

Tá athas an domhain orm, ar son Cumann Luthchleas Gael Cill Chainnigh, to welcome in conjunction with the Lyrath Estate Hotel, the Fenians side who were the 3-in-a-row Senior Hurling Champions from 1972 to 1974 to today's St Canice's Credit Union Senior County Final in UPMC Nowlan Park.

Fenians GAA Club was founded in 1968 with the coming together of the two clubs in the Johnstown Parish, St Kieran's and St Finbarr's. There was instant success with the Fenians winning the 1968 Junior Final by defeating Glenmore. Their success at Senior was staggering. The Fenians competed in six Senior County finals in a row. Of those six finals, three were against Bennettsbridge and three against James Stephens.



Their maiden Senior final in 1969 ended in a loss to James Stephens but, in 1970, they turned the tables on their rivals James Stephens, and secured their first Senior title. In 1971 they would lose to that great Bennettsbridge side. However, over the next three years, the Fenians proved victorious and joined Mooncoin, Carrickshock and, much later, Shamrocks Ballyhale, as one of only four clubs to achieve a 3-in-a-row.

The first final in 1972 saw the Fenians reverse the 1971 loss against Bennettsbridge. On Sunday 19th October 1972 on a wet and windy day, the Fenians, inspired by County players Pat Henderson and Pat Delaney were triumphant on a scoreline of 3-10 to 1-6.

In 1973, the Fenians defeated James Stephens in an enthralling Final. The Fenians looked to be in trouble at half time, trailing by 4-6 to 2-2 but showed the customary Fenians fighting spirit to overcome their rivals by 7-8 to 5-10 in the end.

The Fenians completed the 3-in-a-row in 1974, overcoming Bennettsbridge in atrocious weather conditions by 0-10 to 0-6. Between 1977 and 1981, the Fenians would compete in three more finals, winning the 1977 final against the Rower Inistinge.

The 1974 team would later create history by becoming the first Kilkenny club to win a Leinster Senior Hurling Club Final by beating St Rynagh's of Offaly by 2-6 to 1-6 in the final but unfortunately, they lost the All-Ireland Club Final to Cork powerhouse St Finbarr's by 3-8 to 1-6.

It was no coincidence that the golden period with Fenians GAA club was also mirrored at County level with Fenians players playing prominent roles in the County's success between the years 1969 and 1975.

I extend Míle Buiochas to the Lyrath Estate Hotel and their Manager, Emma Jane Eaton, for honouring the Jubilee team who will be guests of honour with their partners at a celebration dinner and will be provided with a special memento of the occasion. Thanks also to Gerry O'Neill and Mary Morgan for their work in researching and producing this souvenir booklet.

The 3-in-a-row was an outstanding achievement for a small rural club and, to this day, the club has maintained that great fighting spirit and contributed so much to Kilkenny Hurling both on and off the field.

HOW THE FENIANS CAME TO BE

The extraordinary rise of the Fenian Hurling team which culminated in five County SH titles between 1970 and 1977 can be traced to the County JH title victory of 1968, or even perhaps to the success of the Johnstown MH team of 1960 which reached the County Final of that year only to beaten by Mooncoin in a replay.

A NEW CLUB IS FORMED

Johnstown's glorious run in the 1960 minor hurling championship was reflected in their representation on the Kilkenny minor teams of 1960 and 1961. Pat Delaney was on the panel in 1960, Pat Henderson was centre back in 1961, with Willie Waltson also on the panel. But for the club, there followed a series of barren years in which it failed to proceed beyond the first round of the junior championship. Hurling folk followed Pat Henderson's career on the Kilkenny senior hurling team and rejoiced when he won his first senior All-Ireland medal in 1967. In 1966, Johnstown mustered a formidable junior hurling team around Pat Henderson, with Pat Delaney, Seamus Grace, Frank Holohan and Nicky Orr in support. However, in a controversial ending to a championship game against Coon, in which the referee added on an extra eight minutes, Johnstown were defeated by a single point. Arising from recriminations immediately following the game, and much as happened in 1959,a group of players and others broke away and again entered a separate team in 1967, known as St. Finbarr's. There were two teams in the parish that year, St. Kieran's and St. Finbarr's. Neither progressed further than the first round, St Kierans being defeated by Coon and St Finbarrs by Conahy. Prospects were bleak but a new dawn was heralded by the progress of the U-21 team that same year. The U-21 team of 1967 was drawn from players of both clubs in the parish. Unburdened by the animosity between the two clubs, the players soon formed into a closely knit unit and there was great spirit in the team. The whole parish, long starved of success, rallied behind the players. Early victories over Ballyragget and Freshford led to a showdown with Coon in the Northern Final. In a torrid match, Johnstown emerged victorious and qualified for this first ever U-21 Final against a Bennettsbridge team that had Pat Lalor, John Kinsella and Pat Kealy in its ranks. The Johnstown players may have felt overawed playing against a club with such an exalted tradition and it was also their first game in Nowlan Park. In any event, the team did not achievethe fluency of earlier games and victory went to Bennettsbridge. The team was: Michael Dowling, P. J. THE FOUNDING OF THE FENIANS

