Remembering **James Stephens** County Senior Hurling Champions of

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Souvenir Booklet recalling James Stephens' 1969 County Senior Hurling Championship victory, an the occasion of the team's reception by Coiste Co Chill Chainnigh, at the 2018 County SH Final.



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Scéalta, cuimhní agus reflections of great days and games are an integral part of GAA folklore at Club and County level and today in Nowlan Park, Cumann Luthchleas Gael Cill Chainnigh, in conjunction with the Springhill Court Hotel, are delighted to welcome and honour the James Stephens team who were the county Senior Hurling champions of 1969.

That famous day, marked a sea change in club hurling in Kilkenny as two new faces battled for the Tom Walsh Cup. After a break of thirty two years, the Village men took the title over the new club on the block, The Fenians, who were just up from the Junior Grade. The rivalry of that occasion endured for the following fifteen years, as one or both of the clubs appeared in action in all but two of the senior finals, when they took nine county titles between them.



The championship starters list of fifteen teams, saw giants of other days in Coon, Newpark Sarsfields and St Senan's that are now no longer with us. However their areas and current players still contribute immensely to the games through their parish teams. Their loss has sparked a trawl by the Year Book committee to record the name of every club that lined out in the county since 1884.

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After James Stephens first round win over Erin's Own, who battled so gallantly on Sunday last to be here for today's St. Canices Credit Union Senior final, and then a victory over St. Senan's (Kilmacow), the Village found breaking through never came easy. On the way their dreams and ambitions were strongly tested with three second round matches over eight weeks against the hurling masters of the time from Bennettsbridge. Inniu, the "Bridge" are back in the county final; back then they were seeking their eleventh senior title of their generation. After passing the test at the third time of asking in Nowlan Park with a 4-3 to 2-2 win, James Stephens then faced towards the Northern end of the county. In the semi-final they defeated Galmoy, who came through the losers group and had accounted for the County Champions the Rower Inistioge by 2-14 to 1-14. After recording a 4-11 to 1-7 win over them, they faced The Fenians who had recorded a single point win, 4-8 to 4-7 after a very late-scoring burst over Mooncoin in the other semi-final.

In a time when Fixture dates were just as prominent as today, James Stephens three-match replay saga commenced the week after Kilkenny defeated Cork in the Senior All Ireland final and lasted for nine weeks until November 9th. As a result of the semi-finals being played on 30th November, and subsequent boardroom discussions, the County Final was played on April 19th the following year.

On County Final day the game attracted a crowd of almost twelve thousand supporters who saw James Stephens go on a scoring blitz of 3-2 in the first five minutes. After two goals by Sean Leahy and the third by rugby international Ned Byrne, the side led by 5-3 to 1-4 at half time. A similar explosive start to the second half, despite a Fenians comeback led by Pat Delaney, yielded them a sixteen point 8-5 to 2-7 victory.

Bedecked with hurling families Larkin's, Morrissey's, and Leahy's and other club hurling legends, many of the winning side went on to play for Kilkenny, with Fan Larkin and Mick Crotty achieving All Stars from the team that was looked after by their trainer Denis Towmey. Sadly six members of the historic team that took the honours that day in Sean (Georgie) Leahy, Michael Leahy, Paddy Larkin, Michael Larkin, Michael Dunne (Captain), Tommy Hickey and selectors Sean Tyrell, Bill Cody, Ramie Dowling, Billy Leahy and Lou McCarthy who are no longer with us and are fondly recalled.

Once again Míle Buíochas to Springhill Court Hotel and their Manager Emma Jayne Eaton for honouring the Jubilee team that will be guests of honour, with their partners, at a celebration dinner, and will all be provided with a special memento of the occasion. Thanks also to Ned Buggy and Gerry O'Neill for their work in researching and producing this souvenir booklet.

Sa deireadh, comhghairdeas is extended to the Village team that brought the third County title to the club in 1969. It was a great achievement and one that led James Stephens to their greatest era including All Ireland Club honours, and has brought the club to where it is today, on the playing fields and the Larchfield and Kells Road facilities.

'Bridge Hard Pressed

Bennettsbridge 3-6 The Fenians 1-7

SHORT about half a dozen of their regulars, Bennettsbridge had to fight hard to overcome last year's junior champions, The Fenians (Johnstown) in the first round of the senior hurling championship at Nowlan Park on Sunday.

They were in fact slightly flattered by the five points margin of (3-6 to 1-7) and were not out of danger until Paddy Moran, from far out, dropped the ball into the Johnstown net two minutes from the end.

The hurling was not great but the exchanges between two fairly evenly matched sides held interest to the end. The forwards on both sides lacked penetrative power. This was particularly the case with the Fenians, and if they had been a little more effective here, then the task of the fancied Bennettsbridge would have been much more difficult.

As it was Bennettsbridge, without S. Cleere, P. Kealy, P. Cullen, C. O'Brien, and M. McCarthy must feel reasonably happy to have survived the test with The Fenians who stepped up very considerably on form in the 1968 junior final.

