but it was not enough to progress.

The Development Squad system is under continuous review and will most likely be tweaked further for 2019.

#### **GAELIC FOOTBALL DEVELOPMENT SQUADS**

The DJ Carey led Gaelic Football development squads project continued at pace throughout 2018. About 20 sessions were held during the year at the MW Hire Training Centre in Dunmore with coaches Seamus Norris, Thomas Rossiter, Angelo Cullen and Donal Carroll. The winter sessions were combined with the Kilkenny Development squads S&C education programme which for the first time included those who were on the football squads but not the hurling squads. The footballers received the same high level









of treatment as their hurling counterparts. Jim Gavin, the four-in-a-row Dublin Senior Football Manager took a session in February in Dunmore. Both players and coaches learned a lot from his immense expertise with both a "classroom" and practical skills session.

Two Under-16 teams played challenge games versus Waterford in Carriganore and both resulted in wins for the Kilkenny teams where everyone commented on the huge work rate of the Kilkenny boys. A panel of 40 were available to play a Galway selection as the curtain raiser to the All-Ireland Junior Football semi-final between Kilkenny and Galway in Nowlan Park. Although it did not result in a win, 27 players got exposure to playing in Nowlan Park on a big occasion; some for the second consecutive year and still Kilkenny remained competitive throughout the game.

In October, Kilkenny will field an Under-16 team in the Fr. Manning inter county Cup. They have been drawn in a group with Waterford, Carlow and Wexford. There are four groups of four featuring counties from all provinces. They will play a series of round robin games before the knockout stages. This will be the first competitive preparation for the squad as they remain on target to compete in the 2019 Leinster Minor championship, which has been the end game, though the post will arrive a year early with the move of Minor from Under-18 to Under-17. The Kilkenny county board have been hugely supportive of the project since the beginning in 2016 and as it enters year four, there are still over fifty players involved in the Under-16/15 age group.

The new batch of Under-14s have started the development process under the coaching of Stephen Morgan, Michael Rossiter and Mick Hanley. This will ensure a continuous cycle of development of Kilkenny inter county footballers going forward. New players are always welcomed and it is hoped to get further buy in to the advantages from the clubs whose support is required for the continued success.

Killarney GAA Club existed from 1913 to 1942. They entered the Kilkenny Junior Championship in 1914 but were defeated by Inistoige with a scoreline of 3-2 to 1-0. Little championship was played in Killarney for the next decade due to the political turmoil in the country. In 1929 Killarney was affiliated to the Southern County Board. Green jerseys with a gold sash were worn. These later changed to navy-blue and white. Games were played at Dullard Hill, Peter Pendergast's house in Killarney and at Thomastown. Michael Callaghan and Tim Kelly were the main driving force at this time. The team entered the 1929 championship and played Dunkiitt Ramblers on July 14th in Knocktopher. Dunkitt won the game on a scoreline of 6-1 to 4-2. In 1930 Killarney reached a Southern Semi-Final by overcoming Knocktopher by a walkover and beating Mooncoin on a scoreline of 6-2 to 1-2. They lost the semi-final however to Crowroddy (Callan) by 1-5 to 1-2. The reached the South Semi-Final again in 1932 losing to Knockmoylan on a scoreline of 5-2 to 5-0.

In 1936 Killarney joined with Bennettsbridge & Danesfort for two years but were back in the Championship as Killarney in 1937. The finest achievement of the club came in 1940 when they became South Champions. They defeated The Rower No.1 team, Thomastown, Suir Rangers (Piltown) and The Rower No.2 in the South Final on a scoreline of 5-8 to 4-5. The County Final was played on November 10th in Nowlan Park where Threecastles defeated Killarney by 5-2 to 0-1. In 1942 many players transferred to St.Brendan's Club in Stoneyford and to the Bennettsbridge Club which was beginning to become successful again. Many family names who played for Killarney became synonomous with Bennettsbridge over the years such as Kelly, Skehan, Power, O'Connell, Reidy, Cullen, Muldowney, Jackman and Cassin.

His managerial prowess did not stop there as the club powered on to take Leinster and National honours and emerge as worthy All Ireland club champions. Two silences.

Knocktoper Graveyard, last April 11. A recording of 'Forever Young' finishes playing. The massive crowd present seems to draw a collective breath, heavy with the enormity of what has happened. A young man of 24 is gone.

Nowlan Park, last October 28. Michael Fennelly, captain of Ballyhale Shamrocks, accepts the Tom Walsh Cup following victory over Bennettsbridge in the Senior Final. He acknowledges and thanks people, the usual courtesies. Then his tone changes. Michael dedicates this title to a panellist taken by a terrible accident.

The crowd before the Old Stand pauses a moment, understanding this moment's gravity, before resuming applause.

The link between those silences is a tragic death. Born on January 5, 1994, Eoin Doyle passed away due to a motorbike accident on April 9. That morning, he trained and returned in great form, delighted with an encouraging word from Henry Shefflin. That evening, he was not long home after watching with friends Kilkenny's triumph over Tipperary in the NHL Final. Life is forever fragile and Eoin was just unlucky.

He relished every game he played with St Patrick's NS (Ballyhale), Scoil Airegail and Ballyhale Shamrocks. A twist meant the family home lay within the neighbouring parish of Dunnamaggin. But there was never any question where Eoin would hurl. Being a Ballyhale man meant so much to him.

If nothing else, his mother, Ber, is an Aylward from Knockmoylan, a family at the heart of hurling in the parish since the 1920s. The whole family, led by Ber and father Johnny, by sisters Clodagh and Dearbhla, by grandparents Pat and Eileen, offered great support on every playing day, be it Senior or

Junior B.