The achievement of the U-21 team signalled that the best prospects of a bright future in Johnstown hurling lay in a single unified team drawn from the whole parish. Nobody doubted that the parish had fine hurlers in Pat Henderson, Pat Delaney, Willie Watson, Séamus Grace, Jim Maher, Pat Murphy and Micky Carroll. It was felt that a team containing these players and supplemented by the up and coming U-21 players would make a bold bid for the Junior Championship. On the 16th March 1968, the Fenians' Hurling Club was formed. Here is the text of the minutes of the 1st annual general meeting.

"At an extraordinary general meeting in the C.Y.M.S. Hall Johnstown on March 16th 1968 between the St. Finbarrs club and the Johnstown club, a new club was formed. It was called The Fenian Hurling Club. Rev. Fr. Malone was unanimously elected as Chairman. Paul Skehan, Michael Gannon, Paddy Henderson (Ballyspellan), James Ryan, Edward Curran, Pat Henderson were elected committee members. The committee was elected as follows; The Finbarr's club picked three members two from the Johnstown club and one from their own and the Johnstown club did likewise. The committee was to have full authority for the administration of the club - selection of teams etc. It was proposed to purchase a new set of jerseys which would be the property of the committee. The committee was left with authority to name the club, select jerseys and raise funds. It was agreed that training would alternate between the sportsfield and Dwan's field every second week. The members of the Johnstown club were to provide nine roots of ash as members of the Finbarr's Club already had a similar number. These were to be used to provide hurleys for the club."

Fenians 3-1 Erin's Own (City) 0-0

The 1914 Kilkenny senior hurling championship was an unusual one.

First Tullaroan were drawn to play Mooncoin in the opening round, but the Tullaroan men objected to Ballyhale as the venue. The dispute dragged on. Tullaroan did not travel on the appointed day and they were thrown out of the championship. Mooncoin progressed to the semi-final where they were drawn to meet Johnstown. But it was a Johnstown team with a difference, for half of the team came from Tullaroan. It was presumably possible to do this since none of them had yet played in the championship. John Holohan of Johnstown was the captain. Pierce Purcell from Crosspatrick had won a junior All-Ireland with Tipperary in 1913 and had lined out with Tipperary in the 1911 game won by Kilkeny which was played in place of All-Ireland final that year.

Also in the team were Jim Byrne, Michael Morrissey, Andy Holohan, E. O'Brien. William, Shortall, Jim Scott, Tom Dunne Dwan. hailed from Ballycallan. The Tullaroan contingent included Pat Clohosey, Sim Walton, Phil Hogan, Dan and Mick Kennedy, Larry Walsh, Dick Grace. Johnstown played Mooncoin in St. James's Park on 21 June. The game ended in a draw, according to the Mooncoin book

It was eventually played there on 11 October. Johnstown emerged victorious on the score Johnstown 3-3, Mooncoin 2-0.

The final against Erin's Own was played in St. James's Park in 1915. The game began an hour and a half late, and "The Whip" was not too impressed with the hurling on the day. The attendance was large, and although there was a little encroachment, it was nothing much to cavil about. Weather conditions were bad. Before the game a very heavy shower of sleet and hailstones fell to a depth of several inches. With the sunshine that followed, the pitch became very heavy and the players found it difficult to maintain their equilibrium. Add to that a greasy ball and one can see how the standard of play was not the most exciting. John Lalor, Hon. Sec. Kilkenny County Board, refereed the game.