Although the 'Bridge went in front after 7 minutes and were in the lead for the remainder of the game, the Fenians on several occasions came within two points of them, and that was the position with two minutes to go. Moran's goal removed the danger of a surprise. At the interval, the winners led by 1-3 to 0-4. Noel Skehan gave a fine display in goal for the 'Bridge, and in defence, which was altered to make up for the loss of Seamus Cleere, Conor O'Brien, P. Kealy and P. Cullen, the Treacy brothers, Martin and Jim, the latter at centre half back, L. Cleere and newcomer John Holohan held out. Paddy Moran dominated at centrefield, but only J. Kinsella impressed in attack.

For the Fenians, N. Orr, Pat Henderson and S. Grace were best in a sound defence. Paddy Murphy was good at centrefield. Best of the forwards were Pat Delaney and John Moriarty.

James Stephens in Fine Form

James Stephens 6-6 Erins Own 1-6

James Stephens gave an impressive display when beating Erins Own by 6-6 to 1-6 in the first round of the Kilkenny senior hurling championship at Nowlan Park on Sunday and to their credit it must be said that they treated the game with respect. A goal and a point up after 2 minutes the city side never looked back and though Erins Own cut a half time lead of 10 points down to 5 points in the first 10 minutes of the second half, their effort ended there and the winners romped home very comfortably.

The game was too one sided to be of interest but there was a lot to like about the James Stephens attacking movements and all their scores were well directed efforts.

There was a recurrence of incidents during the hour, but they were not serious and were treated rather leniently by the referee Francie Walsh of Kilmacow and it was fortunate that they did not develop.

Any good hurling in the game was provided by the James Stephens forwards and unless the Erins Own defence can improve on this display their hopes of making any impression in the losers group are dim. Even Martin Coogan rarely made his presence felt.

Erins Own were without Peter Boran who had distinguished himself with the CBS senior team in the colleges championship and his place at centre-field was taken by Paddy Dowling. He was quite a good substitute and was in fact one of the few Castlecomer men to make an impression.

In spite of good work by Mick Taylor, centre-field was the one sector where Erins Own had an advantage as Paddy Dowling and Mick Meally played consistently. With Noel O'Sullivan coming more into the game in the second half, James Stephens more of a say at centre-field. Mick Moore in the James Stephens goal was one of the outstanding players of the 30. He saved shots from point blank range and thwarted several Erins Own moves to get into the game.

Fan Larkin was the steadiest of the all Larkin full back line, Phil, Fan, and Paddy, but none of them gave anything away soft and there was little room for the Erins Own forwards to find gaps. Michael Leahy was outstanding on the half-back line and got good support from John O'Neill and Niall Morrissey.

The James Stephens forwards combined well and they all played a part in building up what must be regarded as a respectable score against fancied opponents. Ned Byrne a new acquisition and Mickey Dunne were the most successful score getters but they were ably supported by Fess Brennan, Sean Brennan, Eamonn Morrissey, and Sean Leahy.

Jim Byrne nursing an injury sustained in the game against Bennettsbridge opted for the role of goalie and performed quite well. Tom Shalloe, veteran of the Castlecomer men came through with his reputation unblemished showed all his old skill but the full back line of Larry O'Keeffe, O. Doyle and Paddy Dowd, were unable to cope with the fast Village forwards. Jim O'Shea and Martin Coogan gave little more than token assistance to Tom Shalloe. Paddy Dowling and M. Meally played to form at centre-field but of the forwards only Seamie Coogan and veteran Kieran Meally impressed. James Stephens led at half time by 3-4 to 0-3.

Coon Surprise St. Lachtain's Coon 2-10 Freshford 0-7

COON HAD no trouble in disposing of a St. Lachtain's (Freshford) side which gave every indication that they wanted to lose in this first round senior hurling championship game at Nowlan Park on Sunday.

The losers, who were odds on favourites to win this game, played second fiddle to the Coon men, ably led by intercounty hurler, Mick Lalor. St. Lachtain's were pathetic and during the hour they never made a determined effort to score a goal.

Players like Pa Dillon, John and Richie Teehan and D. Butler who can usually mean the difference between defeat and victory joined the rest of the team in their hurling slumbers.

Coon had matters all their own way in the first period and, urged on by a great display from Lalor at midfield, they took their chances fairly well and led by 2-4 to 0-3 at half time. If the Coon attack had been a little more accurate in the early stages, however, the lead would have been much bigger at the interval.

The boredom of this period was really shown when the small crowd which had remained on for the game began to dwindle rapidly and large crowds made for the exits once the rain appeared.

Michael Lalor might not have had things so easy at midfield if the wily Sean Buckley had been in action for St. Lachtain's. The losers missed his services very badly and they will need to inject new blood into the team if they are to become a force in the championship.

The second half was much the same as the first but with scores coming less frequently. Coon had six points to Freshford's three in the half hour. Even with 10 minutes remaining and St. Lachtain's 2-3 in arrears they did not make any real attempt to get back into the game.

Although Coon's merits cannot be fully assessed from this game they looked a very impressive outfit and could cause more upsets in the championship.

John Nolan in goal did not have much to do but he dealt capably with anything that came his way. Martin Morrissey, Brendan Morrissey and Eddie Coogan stood out in a sound defence.