Eoin Doyle was a valued panellist during the 2014-15 season, when Ballyhale Shamrocks won Senior, Leinster and All Ireland honours. He likewise has a Senior medal from 2012's victory and was important at midfield for the Junior A Champions of 2013. Eoin was only starting off.

The family, at the worst moment in their lives, saw his club as the bigger picture. Johnny Doyle spoke powerfully to Ballyhale Shamrocks' Senior panel after the serious setback that was loss to Bennettsbridge in their league group's final round. Those present considered this moment a galvanizing one, a turning point for a team not reaching its potential. Following Senior Final victory, one of the people most closely involved with the set up confided: "I don't think they'd have won it but for what Johnny said. The whole thing was slipping away."

The pain of one family's loss will never abate. No more can be said for the moment than that a young man's memorial is the most Ballyhale of tributes, a Senior title.



Noel Walsh

Noel Walsh: A Local Hero

The recent death of Noel Walsh has deprived Kilkenny of a truly remarkable man. His kind and considerate demeanour ensured initial casual relationships usually blossomed into friendship. Noel loved conversation. Swapping well embellished stories with select friends was a major joy. He was a person of enthusiasms whose dynamic personality added sparkle and lustre to those fortunate enough to know him.

After successfully completing his Leaving Cert in St Kieran's, Noel took a summer job in Smithwick's Brewery. The psychiatric nursing career he had planned, somehow, got shelved and he remained in 'the brewery' for his working life. He made great friends and enjoyed the work. His stories from the workplace were legendary but best appreciated in houses where fermented liquor is for sale. Noel was the ideal employee, diligent, trustworthy and honest. Traits he carried with him always.

In his younger days Noel was immersed in local soccer playing mainly with Ormonde Villa. He was an on -field leader and enjoyed the camaraderie associated with match day. He maintained a keen interest in the club and the game to the end.

Early retirement followed by serious illness brought major changes to his lifestyle. Not all of them bad. Restricted mobility allowed him to wallow in long loquacious lunches. Here his encyclopaedic knowledge of obscure sporting trivia was tested, daily. Some inquisitors sought knowledge others attempted to baffle. The former were rewarded the latter disappointed. Representing O' Loughlin's, partnered by Frank Mc Kenna, Cyril Keegan and Enda Mc Evoy, Noel had won the Jimmy Magee All Ireland quiz and confessed he had no intention of tarnishing that record over lunch.

As the small hand descended Noel would leave the Kilford Arms and venture across the road to John Joe Cullen, ostensibly to purchase a ticket for the club lotto, but in reality to discover news of the parish. The last stop of the afternoon was always MacDonagh Junction and a visit to Quigley's café. Meeting cronies, the concerns of the day were accessed and discussed. Tales and adventures were recounted, many requiring a small amount of sodium chloride, until dismissal came with the Angelus bell. Recalling these occasions, they were times of fun, frivolity and laughter.

As Noel's life ebbed away it was perhaps fitting that his alma mater won their 22nd All Ireland colleges title and that the Kilkenny senior team was reinvigorated in Wexford. Both would have brought satisfaction. The county success was maybe a tad more satisfying, this time. As the Stripy Men's credentials were questioned Noel remained steadfast. He vociferously proclaimed that transition in Kilkenny hurling should take place between January and March. Then, win or lose, it was time to perform.

A founding member of O'Loughlin Gaels Noel enjoyed their success both on and off the field. His astute knowledge and understanding of hurling made him a much sought after and valued selector, a role he filled, successfully, for many years. Indeed he made a cameo appearance a few years ago as an under 21 selector. Though he found the regime dramatically changed nonetheless he revelled in the role. He loved the sporting interacting with these young players and grasped the opportunity to offer advice and guidance. The two year term brought no trophies but during a time of ill health is gave him renewed confidence and self belief. Not a sentimental person, he would admit, privately, his gratitude to the club for giving him the opportunity to be involved, for a final time.

As we followed the hearse from Johnston's Funeral home to St John's church, pathos and pride intermingled. The whispered conversations ceased and silence descended. The solemnity of the occasion reverberated as through the falling rain, we accompanied Noel, who for the last time was following his heroes. Led by Chairman Brian Murphy O' Loughlin Gaels formed an impressive and dignified guard of honour, for one of their own.

Noel Walsh was a deeply religious person, whose faith was of paramount importance. As scandal and secular diversions saw many fall by the wayside, Noel remained constant. His religious ethos was integral to his existence and he unashamedly admitted he derived inspiration and solace from Catholic beliefs. Noel had a genuine concern for the welfare of others and he did good deeds in secret, with few aware of his generosity and kindness.

Noel lived his life, grew and developed, in the few acres between Assumption Place and John's Bridge. Travel to the foreign regions of Freshford, Mullinavat, Thomastown, Castlecomer etc usually involved attendance at a sporting fixture.

Outwardly stoic, family was important to Noel. He cared for them deeply and celebrated their success. During the final years he had a special affinity with Marie and recognised it was her care that allowed him the opportunity to continue his independent life.

Surrounded by those he loved, Noel left this world in the same way as he had lived his life, quietly and with dignity.

As friends, we are bereft, our hearts are broken. Noel was an important part of our lives and the void created by his parting is enormous. We will miss his wry humour, his roguish devilment, his easy companionship and his warm friendship. Saddest, is the wealth of wisdom and knowledge now gone forever. Large tranches of our parish are eerily silent, as we, vainly, seek comfort in familiar surroundings. Lost and alone, we are left to contemplate the transient and fragile nature of life.