The city team played against the wind but with the advantage of the sun. It was they who attacked from the throw in but were repulsed and for a time exchanges were even. Sim Walton missed a point for Johnstown and an Erin's Own attack inspired by Matt Gargan proved equally fruitless. The only event of note at this stage was the breaking of Clohosey's hurley. The reporter remarked: "This was the fourth caman"



that had been broken, a fact that prompted the observation by my friend 'Fox' Maher, Want of use'. Clohosey was provided with a hurley after some delay".

Exchanges were even for a time and the play improved, but not for long. After twenty-three minutes' play, Johnstown succeeded in getting a goal, and this put just a little life in what was a very dead exhibition. But after a few passages of play "the game resumed the dullness for which it will be long remembered. There was missing and muffing in abundance all over the field. Johnstown were now doing all the pressing, but a good defence and bad judgement prevented them increasing their lead. A fast shot from Walton went wide by a very narrow margin but he soon made amends. Getting possession from the puck out, he landed the ball in the net for a good goal. Honours were even in the following exchanges, and shortly after the half-time whistle went, leaving the scores:- Johnstown 2-0, Erins Own 0-0.

On the change of ends Erin's Own took the advantage of the wind and the sun was not so strong. Johnstown had only a lead of two goals - not a very formidable advantage with the wind, and the hopes of the city lads ran high. However, there were disappointments in store, for immediately on the ball being set in motion Johnstown assumed the upper hand and swarmed around the Erin's Own posts. This was the most exciting passage of the game as Johnstown began a battle royal for supremacy. "It lasted for about five minutes, and it was delightful to see the defenders standing out so manfully against


the "sniping" of their opponents. In and out the ball travelled, and the crowd cheered every clearance to the echo. After a tough struggle the defenders were victorious. There were overs and overs and overs. Only rarely did Erin's Own make an incursion into their opponents' territory, and they were always repulsed. A marvellous goal by Walton was the next interesting movement. Having deceived his opponent on the right he swung round to the left and from about 70 yards out landed the sphere in the net amidst general acclamation. It was old times again. Purcell scored a nice point, and, shortly after, the long whistle went, leaving Erin's Own pointless.

The final scores were:- Johnstown 3-1, Erin's Own 0-0". This was the first senior championship win for Johnstown and the last until 1970. The club received £4 in expenses for the final. The teams were:

1972 COUNTY SH FINAL

Between 1969 and 1978, the Fenians contested eight Senior Finals and won five of them. Their apprenticeship, though tough, was shortlived. Following the resounding defeat at the hands of James Stephens in 1970, who themselves were seeking their first title since 1937 (when they defeated Dicksboro), they went on to win the final proper in the same year. Following defeat at the hands of Bennettsbridge in 1971, the Fenians embarked on what was to become a peerless three in a row. Since the introduction of the parish rule which prevented players gravatating towards successful clubs, no team had put more than two titles back to back. Tribute should of course be paid to the Carrickshock team of the forties and Bennettsbridge who won numerous titles in the fifties and sixties. But the magical, seemingly unattainable in the modern day, trinity of titles became the hallowed achievement of

the Fenians. However, when only five points up at half time, having played with a gale, victory against Bennettsbridge in the 1972 final did not look likely. The Fenians displayed their by now well known tactical guile and steel. In playing numerous players at midfield at different stages, they successfully stemmed the supply of ball into the ever threatening Bennettsbridge forwards. Pat Hendersons, striking into a wind he later described as 'contrary' and 'not as beneficial as it seemed' was outstanding, nevertheless. The vital sector of midfield, was dominated by Mick Garrett and Paddy Broderick broke 'Bridge hearts with his scores. Despite the brilliance of Skehan and Treacy and the efforts of Watt Kennedy up front, the 'Bridge had no answer to the increasingly familiar Fenian will to prevail. The first step on an historic journey had been taken.