Michael Lalor was outstanding at midfield and he was ably

partnered by young Paul Kinsella. Bernie Somers, Murt Coonan and Martin Shelly were best in attack.

While not playing up to his standard, Pa Dillon did nothing wrong in front of the Freshford goal. Pat Butler at right half back was the only defender who really looked as if he was trying.

Jim Cullinane and John Joe Quinn were completely outclassed at midfield while Tom Butler and John Teehan did best in a very weak attack.

HOW THE SCORES CAME

John Teehan opened the scoring with a Freshford point in the second minute. Two minutes later, Murt Coonan opened the Coon account when he gave the goalie no chance with a fine shot to the corner of the net. Michael Lalor and Tom Butler exchanged points in the 10th and 12th minutes. Lalor scored two further points for the winners before N. Morrissey increased their lead with a fine goal in the 24th minute. Lalor and John Teehan exchanged points before the interval to leave the score:

A 10 MINUTE purple patch which brought two goals and four points helped Mooncoin to a deserved win over Galmoy by 4-16 to 2-11 in a first round senior hurling championship tie at Nowlan Park on Sunday. This spate of scoring swept the Galmoy challenge aside.

Apart from this period, Galmoy were well in the hunt and gave as good as they got. They were the better side for most of the first half and, by virtue of a rather easy goal early in the game, had held the lead almost up to half time.

It was not by any means a thrilling game and interest faded when Mooncoin went ahead in the second half. Galmoy tried hard to get back into the game in the closing stages but their forwards failed to penetrate an improved Mooncoin defence. Dick Dunphy in the Mooncoin goal was caught out for the first Galmoy goal but he did nothing wrong afterwards and the second Galmoy goal came through a crowded goalmouth.

The Mooncoin full back line of John Walsh, J.J. Kinsella and T. Walsh improved considerably in the second half while J. Walsh was the outstanding figure on the half back line, getting good support from T. Mackey and Jim Lynch.

Mick Conway was also in better form at centrefield in the second half where Galmoy had one of their hardest workers in



Billy Harte. All the Mooncoin forwards had a say in the shaping of the victory and all six scored. Claus Dunne, when he exerted himself, excelled as the stylist of the game. N. Doyle, J. Lynch, D. Holden, T. Ryan and J. Dunphy took their scores well.

Lotty Harte could not be blamed for any the Mooncoin goals and led a defence that was good in the first half. T. Phelan was in top form with J. Doherty, L. Hanrahan and B. Delaney also playing well.

Billy Harte was a very hard worker at centrefield while Jim Dillon, Mile Phelan and Jack Phelan were best in attack.

HOW THE SCORES CAME

JIM DILLON opened the scoring with a Galmoy goal after five minutes, an easy score, as he walked through the Mooncoin defence and tapped the ball past Dick Dunphy in the Mooncoin goal. Within a minute Mooncoin opened their account when N. Doyle scored a point. Jim Lynch added a Mooncoin point in the 7th minute and Claus Dunne, with another point put the sides level in the 10th minute.

Mooncoin went in front with a point by D. Holden in the 12th minute and another by N. Doyle and a further Ned Doyle point left them two points ahead at the end of the first quarter.

Claus Dunne pointed from a free in the 16th minute but Galmoy struck back and added three points by M. Phelan, J. Dillon and J. Phelan to get in front again. Claus Dunne levelled in the 25th minute but J. Dillon, with a Galmoy point in the 26th minute and M. Phelan with another in the 28th, regained the lead. Jim Dillon pointed for Galmoy but a goal by Joe Dunphy and two points by Dick Holden left the half time scores: Mooncoin 1-9 Galmoy 1-7

Jim Lynch (Mooncoin) and J. Phelan exchanged points in the first five minutes of the second half and Claus Dunne put over a Mooncoin point. Jack Phelan and Claus Dunne exchanged points and a nice point by Joe Doherty in the 10th minute left Mooncoin ahead by 1-12 to 1-10.

Mooncoin then got on top and a point by Tommy Ryan was followed by a goal by Dick Holden, a point by Ned Doyle, a point by Joe Dunphy, a point by J. Lynch and a goal by Ned Doyle.

Jim Dillon had a Galmoy point and Billy Harte receiving from Dillon had a goal but Mooncoin had last say with a goal by T. Ryan.

A strong second half by Young Irelands earned them a deserved victory over Lisdowney by 3-10 to 2-11 in the first round of the senior hurling championship played in Nowlan Park on Sunday. The main difference between the sides was the that Young Irelands were the better all-round while Lisdowney relied too much on the overworked Ted Carroll.

Playing with a fairly stiff breeze in the first period Lisdowney had the better of the exchanges and led by 1-7 to 1-2.

Ted Carroll at centre half back was outstanding for Lisdowney in this period. On his own he broke up several Young Irelands attacks with scores written all over them.

The roving Dick Blanchfield was their chief scorer.

Although Young Irelands only scored three times in the first half they could easily have been closer to Lisdowney if their forwards had taken some of the easy scoring chances that came their way.

On the other hand if Larry Dwyer had not been in such good form in the Young Irelands goal Lisdowney would certainly have benefitted.

Young Irelands piled on the pressure right from the start of the second half and within 15 minutes they led by 3-6 to 1-9. Lisdowney came back again and the teams were after 18 minutes.

The stage was set for an exciting finish, but by now nearly all the steam had gone out of the Lisdowney side. Young Irelands tapped over three points to a single point from the losers to emerge deserving winners by 2 points.

Larry Dwyer in goal for Young Irelands gave an impeccable display and could not be faulted for the shots that beat him, Jim Carter, Sean Kelly, and Pat Drennan were outstanding in a strong defence while Billy Kennedy and John Brophy held their own at centre-field. Jim Byrne and Michael Dwyer were best in an attack which only came to life in the second period.

Andy Comerford at centre forward was quieter than usual but he was up against Lisdowney's outstanding player Ted Carroll. Ted Carroll on the half back line was the star of the Lisdowney's defence, but he was completely overworked, so that he was very tired when he was needed most in the second half.

The industrious Con Fogarty was another tireless worker for Lisdowney but both he and Carroll were the only ones to stand out in a weak defence. Michael Fogarty and Sean Colclough fared well at centre-field while Dick Blanchfield who scored 2-6 of his side' total and Michael Mackey were the pick of the forwards.

Michael Mackey opened the scoring for Lisdowney with a point in the second minute. Three minutes later Jack Dowling added another. Podge Carty opened the scoring for Young Irelands with a well taken point in the 6th minute. In the 7th minute Jack Dowling scored his second point for Lisdowney. In the 10th minute Michael Dwyer gave Young Irelands the lead for the first time with a well taken goal. The same player added a point two minutes later which was Young Ireland's last score of the half. Dick Blanchfield won back the lead for Lisdowney when he shot to the net after a fine passing movement in the 18th minute. Before the end the same player added 4 points without reply from Young Irelands to leave the half -time score Lisdowney 1-7, Young Irelands 1-2.

Young Irelands set about their task right from of the second half with John Brophy scoring a point. Dick Blanchfield replied with a point for Lisdowney. In the 4th minute Jim Byrne scored Young Irelands second goal to put them within 2 points of Lisdowney. Three minutes later Jim Brophy tapped over another point to leave only a point between the sides.

It was Jim Byrne again who struck again for Young Irelands in the 10th minute when he shot to the net after the Lisdowney goalkeeper made a great save from a 21 yard free. Andy Comerford 1 point and Michael Dwyer 2 points shot further points for Young Irelands before Dick Blanchfield sent a 21 yard free all the way to the net to leave only 1 point between the sides after 17 minutes. Michael Mackey scored the equalizer

A Thomastown team playing their best hurling for some years created a major surprise when they defeated the county champions Rower-Inistioge by a single point in a thrilling first round senior hurling championship game at Nowlan Park on Sunday.

This was a changed Thomastown side from the half-hearted outfit we saw in last year's championship. Powered by Ollie Walsh who gave an outstanding display in goal, they hurled with spirit and determination and on this form they will be a considerable force in this year's championship.

Rower-Inistioge although they did not show the same spirit as against Bennettsbridge in last year's county final played as good as they were let and just could not get on top of the Thomastown boys.

Although all the Thomastown side played their part in this fine victory, pride of place must go to the outstanding Seamus Kearney. Only a teenager Kearney broke the hearts of all the Rower-Inistioge forwards. He was easily the best defender on view as he broke up attack after attack.

Another major factor in Thomastown's victory was the impeccable display given by Ollie Walsh who did not make a single mistake throughout the hour. His long puck-outs assured the forwards of an adequate supply of the ball. He made one really magnificent save from a 21 yard free by Eddie Keher.

An unusual incident occurred during the hour. Thomastown's Brendan O' Sullivan who sustained an injured finger went to the lend line to exchange jersies with substitute John Kelly. After removing his jersey Brendan saw a scoring opportunity. He rushed across the goal, jerseyless, gained possession and sent to the net. The score was disallowed however as he was judged to have left the field of play.

Playing with the wind in their favour in the first half Thomastown put everything they had into the game and had the Rower-Inistioge defence confused for most of the first period. Although they had the upper hand, Thomastown had to work very hard for all their first half scores and at times they made heavy work of scoring.

The Rower never really settled down in this first half and corner forward John Delaney and Johnny Murphy were a constant threat to the Rower defence. Both of these players made some excellent breaks and all the Rower-Inistioge defence could do was to foul them which gave Thomastown some handy points from frees.

Eddie Keher was very quiet in this first half and his only contribution to the scoring was a point from a free. He was never given an inch by the close marking Sean Challoner who did an excellent job of marking the Kilkenny sharpshooter.

One of the best scores in this half came from the Rower-

Inistioge midfielder Pat Kavanagh when he sent a line ball from over 45 yards out over the bar.

Thomastown led at half tine by 1-9 to 0-5.

Thomastown increased their lead early in the second half when substitute John Kelly scored a fine goal .Seamus Kearney scored Thomastown's only other score of this half, a point from a 70.