THE FENIANS OVERCOME THE ODDS

THE FENIANS 3-10 BENNETSBRIDGE ... 1-6

Any betting man courageous enough.at the interval to place a bet on the Fenians holding out in the second half against the champions, Bennetsbridge, in the Kilkenny Senior Hurling Championship final at Nowlan Park, Kilkenny, yesterday, would have got handsome odds. After playing with a galeforce wind and backed by heavy rain, their lead at halftime was only five points-14, of which only the goal came from play, to 0-2. what a turnabout the second half proved to be! The Fenians, who could do nothing right with the wind, carried the game to the defending champions against the wind, which admittedly had slackened off somewhat, and by the end were most deserving winners. It was a dreadful day for hurling, and with the wind and rain sweeping along the pitch from the-Railway End, ball control was almost impossible and footholds treacherous. In the first half the 'Bridge defender s covered themselves with glory, none more -than Noel Skehan in goal, and all six backs played with great confidence and courage. Yet when The Fenians faced the wind and rain they never flinched and after ten minutes of the second half had stretched their lead with a goal and two points. Five minutes later Bennetsbridge reduced the lead to six points, but that was as near as they got and they were fighting a losing battle to the end. With Pat Delaney at centrefield in the second half and Pat Henderson at centre-half back opening up, the hurling was as good as conditions would allow, but Bennetsbridge had no answer and even the reliable defence of the first half wilted under the pressure. In addition to those two, the new champions had stalwarts in P. J. Ryan In goal, Mickey Orr, Shem Delaney, John Moriarty, P. Broderick and M. Garrett. No blame for defeat could be attached to Bennetsbridge men Noel Skehan, Jim Treacy, Pat Lalor. John Holohan and P, Moran. But the attack proved surprisingly inept.


ALTHOUGH there was not a shred of doubt about the justice of the outcome of the Kilkenny Senior Hurling Championship final in which The Fenians (Johnstown) defeated title-holders, Bennettsbridge, by 3-10 to 1-6 at Nowlan Park, Kilkenny, yesterday, the losers seemed to me to commit a grievous tactical error, which contributed to their downfall. Much to my astonishment when Noel Skehan won the toss, the 'Bridge elected to play against a wind of almost gale force and rain of a density that must have impaired vision. But at the interval, at which stage the Fenians led by only 1-4 to 0-2, it appeared the losers had adopted a judicious course. Such had been the wind's carry of the ball that there seemed little point in resuming the encounter - a runaway Bennettsbridge victory seem in prospect. It is my assumption that the apparent security in which the losers found themselves at the interval turned out to be a hidden enemy in the camp. The Fenians, on the other hand, must have considered that their ambition was beyond attainment, and that nothing less than courage far beyond the call of normal duty and frenzied effort would save them from a humiliating rout. On the restart, there was a marked lack of urgency in the play of the 'Bridge side, whereas the Fenians set out to defy the opposition and their allies the wind and rain. That they did. In the first eight minutes of the second half they put on 1-2 without reply. Then as if to punish the losers for having spurned their good fortune in winning the toss, the elements took a hand in the proceedings. The wind dropped considerably, and the rain abated. But even before the day blew itself to comparative meekness, it was obvious that the warrior Fenians were capable of taming the weather-assisted Bennettsbridge. While every man in the victorious side will be hailed for many a day in the Johnstown parish, their success, their second in the event, could not have been forged had it not been for the superlative performances of Pat Henderson and Pat Delaney. The part the pair played in the success was even greater than the contribution

they made to the triumph of Kilkenny in this year's All-Ireland final. the length of some of the balls Henderson struck when the wind was howling was astonishing. Everything he did had the stamp of class. The Johnstown men behind the scenes also deserved much credit for the victory, as the switch of the devastating Delaney from the "mark" to midfield at the start of the second half demolished the losers in the area. In addition to lording it in the centre of the field, Delaney gave assistance of incalculable value to the attack, and clearly caused alarm, if not panic, to spread through the defeated side every time he even moved to a ball. But this victory, in which success over Bennettsbridge in a decider meant as much to The Fenians as did an All-Ireland football final win for Offaly over Kerry, was by no means a two-man achievement. In Johny Moriarty, Nicky Orr, Pat Murphy, Shem Delaney, a brother of Pat, Mick Garrett, Paddy Broderick, Billie Watson and Tommy O'Connell, the victors had other men who frequently won my admiration. Best for the losers - the superstitious among their followers will surely ruefully comment that they were seeking their 13th title - were brilliant goalkeeper, Noel Skehan, Jim Treacy, Paddy Moran, Pat Lawlor, Conor O'Brien and John Holohan.

Scorers for The Fenians were: Broderick (1-6, five pts. from frees), Watson (1-0), O'Connell (1-0), Pat Delaney (0-2), Garrett (0-1) and Henderson (0-1). The losers' marksmen were: Watt Kennedy (0-4, three from frees), Kevin Dunne (0-1), John Dowling (0-1) and Moran (0-1).