The Rower-Inistioge gradually settled down and bit by bit they pulled down the Thomastown lead but a stubborn Thomastown defence refused to lie down.

Willie Murphy their inter county centre half back was very disappointing. He never got going and was easily beaten. Pat Kavanagh was the outstanding figure at midfield where he was ably assisted by his brother Dermot. Pat contributed some very nice points to his side total.

The Rower defence never clicked. Eddie Keher, Dan White, Tom Murphy who had split the Bridge defence in last year's final never looked a serious threat while the rest of the attack were also well watched.

Mooncoin deserved their win but they had to fight hard. Ollie Walsh left the goal to take up a role in the attack and signalised the change with by blazing to the net from a free. The score put new life into Thomastown but it came too late and Thomastown are now regretting that Ollie did not decide to change earlier.

It was the failure of the Thomastown attack that made all the difference. Mooncoin were a goal and six points up before Thomastown had their first point after 20 minutes. In that period Thomastown had hit many wides and unlike the game he had against Rower-Inistioge Seamus Kearney had an off day

Obviously it was designed to keep the Thomastown score within limits, and at the other end Ned Doyle and Claus Dunne picked off the points to keep them safely in front.

Another factor in Thomastown's failure was that Ted Hoyne did not really come into the game until the second half and even then this was not by any means one of his better games. For the most part Claus Dunne and Mick Conway had the better

Noel and Ted Hoyne in the second half won some share of the spoils for Thomastown but their full forward line, like that of Mooncoin, had little say in the game and it was left to Brendan O'Sullivan, Sean Coone and George Lee to do the scoring.

2nd Round Replay Sunday 26th October 1969 Nowlan Park The Bridge and the Village must try again Another Thrilling Draw. James Stephens 3-9 Bennettsbridge 3-9

A see-saw struggle between Bennettsbridge and James Stephens resulted in a thrilling 3-9 to 3-9 draw in their senior hurling championship replay in Nowlan Park on Sunday.

Both sides should be fully satisfied with a draw as it was a fair result. The lead changed hands on a number of occasions during the hour and on two occasions during the second half the sides were level.

After two minutes of the second half they were on terms for the first time Bennettsbridge 2-3 James Stephens 1-6. Bennettsbridge then went ahead but James Stephens came thundering back and the sides were again level (3-7 each) with 10 minutes left.

Third time lucky for James Stephens James Stephens 4-3 Bennettsbridge 2-2

Three goals within five minutes in the first half were the decisive scores in James Stephens' magnificent 4-3 to 2-2 victory of Bennettsbridge in their senior hurling championship tie at Nowlan Park on Sunday.

The second replay was not by any means the best of the three games, but there were still plenty of thrills during the hour. A downpour before the start make underfoot conditions difficult but both sides adapted themselves well to the slippery pitch.

The three goals scored between the 24th and the 29th minutes were the deciding scores. Before these scores came there was only a point between the sides, and although The Village looked like the much stronger side, they were in a sorry position after 25 minutes of the first half with only a goal to their credit.

The last time a senior championship game went to a third game was in 1935, and then again James Stephens were involved. On that occasion they pipped Tullaroan by a single point.

From the start of Sunday's game James Stephens looked a cooler, more determined and far more confident side than in the previous encounters.

They set about their task right from the start but they made little headway against a stubborn Bennettsbridge side. They were in command for most of the first half but they still only lead by a point after 24 minutes.

Both sides missed some very easy scoring chances in the first ten minutes. Mick Dunne tried from a goal from a 21 yard free and his shot was cleared and J.Kinsella tried to tap over the bar but his shot hit the upright and went wide.

Five minutes before half time the city side sprang to life and Mick Dunne struck the first deadly blow when he collected a pass from Seán Brennan and gave Noel Skehan no chance with a pile driver.

Minutes later Noel Skehan in the 'Bridge goal was caught napping when a 70 yards free by Fan Larkin dropped over his head and into the net. John Kinsella went from midfield to centre-forward, Phil Cullen moved to midfield and John Holohan went back to help the defence.

With the wind in their favour the 'Bridge tried desperately to get back into the game. They mounted attack after attack but their forwards were outclassed by a very strong defence. After 15 minutes of this half the 'Bridge looked a tired force.

No matter how hard they tried they could not penetrate the city team's rear-guard which covered up brilliantly. They could only score two goals in this half while the 'Village' replied with three points.

This was easily the best display given by the'Village' in this year's championship. But they must still be wondering how they made such hard work of beating a weak 'Bridge side. Bennettsbridge had been on the top of Kilkenny hurling for the past 15 years and they surely deserve a rest.

In the semi-final James Stephens meet Galmoy. The Galmoy side will certainly be no pushover as they demonstrated when disposing of last year's county champions The Rower Inistiogue. In the other semi-final Mooncoin take on last year's Junior champions The Fenians (Johnstown.)

Another Sound Display

As usual Mick Moore gave a sound display in the Village goal but in the beginning of the second period he was a little shaky. Phil and Paddy Larkin and Niall Morrissey formed a very sound full back line. Morrissey changed positions with Fan Larkin in the first half.

Fan Larkin was a tower of strength at centre-half back. E.Morrissey had one of his best games ever in the Village colours. Despite a head injury sustained in the first half he played brilliantly all through and was one of the main reason s for the failure of the 'Bridge forwards.

Michael Taylor and Michael Crotty got the better of the midfield exchanges. Between them they gave the forwards a good supply and curbed the activities of star midfielder Paddy Moran. Paddy worked tireless during the hour but he was alone in his efforts.

Seán Brennan who wore protective headgear was a source of consistent worry to Seamie Cleere. He got most help from Phil Brennan and Mick Dunne. Mick, who was off form for the first two games came back to his best on Sunday and did some very

good work. He contributed two very well taken goals.

The 'Village' still have problems in the forward line and these will have to be resolved before the next game.

Noel Skehan had one of the toughest games in his life in the 'Bridge goal. On several occasions the referee allowed him to take far too much punishment as he attempted to clear.

Full-back Conor O'Brien had a handful in Seán Leahy but he succeeded in holding him scoreless. Jim Treacy and Larry Cleere were not near as effective as usual. Seamus Cleere worked very hard on the half back line but as the game progressed he became less effective.

The 'Bridge selectors failed to find a suitable partner for Paddy Moran. They moved a number of players to help him but they just could not hold the 'Village' pair.

The Bridge attack fell down completely. Players like John Kinsella, Pat Lalor and Noel Ryan, who are usually a headache to any defence, were very quiet. Mick McCarthy who played very well in the second game was also inactive.

In fact the only forward worth mention was Paddy Treacy. Paddy, who missed the second match, worked unceasingly during the game but he lacked support.

The 'Bridge did try to put some life into the attack when they introduced John McGovern but even he could do nothing to stop the all-conquering 'Village' side.

James Stephens 4-11 Galmoy 1-7

James Stephens returned to hurling scene in earnest on Sunday when they beat Galmoy 4-11 to 1-7 to qualify for Kilkenny senior hurling championship final in which they will play the Fenians of Johnstown. Their last appearance in a county final was in 1937 when they defeated Dicksboro.

Galmoy surprisingly offered little more than token opposition. In spite of the promise shown by the Village in the past few years and their great display against Bennettsbridge few people thought that Sunday's tie would never have been such a cake walk for them.

James Stephens were a completely competent side and it was hard to find a weak link. Their defence was sound. They controlled centre-field and their forwards let few opportunities go astray.

While Galmoy battled gamely if unavailingly, they fell short of what was expected of them and while they were in with a chance up to the interval the early second half goals left their position hopeless.

The James Stephens success is significant from several points of view. This is the first time since Dicksboro won the championship in 1950 and before that the powerful Eire Og side of the late 1930's and 1940's that a city side made any worthwhile impact in the senior hurling championship. This success is all the more welcome because of that.

It was probably the failure of Willie Harte and Joe Doherty to rise to the occasion that was mainly accountable for Galmoy's poor showing. There were other disappointments in the Galmoy side but the northerners have become accustomed to pin there hopes on these two. Consequently their failure had a demoralising effect.

James Stephens played with confidence and their approach work was perfect. They combined much better than the opposition and their striking was top class. In a well balance side two men stood out. Fan Larkin gave a magnificent display at full back, so much so that the good work of Phil Larkin and Paddy Larkin was overshadowed by his brilliance.

Sean Leahy in the full forward line proved the undoing of Galmoy. His first goal was the inspiration the Village needed to push ahead and his goal immediately after the restart marked the beginning of the end for Galmoy.

Galmoy might have liked firmer going which would have

suited Willie Harte but the lighter James Stephens side had little to gain from the soft going and their power hurling in the second half left little room to doubt about their ability.

Mick Moore in the James Stephens goal gave another faultless display and was not at fault for the only shot that got past him. Phil and Paddy Larkin combined splendidly with Fan. The ever improving Mick Leahy turned in another splendid hour at left half back, getting good support from Eamonn and Niall Morrissey.

James Stephens were completely at on top at centre field where Mick Taylor and Mick Crotty accounted for several Galmoy partnerships.

All the James Stephens forwards were good and they showed splendid team spirit. Sean Leahy was of course the real match winner but the work of of Mickey Dunne, Sean and Philly Brennan, Eamonn Tallent and Ned Byrne contributed to the success.

Charlie Brennan made some good saves in the Galmoy goal and Liam Hanrahan was a hard worker in the full back line while Tommy Phelan and Bobby Delaney tried hard under the constant pressure. Joe Doherty showed only flashes of his real form. Frances Harte and Charlie Doherty played well but the failure of Willie Harte to strike his usual form at centre-field left Galmoy at a distinct disadvantage. The Galmoy attack generally had its worst day for quit some time. Paddy Phelan was a hard trier and Jim Dillon showed accuracy from frees. Lotty Harte was about the best man in the attack with Paddy Phelan lending good support.

Pat Delaney who was well marked by John Walsh was the main reason for the Johnstown revival. A tireless worker he kept slogging away until he found a slight weakness in the Mooncoin defence. Fenians are are a very fine side and they will be very hard to beat in the final. A well balanced side They have no weaknesses and each man keeps working right up to the final whistle. They have gone from strength to strength since winning the junior championship and have been steadly improving in the senior championship.