1973 COUNTY SH FINAL

Since their fateful meetings in 1970, there was something special about the meetings of the village and Fenians. Two clubs, relatively new to senior success, had managed to strike up a rivalry that caught the imagination of the hurling public almost immediately. Hence, the Final of 1973 was as keenly awaited as it was contested. The Fenians had benefited from tough outings against Mooncoin and Rower Inistioge but the village looked like winners at half time. They owned

midfield, and, having scored freely, seemed certain to have secured victory. But they were hit for five goals in the second half, three of which were scored by Billy Fitzpatrick. The Johnstown boys had made it two back to back. Éire Óg referee, Paddy Johnston, who officiated at many important games involving the Fenians around this time, acquired the unenviable tag of Paddy 'Johnstown', for his alleged bias towards the Fenians, a point vehemently contested by many of the team!

BARELY can there have been such a bewildering hurling transformation as about 9,000 enthralled spectators saw at Nowlan Park, Kilkenny, yesterday, when the title-holders, The Fenians (Johnstown) scored a 7-8 to 5-10 victory over James Stephens, in the Kilkenny Senior Championship final.

So superior were the losers in the first half – they led by 2-3 to 0-0 after eight minutes by 4-6 to 1-2 after 28, and 4-6 to 2-2 at the interval – not only on the scoreboard but right through the field that there seemed little point in prolonging the torture of the Fenians.

A goal a minute before the interval did something to allay the alarm of the Fenians supporters but it still seemed beyond the bounds of possibility that they could overhaul the eventual losers.

In the sixth minute of the hour referee, Paddy Johnston, who handled the game with admirable commonsense saw cause to send off the loser's Joe O'Dwyer and the Fenian's Stan Delaney.

It will, I feel sure, always baffle me that a Johnstown team which looked bedraggled in one half could become a side of such splendour as we saw in the other. Within ten minutes of the resumption, the winners put on 3-3 to their rivals one point to take the lead for the first time - 5-5 to 4-7. The levelling point came quickly from the village and with 16 minutes still remaining they held the lead of 5-8 to 5-6.

Majestic as The Fenians had been one felt that they would crack at that stage but not a bit of it. Instead we saw them tumble back for 2-2 in the space of five minutes. Nine still remained and the Village were far from bowed but all they could muster was two points in the dying minutes of a glorious second half against right worthy victors.

What a hurler is Pat Delaney. He was the man who galvanised the champions into action and time and again in the second half he performed wondrous deeds that baffled as much as they uplifted even the strictly neutral observer.

This, however, was by no means a one man triumph. Pat Henderson, his brother Ger, who will surely soon join him on the county team, Michael Garrett at midfield, Johnny Moriarty, Paddy Broderick, Nicky Orr, Dick Dowling, Billy Fitzpatrick, P.J. Ryan, Jerdy Murphy and Martin Fitzpatrick, will also be the toast of Johnstown folk.

James Stephens went down with colours flying and that they did so, was largely due to the stout-hearted endeavours of Mick Crotty, strangely subdued after a brilliant first half, Liam O'Brien, Fan Larkin, Dinny McCormack, Michael Leahy, Paddy Larkin, Ned Byrne and Tom Ryan.

JAMES STEPHENS' supporters must still be wondering what happened. Leading at half time by 10 points (4-6 to 2-2) and playing like winners, the city side completely collapsed in the second half. At one stage in the first half many fans were talking in terms of leaving at half time as The Village, at this stage, looked set for a runaway victory.

Paddy Broderick was off target on a few occasions at the start and looked as though luck was not on his side. But what a difference in the second half. The Fenians hit The Village with everything they had and stars of the first half – Liam O'Brien, Mick Crotty and Fan Larkin – were almost inconspicuous in the second.

Billy Watson, 'Schemer Supreme' of the Johnstown attack, got the vital scores while Billy Fitzpatrick, improving with every game, started the 'goal rush'. Pat Delaney and Paddy Broderick improved out of all recognition in the second half and G. Murphy, who came on as a sub, and Mick Garrett when he moved out, all contributed to this wonderful comeback.