The first half was tame enough but still there were some very good hurling and the sides were neck and neck for all this period.

Had justice being done Johnstown would have in the lead at the interval as they had much of the play in the first half. An easy goal by Tom Ryan left the losers a goal ahead after 24 minutes of this period but 2 points from frees by Tommy O'Connell and a point from a 70 from Pat Henderson left the sides level at half time. *Mooncoin 2-3 Fenians 1-6.*

The Lynch-Doyle switch paid off right from the start of the second half but after only two minutes Doyle was presented with a goa I when he found himself right in front of goal with only the goalie to beat but he shot hopelessy wide. He however attorned for this miss with some good scores later. Mooncoin led by 4-7 to 1-8 with only 8 minutes left for play.

Day of Glory For James Stephens Fenians Flop In Final Fiasco

James Stephens 8-5 Fenians 2-7

A sensational and devastating opening five minutes which brought three goals and two points settled for all practical purposes, the fate of the 1969 senior hurling championship in which James Stephens romped home to an 8 - 5 to 2 - 7 victory over The Fenians of Johnstown in Nowlan Park on Sunday.

An estimated 10,000 – 12,000 spectators, a new attendance record, were treated to an exhibition of team work and ground

hurling by the victors which left the northern side helpless in the early stages and left them with an impossible task when they got the wind behind them in the second half.

The final was memorable only from a James Stephens point of view and though Fenians battled gamely to the end all the interest had gone out of the game long before the final whistle.

James Stephens won their third title and won back for the Village a noted stronghold for many years some of the glory associated with the city parish in the herculean days of Paddy Larkin and his colleagues in the 1930's and before that when James Stephens had many fine hurlers.

Big Margin

The 16 points winning margin was a crushing

blow for the junior champions of the previous year, making their first appearance in a senior final but they can take some consolation from the fact that they won their way to the final in their first time of trying and must benefit from the experience gained.

A strong wind with occasional showers of hail made the pitch slippery – conditions were difficult but the winners adapted themselves better, their team work was superior and they played like a winning team from the start.

While there were no weak links in in a highly competent James Stephens side, the full forward line wrought the greatest havoc and Eddie Byrne, Sean Leahy, and captain Mickey Dunne can claim a big in the triumph. Eddie Byrne whose ground hurling carried terrific force, was top scorer with four goals, Sean Leahy contributing two goals and three points.

Playing with the wind in the opening half the James Stephens team adopted a policy of getting early scores. But they could hardly have hoped to have chalked up an eleven points lead in five minutes. This they did, however and it is fair to say that there was no fluke about any of them.

The Johnstown full back line of Mick Carroll, Nicky Orr, and Martin Fitzpatrick were obviously caught napping in the early stages and they never got properly into the game afterwards. Crotty in Attack

James Stephens also deployed their forces intelligently and played Mick Crotty at centre forward where he gave Pat Henderson a most unhappy time. This is one game the county centre half-back will want to forget. He was never able to master Crotty and with the man on whom Johnstown depended so much neutralised, the defence generally failed to come to grips with the Village attack.

By way of contrast the Village defence was very sound with Fan Larkin superb at full back. Mick Taylor and Sean Brennan were superior at centre-field and several switches which Johnstown made here failed to make any appreciable impact.

The Johnstown attack also fell short of expectations. Pat Delaney apart - and he certainly must be absolved from blame

for the defeat - there was little serious threat from the others, though Tommy O'Connell put over some nice scores.

Mick Moore, apart from one occasion when he flustered and handled the ball on the ground, gave a sound display in the James Stephens goal and Phil and Paddy Larkin gave good help to the irrepressible Fan at full-back. Niall and Eamon Morrissey and Mick Leahy did good work on the half line.

Fenians tried substitutes for both Fergus Farrell and Patrick Murphy at centre-field but there was no stopping Mick Taylor and Sean Brennan. The whole James Stephens attack was full of power and if Ned Byrne and Sean Leahy had the hefty end of the scores to their credit, Mick Crotty, Eamonn Tallent, Mickey Dunne and Phil Brennan were all in great form.

P.J. Ryan made some very good saves in the Fenians goal and Shem Delaney and Seamus Grace did well on the half back line with only occasional flashes from Pat Henderson. Mick Carroll, Nickey Orr and Martin Fitzpatrick were caught napping for the early Village scores and did not get into their stride until late in the game.

Pat Delaney was outstanding in the attack and tried all the way but apart from John Moriarty and Tommy O'Connell, the attack made little impression on the sound Village defence.

The game opened lively and despite the rapidly increasing lead which gave it a one sided aspect, there was some good hurling in the first half. After 10 minutes of the second half the fare was poor.

The teams were played round the pitch by the St. Patrick's Brass and Reed Band and the Durrow Pipe Band.