Only champions could fight back like The Fenians and, although The Village could have won, the north Kilkenny men deserved their victory. How did P.J. Ryan stop some of the shots taken at him? Why did Ned Byrne persist in rising the ball in the square when goals were there for the asking? Would Joe O'Dwyer have made a difference had he not received marching orders with Shem Delaney in the first half immediately after he had scored a fine goal? There are questions which are bound to be asked in Gaelic circles for some time. The greasy ball must have contributed to the high tally of goals scored - 12 in all. When one takes into

consideration that the County's top goalkeepers were in action, this is almost incredible. How often has a team lost a match before with all their forwards scoring — four of them getting goals and the other two a good tally of points — and still lose? Many would say that 25 points is enough to win any game, but then The Fenians are a great team and on Sunday they proved it once and for all.

For the record, they have contested the County Final every year since 1968 and found time to win the Junior Football Final in 1971. By the looks of things they're there for some time to come. On the way to the final, the champions defeated Mooncoin and The Rower/Inistioge. James Stephens beat Bennettsbridge and Galmoy.

Mick Crotty's brilliant opening half, scoring point after point, making it look easy. When playing this way one can easily understand why the Irish Chicago papers dubbed him one of the best hurlers ever when he hurled in the U.S. for the Harry Bolands.

P.J. Ryan's brilliant saves. "Only the man upstairs could have stopped them," one fan exclaimed as P.J. got his stick to one 'rasper' from Ned Byrne. Played very well all through and at 23 years of age has a long career in front of him.

Dessie Murphy's sporting handshake for his replacement, Scanie O'Brien. This was sportsmanship for all to see, and if tradition was broken by this, it is for the betterment of the game. Murphy is no mean exponent of the code and could well have been annoyed at being taken off.

1974 COUNTY SH FINAL

In reaching the county final of 1974, the Fenians arrived on the cusp of an unprecedented achievement. Winning one county final in Kilkenny is a great feat but to be one away from a three in a row in the post-parish-rule era was breathtaking. In the final against Bennettsbridge, poor weather conditions mitigated against a classic final. That both defences were to the fore was reflected in the scoreline of ten points to six, in favour of the Fenians. However, what the game lacked in purist-pleasing skill was more than made up for in strength of character. In any war of wills, only one team was going to win. Twenty seven frees were conceded in total and seven of the sixteen scores came from those frees. Both NickyRyan, Nicky Orr, Frankie Hawkes, Mick Garrett, Pat Henderson, John Moriarty, John Power. Orr and Jim Treacy revelled in the battle of attrition, and Noel Skehan even played outfield in an attempt to turn the tide. When Paddy Johnston sounded the final whistle, it sounded an historic victory, one that bore testimony to character on the day and in the years previously. It ensured the Fenians' place in the annals of great club sides. When, in 1977, the Fenians defeated Rower-Inistioge it marked the end of a chapter in their history. Though they went on to contest two finals in 1978 and 1981, this team's golden age was at an end. A team that never shirked adversity but relished it. A team baptised by Fr. Pierce Malone, had confirmed the belief of many that this was one of the great sides. A team that reaffirmed the maxim that skill means nothing unless allied to strength of body and character. Above all a team that showed exactly what unity of purpose could achieve. The Fenians of this era played hurling because they loved it, and it showed.

FENIANS' THREE IN A ROW!


The Fenians......0-10 Bennettsbridge...0-6



All Ireland Club Championship 1974-75

The Fenians were the first Kilkenny club to reach the All-Ireland Club hurling final. Their achievement was a notable one and is recalled here by BILLY FITZPATRICK.

Fresh from their exploits in the Kilkenny county senior championship of 1974 the Fenians began their third assault on the club championship in determined fashion. In the first round they met Wexford county champions Rathnure, powered by the Quigleys. It was a bruising encounter, with the play often being spoiled by rough tactics. Not surprisingly, Gerry Kirwan had a busy day. He sent three players to the line in the second half, including the present writer, and booked three more. But there was plenty of good hurling in the match which the Fenians won by 4-7 to 1-7. In what was a hard earned victory, Pat Henderson, Nicky Orr, Gerry Murphy, Mick Garrett (scored 1-2), Pat Delaney (scored 1-1) and John Moriarty (scored 1-2) were most prominent for the Fenians.

Naomh Eoin, the Carlow county champions, were the Fenians' opponents in the second round at Nowlan Park. Long before the final whistle sounded, the qualifier for the third round was decided. The Fenians led at half time by 2-10 to 0-1, at full time by 5-14 to 0-4.

Faughs were their opponents in the third round played in Nowlan Park. Faughs had many Kilkenny connections, especially one, Tommy Moore, whose son-in-law Bernie Ryan did much for hurling in Johnstown. The Fenians dictated most of the play in the first half with Pat Henderson playing very well. Thereafter, they were far from impressive. Although they won by 2-9 to 1-7, their second goal only came in the last seconds of the game. Pat Henderson, Pat Delaney (1-1), Johnny Moriarty (0-5), Billy Fitzpatrick (0-2), Mick Garrett and Nckey Orr caught the eye most.

LEINSTER FINAL

In the Leinster final, Fenians faced St. Rynagh's of Offaly, not for the first time in the club championship. It was a tough, rugged encounter played in heavy conditions, yet both sides played some fine hurling. The Fenians had the better of the first half but some bad shooting allied to some strong tackling by the Rynagh's defence left them at the interval with eight wides and three Billy Fitzpatrick points, all from frees. Rynagh's took their limited opportunities in that opening half and were level at half time, 0-3 each.

The Fenians upped their game considerably in the second half. Their defence, ably marshalled by centre back Pat Henderson, was tight, their midfield of Mick Garrett and Gerry Murphy came more into the game. Nevertheless, St. Rynagh's went ahead in the 42nd minute with a great goal from substitute Matt Moylan. There were tremendous exchanges in the Rynagh's goalmouth after this and only some desperate measures by the Offaly defence kept out the Fenians. When Paddy Fitzpatrick finished a Henderson-Pat Delaney move to the net to level the scores were level once more. Ten minutes from the finish, Mick Garrett made sure of victory when he took a fine pass from Billy Fitzpatrick and lashed the ball past Damien Martin. Rynagh's did try in those last ten minutes but the Fenians' defence held firm. Shem Delaney, Nickey Orr, Pat and Ger Henderson were in magnificent form in the winners' defence. Garrett had a good hour at mid-field and scored 1-1 into the bargain. Most impressive in attack were Pat Delaney, who took a couple of early knocks, and Billy and Paddy Fitzpatrick who contributed between them a goal and four points. The Fenians had done it at last. They had won a Leinster championship, the first team from Kilkenny to do so.

ALL-IRELAND SEMI-FINAL

In the All-Ireland semi-final, played in Ballinasloe, the Fenians were faced by the home team, Ardrahan. The Fenians opened their account with a well-taken goal by J.J Tobin. They added on seven further points as Ardrahan wasted chance after chance. Indeed, Ardrahan's one score in the first half, a point, only came in the 29th minute. At the break the Leinster champions led by 1-7 to 0-1.

The pep talk at the break must have helped the Connacht champions, for within a few minutes Adrahan had scored three points and had gained a penalty from which they added another. Ardrahan's Michael Bond and Vincent Mullins were on top at midfield. The Fenians were under some pressure. Nicky Orr, who seemed to keep his best form for these games, and the half-back line of Ger Henderson, Pat Henderson, and Dick Dowling were equal to the task. Ardrahan could not break through for a goal. At the other end, Billy Fitzpatrick stretched the Fenians' advantage to five points, 1-8 to 0-6. Some positional switches helped and soon the Leinster champions were home and dry. They won in the end by 2-13 to 1-8. Reports of the game single out Billy Fitzpatrick who scored 1-8, the same total as Ardrahan. He was joined on the scoresheet by J.J Tobin (1-1); Johnny Moriarty (0-2), Willie Watson (0-1) and Pat Henderson (0-1); Michael Bond scored four points for Ardrahan. The Fenians were on their way to Croke Park for the club final on 16 March. Excitement in the parish was at fever pitch.

ALL-IRELAND FINAL

The Fenians' opponents in Croke Park were the Munster champions, St. Finbarr's. Munster teams had won all four club championships up to then, Roscrea (1971), Blackrock (1972, 1974) and Glen Rovers (1973). The Fenians had a daunting task. Despite a rather heavy sod, both sides played some good entertaining hurling before a disappointingly small crowd of 3,000. The tackling and clearing of the Fenians' defence were splendid The Fenians led at half time by 0-5 to 0-4.