The Scoring

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James Stephens got away to a dream start when Sean Leahy slammed in a great goal from an awkward angle in the second minute and before another minute had passed Mickey Dunne sent over the Bar. Sean Leahy fastened on to a centre by Mickey Dunne to score another goal and a Sean Brennan point gave the Village a 2-2 to nil lead after four minutes. Ned Byrne with a terrific ground shot sent past P.J. Ryan in the Fenians goal in the 5th minute.

Willie Watson opened the account for Fenians with a point from a free a minute later. P.J. Ryan made a great save in the Fenians goal but his weak clearance came to Mick Crotty who shot to the net in the 12th minute, stretching the James Stephens lead to four goals. Eamon Tallent stretched it further with a fine goal in the 13TH minute.

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JAMES



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Pat Henderson pointed a Fenians free in the 13th minute and Sean Leahy pointed from a free a minute later. Tommy O'Connell pointed a Fenians free.

Fenians first goal came in the 27th minute when Johnny Moriarty blasted to the net from a free to leave the half time score: James Stephens 5-2, Fenians 1-4.

James Stephens had a good second half start when Sean Leahy pointed and Ned Byrne scored his second goal within 3 minutes of the restart.

Pat Delaney raised Fenians hopes when he sent all the way to the net from a 50 yards free in the 5th minute and added a point from a free two minutes later.

The issue was well an truly sealed when Ned Byrne, following a good centre by Mickey Dunne shot passed P. J. Ryan in the Fenians goal. Sean Leahy added a point from a free at the end of the third quarter and the only scores in the last quarter were 2 points from Pat Delaney.

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Sean 'Georgie' Leahy 1938 - 2017

We begin at the end. The throngs of mourners who congregated at Georgie's home in Archers' Crescent and St. Patrick's Church in June seemed never ending. They came from every part of Ireland, wherever hurling is played, to pay respects to one of hurling's greatest characters. GAA Presidents past and present, County Board officers, players, colleagues and acquaintances who had been touched at one time by his magnetism were anxious to pay tribute to one of GAA's and the Village's finest.

They all spoke of his enduring and simple qualities, kindness, honesty, enthusiasm, integrity. They agreed, above all, that 'Georgie was a gentleman'. He knew everybody, remembered everybody. 'How are ye going down South?' he would ask, though he generally knew the answer before it was offered.

Georgie lived and worked on the street. His job for forty years was with Posts and Telegraphs, always a foreman, a leader. When he managed work was something of a mystery as he had a word with every passerby. His humanity and charity were quiet, often surreptitiously passing a few bob to a less fortunate soul.

From there he embarked on his favourite job, coaching officer to schools in South Kilkenny. 'When is Georgie coming?' was a question many a harassed teacher had to answer. The school kids flocked to him because he had a way. Goodness knows how he remembered every name and connection in the county but he always had the kind and appropriate word.

This latter quality enabled him to become a truly outstanding hurling coach. He began his coaching career at 16, helping out with James Stephens. By the 1960s underage hurling was at a critical point in Kilkenny city. Other than primary schools there was little organization, less coaching and even less interest in developing young players. The



work of Georgie, Bill Cody and later Fr. Liam Barron made a lasting impression on city hurling. When they inspired James Stephens to success from 1965 onwards, other clubs began to follow, taking their inspiration from these men. While playing himself, helping to raise a family, Georgie managed to bring club teams and underage county teams all over the country to test themselves against the best. In an age when young people were expected to be 'seen and not heard', Georgie gave them a new lease of life and his tremendous enthusiasm and positive energy were a breath of fresh air to all he met.

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His most successful days in coaching were in the seventies and eighties. He was a Kilkenny senior selector from 1972 to '78, county minor manager in those years too when great success came to the county. In 1975 he became sole manager and selector to a James Stephens team which went on to win three county titles (1975,'76, '81) and two All Ireland club titles (1976, '82) in the golden days of club hurling.

He managed Laois from 1981 to '86, bringing them from a low base to the Centenary Cup final of 1984 and Leinster final of 1985. Over the years he managed Offaly, Waterford, Westmeath, Wexford and Carlow, always raising the bar of expectations and imbuing everybody with his love for the game. He conducted countless coaching courses and weekends with clubs, in the company of his great friend Brendan O'Sullivan. Georgie could never say no. He loved going to small places and finding hurling passion. He will always be spoken of with reverence, gratitude and admiration in those abodes scattered all over Ireland.

He became the first man to train two All Ireland club winning teams when he guided Glenmore to the Tommy Moore Cup in 1991, adding a hatful of county senior titles with them too.

But his favourite club outside the Village was Galmoy. His father, Jack, hailed from there and Georgie never forgot his roots. Appropriately, the Blue and Whites and James Stephens u14 hurlers were the last teams he trained as illness latterly took over.

He played down his own achievements, dismissing his own hurling efforts as 'average enough'. A junior title with James Stephens as a 17-year-old in 1955, a senior title in 1969 and one year as a sub with Kilkenny seniors, 1970/1 winning a Leinster title were the pinnacles of success. In between, he labored long and ferociously as a full forward, in the days when the battles were full blooded.

To Rita, his beloved wife, his family and friends we extend our deepest sympathies. Ní bheidh a leithéid an arís.