They had hard luck almost immediately after the interval when Paddy Fitzpatrick hit the crossbar. Pat Delaney broke through for a great goal in the eighth minute to put them 1-5 to 0-5 in front. The Fenians were holding on to a 1-6 to 0-8 lead when former Cork star, Charlie Cullinane was introduced to the Cork attack. Three goals in a five minute spell per Jimmy Barry Murphy, Jerry O'Shea and Charlie Cullinane dashed Fenians' hopes. A point from Joe Ryan seventeen minutes from the finish was their only other score. They were beaten by 3-8 to 1-6. The report of the game mentions the brilliance of the losers' full back trio, especially Nicky Orr and Martin Fitzpatrick who kept Charlie McCarthy scoreless from play. Pat Henderson had his hands full with Jimmy Barry Murphy. Mick Garrett, John Moriarty, Billy Fitzpatrick, Pat Delaney, and Joe Ryan tried hard.

Although Johnny Moriarty only played with Kilkenny for one season, he stands out as a distinct figure in this hurling tradition.

Why? Because this man, who passed away last July, was a Tipperary native. When? 1971, when his native crowd beat his adopted crowd by three points in a searing Senior All Ireland Final.

Kilkenny's cohort of outsiders might well be the smallest of any hurling culture. Before Moriarty, there were two other non natives, both of them also from Tipperary: Rody Nealon (father of Donie) and Connie Keane. They briefly featured during the 1920s.

What happened in 1971? You have to trace intriguing swerves. Johnny Moriarty was from Triandra Cross, a step outside Gortnahoe on the way to Urlingford. Born in November 1945, he grew up during one of Tipperary's most famous eras. He began as a goalkeeper with Gortnahoe Glengoole. "We didn't win a lot," he said in a 2017 interview. "The only medal I ever got was a Junior Mid Final against Moycarkey-Borris."

Moriarty gave a spell during the late 1960s working in London. He initially hurled with a club named Young Irelands, before being headhunted by the much stronger St Gabriel's. Then the decisive swerve: "I went to Johnstown, to a job with Roadmaster Caravans. Vera [his wife] is from Folkscourt. My mother was a Kilkenny woman, from out the road in Beggar. So it wasn't difficult to settle here. We got married in 1969."

He continued: "Then I started hurling with Roadmaster, in the Factories League. We had a right strong crew, PJ Ryan and Nicky Orr and plenty others."

Roadmaster did not require a goalkeeper due Ryan's talent between the posts. Here was another kind of swerve. "PJ was a great goalie," Moriarty noted. "So they landed me out to wing forward. I liked it and started hurling well. Mick Gannon used come and watch Roadmaster hurl. He asked me to join up with The Fenians.

"Yes, I thought long and hard about the move. But eventually I had to say: why not? They were a smashing team, on the way up. I went to them the year I was married."

Johnny Moriarty started catching the eye as a

livewire wing forward. Kilkenny mentors, who now included Mick Gannon, did not fail to notice. Johnstown's new recruit



started featuring in stripes as of late 1970. He started all five league ties in early 1971, up to when a playoff with Wexford got lost by a point. Subsequent panel shake up meant he was not with Kilkenny during the Leinster Championship, when Dublin and Wexford were defeated. But a strong performance for The Fenians against The Rower-Inistioge in early August spun him into a wing forward spot for the All Ireland semi final against London.

"I was going well in training," Moriarty recalled. "So they reckoned they'd chance me. But it didn't happen on the day, and I was taken off at halftime. I felt sluggish and out of sorts."

He was retained for the All Ireland panel but Ned Byrne came into the forwards. Was it difficult for his family, Johnny Moriarty in black and amber? There was a note of hesitation in that 2017 interview: "My father really wanted me to get an All Ireland medal. It would have meant everything to the family. But maybe not against Tipp... He was a roarin' Tipp man, out and out. What he actually felt on the day, I don't really know. People at home told me he was very torn, up in the Stand."

That Sunday evening, he was done with stripes. The governing note was magnanimous: "I never had any bitterness over not being called back afterwards by Kilkenny. I got my chance. I was just proud to have played with some truly great hurlers, especially with so many of them from Johnstown

Nothing daunted, the same man hurled away with force. Although The Fenians lost to Bennettsbridge in 1971's Senior Final, they took three in a row between 1972 and 1974. Johnny Moriarty stayed omnipresent on those champion sides, still tireless amd incisive at wing forward when a fifth Senior title arrived in 1977. He signed off via a Junior A Final win over The Rower-Inistioge in 1980 and coming on as a sub in 1981's Senior Final.


